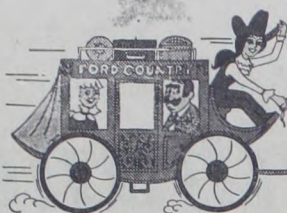

BILLING RATE CHANGE ANNOUNCED

Jake Watson, of the Federal Land Bank of Houston will reduce the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 7½%. "This reduction will be effective on installments maturing on or after June 1, 1971 and affects more than \$110 million in variable rate loans to over 3200 Texas farmers and ranchers," Mr. Watson stated.

The variable rate loan, which was introduced by the Houston Bank in July, 1969, lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. This is the second time since January 1 that the billing rate has been reduced and the third such reduction in the past year. "This action is in line with the Bank's policy in providing farmers and ranchers credit at the lowest possible cost consistent with business practices," Watson stated.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long term real estate loans on farm and ranch lands throughout Texas. The Bank has over \$540 million in value of loans outstanding. The local association makes and services loans in Briscoe, Floyd, Motley and Hall Counties. 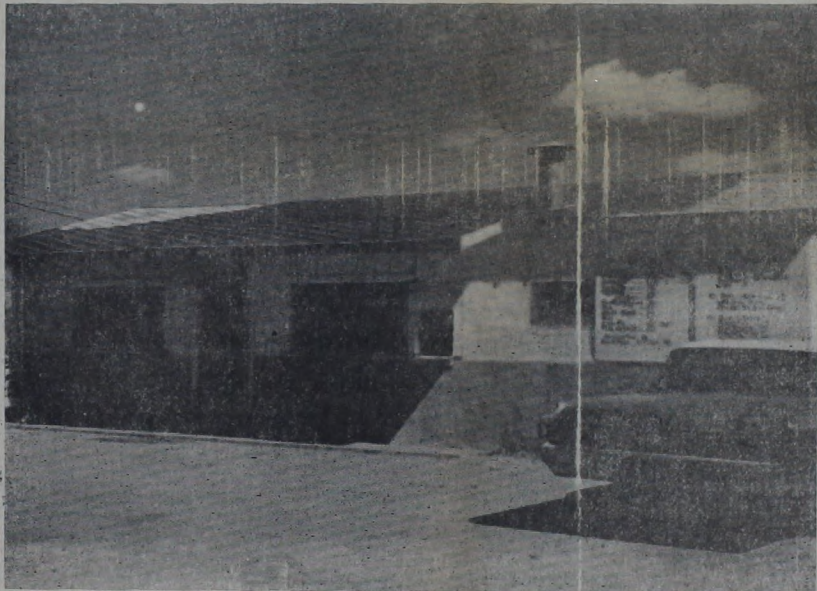

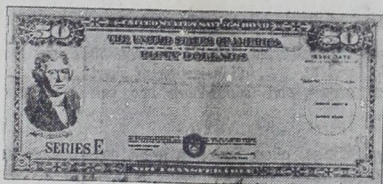

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WHEAT REFERENDUM BALLOTS AVAILABLE AT EXTENSION OFFICE

Wheat producers in Briscoe County who desire to vote absentee in the upcoming wheat referendum and producer board election will be able to do so at the County Extension Office beginning April 27, according to County Agricultural Agent Jackie Johnson.

"We will have ballots available for any producers who want to vote absentee in the election between April 27 and May 10," says Johnson. "On May 11 the Texas Wheat Producers Association will hold an election over a 34-county area to determine whether or not to assess producers not more than five mills per bushel on all wheat produced for purposes of research and promotion. At the same time, producers will have an opportunity to elect a nine-man producers board to administer funds for such a research and promotion program."

Briscoe County producers who do not vote absentee are encouraged to vote in the election on May 11.

Fred Mercer, county director of the TWPA, will be in charge of conducting the referendum and election.

Johnson points out that the Texas Commissioner of Agriculture has certified the TWPA to hold such a referendum and election and that a two-thirds favorable vote will be required to enact the self-assessment program. If the program is approved, the nine-man producers board will have total authority for the collection, use and accounting of all funds and the implementation of programs designed to strengthen the wheat growers' income.

SCS NOTES -

MEMPHIS - According to John Wilder, President of the National Association of Conservation Districts, your Soil Conservation District was organized to assist farmers and ranchers to achieve conservation and resource development with a maximum of voluntary action and local involvement. As new problems continue to arise to confront districts in these times of rapid social and economic change, the role of districts in articulating and representing the conservation cause is becoming ever more important.

Wilder stated that the 1970's will be years of further change in resource affairs. The trend is toward more intensive use of land, with consequent conservation problems. Timber needs are climbing, raising questions about the proper use and management of the national forests and the private, nonindustrial forest lands of the nation. Concern for the disposal of waste products is growing, and new programs to control air and water pollution (includ-

ing that from sediment, pesticides, and agricultural wastes) are being formulated. Improvement of fish and wildlife habitat, open space, and intangible environmental values, such as natural beauty, are receiving greater public attention.

Wilder states "Your Soil and Water Conservation District will continue to serve local needs of solving problems in resource conservation. It needs your support."
