#### **Texas Plans To Protect Black-Tailed Prairie Dog**

A working group committee of representatives for ranching an farming organizational, environmental groups, state and federal biologists, private landowners and other have completed a Texas plan to conserve the black-tailed prairie dog and its grass land habitat. The species is currently a candidate for possible listing as threatened under the federal Endangered Species Act.

The management plan created by the Texas Black-Tailed Prairie Dog Working Group sets a goal to have 293,129 acres of occupied prairie dog habitat in Texas by 2011. This represents one percent of the original available habitat in Texas as estimated by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

#### Fire Officials Offer Practical **Tips For Fireworks Safety**

The Fourth of July holiday season not only means fireworks and celebrations, but also typically hot, dry summer weather in Texas. While much of the state has seen above average rainfall this year, summer heat will quickly take its toll on vegetation

tion.

Texas Forest Service chief of fire operations, Mark Stanford, encouraged Texans to safely celebrate Independence Day.

"Recent rains across Central and East Texas have greatly reduced the risk of wildfire ignitions due to fireworks," Stanford said. "Even though the fire danger is low across much of the state, people should still exercise caution and common sense."

Stanford said parts of the Trans-Pecos region and far West Texas are still very dry, so residents or visitors to the Guadalupe or Davis Mountains in particular need to be wary of the high fire danger.

Stanford offered the following tips to safely celebrate July

\* Adhere to all county and city fireworks law

\* Use fireworks outdoors, in a safe area away from dry
grass, trees and buildings

\* Follow directions carefully – with close adult supervi-

Keep a bucket of water, wet towels and a garden hose

\* Never shoot fireworks from metal or glass containers

\* Dispose of fireworks properly by soaking them in water before putting them in a trashcan

\* Never experiment with homemade or altered fireworks







## **Texas Farm Service Agency** Announces Authorization For **Managed CRP Haying and Grazing** Cutting hay and grazing livestock on land enrolled in the U.S. De-partment of Agriculture's Conservation Reserve Program, in the ab-sence of a weather-related emergency, is now an option for Texas pro-

ducers.

Billy Foster, County Executive Director for the Hall County Farm Service Agency, announced this week that managed haying and grazing is allowed on CRP lands. Haying is approved in Texas July 2 through September 29 and grazing is approved beginning July 2 and ending October 29, 2004. The starting date for both haying and grazing is tied to the end of the primary nesting and brood rearing season in the state. Prior to the 2002 Farm Bill, commercial use of CRP land was generally prohibited expent for weather-related emercencies such as droughts.

To take advantage of the haying and grazing options, producers must modify existing conservation plans for the CRP acreage to included managed haying and grazing practices. The plans must be developed in conjunction with USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) or one of its technical service providers.

Producers must also agree to certain terms and conditions, including signing an agreement to reestablish, at the producer's own cost, any cover destroyed or damaged as a result of haying or grazing and to remove all hay within 10 days of being notified that the managed haying and grazing season has ended.

Foster emphasized that for acreage that is hayed or grazed, annual

To grazing season has ended.

Foster emphasized that for acreage that is hayed or grazed, annual ental payments producers receive for enrolling land into CRP-will be educed by 25 percent.

Under this enhanced CRP provision, producers can cut hay or graze

Under this enhanced CRP provision, producers can cut hay or graze livestock on a given acre no more than once every three years after the vegetative cover is fully established. An area hayed or grazed this year, for example, may not be hayed or grazed again until 2007. CRP participants can choose to hay or graze their entire CRP acreage in the first year, or only a portion of their CRP acreage each year. Producers may not harvest hay and graze livestock on the same land in the same year. "The managed haying and grazing option provides producers latitude when making land management decisions regarding their operations. The periodic disturbance of vegetative cover under managed haying and grazing will increase the diversity and quality of the cover an improve wildlife benefits," said Foster.

#### **Area Crop Report Still Favorable** Although Weather Wildcard Could **Still Change Outlook**

For a region that averages an abandonment rate of 18-20 percent, growers and crop observers alike are hesitant to talk much when things

are generally headed in the right direction.

That's the position many producers on the High Plains find they are in as the area collectively keeps its fingers crossed and hopes for the best. So far the 2004 crop is rated as good to excellent in most areas and off to a start that is being guardedly compared to some of

the best in recent memory.

Adding to the undercurrent of excitement is the fact that a significant number of dryland acres have been established and are growing

With irrigated and non-irrigated acreage set to take advantage of a favorable subsoil moisture situation capable of carrying the crop well

that's not to say, however, that everything is wine and roses on the Plains in 2004. As of this writing growers in northern portions of Floyd County, and in the adjacent counties of Swisher and Briscoe, are picking up the pieces from the season' largest single hail event. The storm, which ravaged the area June 21, is estimated to have logged an estimated 60,000 more acres into the loss column.

