The Fourth Annual Bob Wills Day celebration drew the largest crowd that has ever gathered for the Turkey event. That is the opinion expressed by just about everyone who attended the celebration. There is no way to get an accurate count but estimates ran from 2,500 to 3,500 and probably somewhere in between the two figures will be close. Anyway, people came from far and near to attend the affair and it was a big day for Turkey and a big day for people who like their music "Texas Playboystyle."

Festivities got underway at 10 a.m. with a parade down Main Street in Turkey. Just as his Bob Wills Day grown since that first one, so has the quality of the parade, for the one staged last Saturday was the largest in numbers and the quality of the floats and other entries was as good as any of the three preceding events. Around forty units made up the parade this time.

Turkey Implement Company was awarded first place for its float. Peoples State Bank won second and Bill Farley's Well Service float won third place. The NAEP Riding Club of Amarillo won first prize for that category, and the Childress Riding Club was judged second.

Following the parade, a great host of spectators went to the Bob Wills Memorial Center (formerly the Turkey School grounds) where a barbecue dinner was served. Once again, it is not known the exact number of people served but probably some 2,500 would be close for they consumed almost 1,000 pounds of barbecued beef.

After the noon meal was served, an old-fashioned fiddlers contest was held in the old high school auditorium.

Spectators started gathering at the old football field as soon as they had finished their lunch, in anticipation of the highlight of the day: the appearance of a number of the old Texas Playboys band, who would play music made popular by Bob Wills and his boys, led by the one and only "Take It A-way Leon" McAuliffe.

The program, emceed by Joe Bob Barnhill who grew up at Turkey and now lives in Nashville, Tennessee, started around 3:30 and for about two hours Leon and the Playboys entertained the huge crowd. Appearing on the program in addition to the Playboys, was a former Miss Texas, Miss Judy Mallett who is quite a "fiddler" in her own right, and Miss Ford Country, Sandy Lankford, who is quite a singer in addition to being quite pretty. Miss Mallett played several Bob Wills numbers with the band.

Emcee Joe Bob Barnhill also sang several numbers with the band.

Others of the Playboys present were Bob Kaiser, Smoky Dacus, Al Strickland, Jack Stidham, Keith Coleman, Johnny Gimble, Tommy Alsop and Leon Rauch.

Turkey produced a champion speller for the second time Saturday, in Amarillo, when 12-year-old Jayne Eudy became the winner of the Globe-News Spelling Bee. A sixth grader from Valley School, representing Hall County,

Jayne took the championship from Ernest Sandoval, 14, an eighth grade student at James Bowie Junior High and representing Potter County. Sandoval misspelled "nauseate" and Jayne won when she spelled that word correctly and then spelled "encyclical."

As regional champion, she will go to Washington, D. C. June 2 to compete in the national bee. In addition to the all-expense paid trip to Washington for Jayne and her mother, she received a watch and a traveling plaque to be placed in the school for one year.

VALLEY BOYS DOUBLES TEAM WINS TRIP TO STATE

The Valley boys doubles tennis team of Ron Eudy and Scotty Setliff breezed through the Regional Tennis Meet at Levelland last weekend, winning the regional championship and the right to play in the State Meet to be held in Austin May 9-10.

The other Valley team of Don Douglas and Lyndal Couch (Valley won first and second in district competition and both teams advanced to regional) defeated Hartley in first round play, then lost to Fort Davis in the second round. Joey Barefield, Valley's singles representative, lost in the first round of play at regional. Local fans, however, report that Joey was not playing up to form and actually was the best singles player at the regional meet.

In winning the Region 1-B doubles title, Setliff and Eudy played four matches and lost only nine games, winning their first match 6-2, 6-2; their second match was a 6-1, 6-0 win over Borden County, and in the semifinals they defeated Glascock County 6-2, 6-1. In the finals match the Valley boys won over Kary Richardson and Eddie Decker of Forsan, 6-0, 6-1. By winning the second place, Richardson and Decker will also advance to the State Meet. field represented Valley and the district in golf competition at Levelland last Thursday but both lost out in the first round of play.

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HELP MAKES THE DIFFERENCE DURING A BEREAVEMENT

Whether a person emerges stronger or weaker from the ordeal of bereavement is often determined by the kind of help he gets during the period of trouble, Roberta Dix, family life education specialist, said this week.

"Grieving people need to talk, to work it out. And understanding the phases of bereavement could make it easier to comfort a friend," the specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M System, said.

"The emotional journey for the bereaved usually lasts one year and is broken up into three phases: impact, recoil and recovery."

She explained that the impact stage usually shows the person functioning in character. Everything is automatic, and life seems animated. Indifference to immediate needs and lowered concentration levels might occur, the specialist said.

"Friends are greatly needed during the recoil phase. The person is depressed, angry toward the world, and usually wants to discuss the deceased and details of the death. But since the time between death and this phase may be months, friends are usually less attentive by this time," she said.

Recovery phase shows the person looking to the future and letting go of the past. At this time, he is ready to return to the mainstream of life but may need help in understanding how to make new social contacts as a single person, she pointed out.

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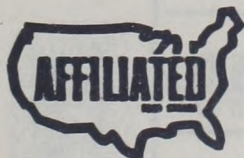

Two major classes of sorghum are grown in the United States. Sweet Sorghum or Sorgo accounts for about 20% of the crop and is grown for forage, silage and sorghum (often called cane) syrup. The vast majority of the crop is grain sorghum. Although grain sorghum is grown predominantly for the grain, it also acts as a dual purpose plant with stalks commonly used as forage or silage. Experts don't always agree on world sorghum production but they generally acknowledge that at least 125 million acres are now used for planting sorghum crops. Use of sorghum as a food grain in China, Africa and India ranks sorghum with corn as a contender for the third most important food grain in the world (behind wheat and rice). All estimates are not in yet for this year's acreage in grain sorghum, but indications are, although local areas may show some increase, the national crop could be reduced as much as five percent.
