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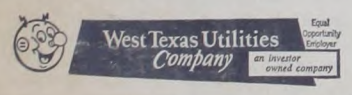


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PRE-SCHOOL READING ABILITY TO BE TESTED ON TV



Television's first series deliberately aimed at a three-year-old audience arrives this spring. "Wordland Workshop," championing the controversial position that pre-school children can and should be taught to read, is the first TV show ever to be a Ph. D. thesis.

Tested successfully on WFIL-TV, Philadelphia last year, the 195 half-hours teach a new word or phrase each day with the aid of games, marionettes, a kangaroo named Wendy Wallaby, a word tree and a new kind of film announcement called "morphophone commercials."

Producer-writer Neil Harvey developed the program as a doctorate dissertation at the University of Pennsylvania. Both for him and the children viewing, the series is an experiment to test the validity of the growing belief that youngsters should be taught to read long before the usual first grade, six-year-old level. Parental response to the WFIL-TV test has clearly supported Dr. Harvey's position.

Control groups in Binghamton, New York and Philadelphia revealed, after 39 weeks of viewing, expected improvement in reading interest and performance, also in parental competence and, most surprising of all, children's health.

Irene Shellington, Language Arts Co-ordinator of the Haverford Township Schools, is the "Wordland" teacher. Known as Miss Irene. Except for a closing word to parents, whose active participation is urged for some of the show's segments, the script is written to appeal to ages two and three. A sponsoring advertiser can only be given a credit line, no commercials.

Dr. Harvey believes the kind of academic motivation needed by a child for school entry can be developed early by stimulating a love of reading, and that this can help overcome home deficiencies. Since reading is the foundation on which all education depends, he and many educators want to "open the door for young minds" by using TV, the small child's favorite activity. Triangle Stations, the broadcaster operating WFIL-TV, is making "Wordland Workshop" available to all U. S. stations for handling costs only.

NOTES FROM VA

A reminder that war widows are eligible for G.I. Bill-type education and home loan benefits was issued today by the Veterans Administration.

The education benefits are also available to wives of veterans who are permanently and totally disabled as the result of military service.

Under a new law which went into effect Dec. 1, 1968, the widow of a man who died and the wife of a veteran who was permanently and totally disabled as the result of military service is entitled to 36 months of educational assistance from the VA.

An allowance of \$130 a month is paid for full-time training with lesser sums paid for part-time training.

Unremarried widows of veterans who served in World War II, the Korean Conflict, or in the Post-Korean period (since Jan. 31, 1955) and who died in service or as the result of service are eligible for VA-guaranteed G. I. home loans.

This eligibility expires July 25, 1970, for World War II widows, with widows of Korean Conflict veterans having until Jan. 31, 1975 to use their entitlement. Generally, widows of Post-Korean service veterans have 20 years from the date of death for needy unremarried widows and minor children of veterans whose deaths were not related to military service. The amount of the pension is keyed to income.

Reimbursement of burial expenses: Payment not to exceed \$250 may be made within two years to the widow, undertaker, or any other person who bore a veteran's

funeral expenses.

Children's education: In addition to education benefits for qualified wives and widows, an allowance of \$130 a month for full-time college level training is paid to children (under 26) of veterans who died of their husband's death or discharge from service to obtain loans.

The VA will guarantee 60 percent — up to a maximum of \$12,500 — of the loan obtained by the widow. Long-term mortgages (up to 30 years) and little or no downpayments remain the principal advantage of G. I. loans.

The VA also listed some other benefits of particular interest to women:

Dependency and Indemnity Compensation: Monthly payments for widows and children of men who died in service or as the result of service.

Payment is generally \$120 a month plus 12 per cent of the monthly basic pay now being received by a serviceman whose rank and years of service are the same as those of the deceased serviceman. Minimum payment is \$133 a month.

Death pension: Monthly pay-

LOCAL JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES RETURN FROM CONVENTION

"Lawlessness and disorder have gone far beyond man's ability to correct as evidenced by the fact that people of all levels of society now live in fear behind locked doors of their own homes," were the introductory remarks of L. M. Dugan, who spoke before 620 delegates in Snyder who were attending the main Bible lecture of their convention.

Entitled "Law and Order—When and How?", the subject presented to the area members of Jehovah's Witnesses was the highlight of their 3-day convention with Dugan pointing to the lack of law and order

today. "It is not detached from us but affects each one of us personally; it touches our family, our relatives, our friends," he said. "We are living in fear; we live in a world of watchdogs and locks, high walls, fences and barred windows and the future looks even worse."

"In a world of increasing violence and crime, peace and security seem impossible to find. Within this generation, Jehovah God will do the impossible. He will bring an end to violence, and bring peace to deserving mankind," Dugan asserted.