The worst part of the story, though, is that this same area has now lost three promising crop sin a row to hail.

Despite the devastation of the June 21 storm, the overall outlook for the High Plains region remains positive. Of the estimated 3.6 million acres planted to cotton this year it is hard to account for more than 300,000 - 400,000 acres that could ultimately be abandoned at

The primary causes of loss to date have been a lack of moisture to establish a stand on dryland acres, which accounts for around 250,000 acres, and a combination of hail, wind or flooding that have tallied another 100,000 - 150,000 acres to date.

With about 3.2 million acres standing at the end of June the 2004 crop still has tremendous potential. Maturity-wise the crop has everything from very early to very late and some of it will need plenty of open weather this fall to reach its true potential. With luck the season will continue to provide the necessary ingredients to make the crop a

Weather forecasts showing an increased chance for scattered thun-derstorms thorough the end of the month mean producers will have a stressful time ahead. Despite looking forward to the possibilities, they know that this time of year any storm can deliver good in the form of rain and bad in the form of hail and high wind that threatens old and

ung cotton alike. Growers who receive damage and need to assess the situation have everal good resources available to them through the Texas A&M Re-earch and Extension Center at Lubbock.

The Center's website has publications that provide detailed information on evaluation damaged stands that can assist growers deciding if they should keep or fail a severely damaged cotton crop.

#### **Assistance Available To Preserve Texas Grasslands**

Landowners have less than a month to file applications for the Grassland Reserve Program (GRP) administered by the USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA). July 23, 2004, is the deadline to submit GRP offers and have them considered for 2004 fiscal year funding. In Texas, more than \$7 million is available to qualifying applicants.

"The voluntary Grassland Reserve Program helps preserve and conserve our nation's grasslands by providing financial and technical assistance to the landowners," according to Billy Foster, County Executive Director for the Hall County FSA office.

Grasslands eligible for enrollment in this program may be native grassland, improved rangeland or improved pastureland. Other acreage which may qualify for enrollment includes land containing forbs or shrubs, or land located in an area historically dominated by grassland. Offers for participation in GRP must include 40 or more con-

The Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) will evaluate each offer and rate the eligibility of the land according to specific criteria, including current vegetative cover, susceptibility to urban sprawl, and the potential for conversion to cropland. Landowners whose applications are selected for enrollment in GRP will receive assistance to support grazing operation, to increase and maintain plant and animal biodiversity, and to protect grass and range lands under the greatest threat of conversion

Payments on approved applications ill be administered through local FSA offices.

## Texas Plans To Protect Black-Tailed Prairie Dogs

Preliminary estimates indicate there is currently 150,000 to 170,000 acres of occupied prairie dog habitat in the state, with a final inventory to be completed this summer. This acreage figure is based on aerial photo interpretation and subsequent ground truthing from county roads.

Part of the good news in Texas is we have more than twice the occupied prairie dog habitat than was originally thought, which was around 68,000 acres based on a 1991 study," said Derrick Holdstock, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's black-tailed prairie dog program coordinator.

Work to develop the Texas Black-tailed Prairie Dog Conservation and Management Plan began in 1999 following petitions by environmental groups for the USFWS to list the black-tailed prairie dogs as threatened. The texas working group is part of a multi-state effort to restore the species.

The texas plan has six goals: (1) Determine the current population size of black-tailed prairie dogs in Texas and establish a long-term monitoring program, (2) Develop and implement an effective education and outreach program, (3) Develop management options and guidelines that conserve prairie dogs at long-term sustainable levels, (4) Review and make recommendations for regulatory changes in the status of black-tailed prairie dogs (5) Identify research needs and establish a research program that facilitates long term viability of black-tailed prairie dog as threatened," said Roger Haldenby of Plains cotton Growers, a working group member. "We want to preclude the need to list the species by taking steps to make sure it remains part of the landscape and ecology of the plains."

Black-tailed prairie dogs (Cynomys ludovicianus) are important for healthy grassland ecosystems. Their burros and surrounding low-cut vegetation orvide habitat for a variety of other species, including western burrowing owls, mountain plovers, and the endangered black-footed ferret (currently extinct in Texas). Basic prairie

hunting. Some ranchers who lease land for prairie dog hunting, charging a small daily fee. This hunting is very sustainable, since prairie dogs get gun shy very quickly. There is no data out there that say any good size colony 15 to 20 acres or larger has ever been shot out. 