Pointing to the fact that law and order is possible, Dugan assured the audience that the Bible promises an eternity of peace, freedom from fear and real security for those who now demonstrate to God their desire for such conditions.

"Jehovah's Witnesses invite those who desire law and order to study the Bible and learn the principles God requires of those who will be permitted to live in an eternity of law and order. It is with this assurance that each one of the Witnesses in attendance here at this assembly will return to their home communities to share such a promise with their neighbors," Dugan concluded.

Twenty-three from Quitaque will resume their regular schedule of activities in the Kingdom Hall.

ACCENT ON HEALTH —
AUSTIN — Ever heard of the Texas Interagency Council on Smoking and Health? If you haven't, you will because it's the nation's pace-setter in bringing smoking and health education to the state's youth and adults alike.

Here's the way the concept works to achieve a coordinated effort:

The Council is comprised of the Texas State Department of Health, Texas Education Agency, Texas Division of American Cancer Society, Texas Heart Association, Texas Tuberculosis and Respiratory Diseases Association and Texas Medical Association. The Texas Parent - Teachers Association is a cooperating member.

It coordinates the regional conferences in developing leadership within individual school districts, making available to teachers and students special resource materials, consultants and activities relating to the hazards of smoking.

The goal of the Council is to bring to the state an increasing awareness of the health hazards of cigarette smoking with emphasis given to youth. And the goal is being rapidly reached in Texas.

There are 20 regional education service centers over the state where 10 conferences on smoking and health have already been completed; and five more will be completed by spring. This will total 75 percent of the state.

This is more in one state than in all other states combined.

A special resource kit is provided those school district representatives who attend the conferences and they take the material directly back into their classrooms. This way, education starts immediately after a conference, and no time is lost in further meetings with local personnel.

Both national and state authorities in the education field are used as instructors at the conferences.

Recently two noted authorities in the education field met with the Council in Austin to evaluate its progress and stated that Texas is "by far the leader in this endeavor."

What this means then, is that of all information concerning public health being brought to our students, the hazards of smoking are becoming uppermost in the curriculum. And again, Texas is leading the way.

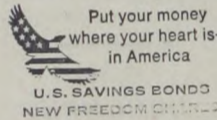

INCOME TAX RETURNS NOW FILED AT SERVICE CENTERS

Federal income tax returns should no longer be filed with the Internal Revenue Service District office in Dallas, but with the Southwest Service Center, 2651 S. Interregional Highway, Austin, Texas 78740, beginning January 1. This applies both to tax returns with remittances and those with refunds due.

The IRS Southwest Region, which includes Texas, is the latest to require direct filing of all income tax returns with IRS regional service center, under a law enacted November 2, 1966, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue, said today.

Direct filing of returns will eliminate initial handling at the district office, where they are packaged and shipped to the service center for processing.



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U.S. SAVINGS BONDS NEW FREEDOM CHOICE



Bob Lilly, who usually plays defensive tackle for the Dallas Cowboys professional football team, this spring is heading up a bigger team. Lilly is chairman of the Texas Football Boys' Lily Day for Crippled Children, an event being staged March 22 by the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas.

Each team will handle its own local areas, and will be competing for trophies for the five teams doing best. SPECIALIST SUGGESTS GET FACTS ON WEED CONTROL

COLLEGE STATION — In years of good moisture and areas of high annual rainfall (above 30 inches), weed control is one of the most important factors to consider in getting a good stand of cotton, says Fred C. Elliott, Extension cotton specialist at Texas A&M University.

Chemicals for controlling weeds and grass offer a means of doing away with hand hoeing, as well as offering a cheaper method. There are a number of herbicides available, noted Elliott, but all of them have some limitation. It would be well to study all the materials and learn as much as possible about their use, pointed out the specialist.

There are nine chemicals recommended for use as premerges in cotton. All of these can be applied in a band at the time of planting

with equipment mounted on the tractor with the planter. Elliott said they can also be band or broadcast applied as a separate operation immediately after planting.

Two of these chemicals, Planavin and Treflan, must be soil incorporated. They can be applied broadcast in the fall or spring before planting, or can be sprayed on the beds, and then incorporated with a Roll-N-Cultivator, row disc, do-all, or roto-tiller. They may also be band incorporated with a roto tiller at the time of bed shaping before planting, added Elliott.

Mechanical weed control and careful attention to cultivation is still cheaper and safer than all-out use of chemicals. In the years of

low rainfall, the mechanical practices may be sufficient.

Each grower can work out a system suited to his land and equipment. Elliott added that a copy of B-1029, "Suggestions for Weed Control with Chemicals", available at the County Agent office would be helpful.
