**Vernon Field Day Slated October 4**

Livestock producers, conservation leaders and other interested persons are being invited to attend the annual Brush Control and Range Improvement Field Day at Vernon October 4.  
Henry Gregory, district conservationist for the U. S. Soil Conservation Service at Memphis, said he hoped several cooperators with the local Hall-Childress Soil and Water Conservation District will attend the event.

Air conditioned buses will be used to tour the Waggoner Ranch during the morning of October 4. After a catered lunch, an afternoon program will be held in the Wilbarger Memorial Auditorium at Vernon. Speakers from SCS, Texas A&M University, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and the Brush Control and Range Improvement Association will discuss new developments and problems in management of brush. Several prominent livestock producers will also be on the program.

"With increasing demands for meat, we simply must find ways to increase livestock production from our native grasslands," Gregory said. "A well-rounded grassland improvement program applied to all the land in Hall and Childress counties could increase beef production by as much as 25 percent. Similar increases could be obtained over wide sections of our state."

"To get this improvement, a combination of brush management, range reseeding, periodic rests, and other modern range improvement methods are needed."  
"Much of the technology for accomplishing this job is already known and in use here in the Hall-Childress Conservation District," Gregory said. "However, we must continually search for new and better ways of doing business. We also must solve some of the economic, environmental, and related problems associated with brush control and grassland improvement."

Some of the speakers scheduled for the field day include Edward E. Thomas, state conservationist, Soil Conservation Service; Dr. L. S. Pope, Associate Dean for Administrative Affairs, Texas A&M University; Dr. J. C. Miller, Director, Texas Agricultural Experi-

**Seven Accidents Reported During Month of August**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of August, according to Sergeant J. R. Smith, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in no persons killed and five persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1973 shows a total of 33 accidents resulting in two persons killed and 13 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for August 1973 shows a total of 586 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 328 persons injured as compared to August 1972 with 593 accidents resulting in 28 persons killed and 359 persons injured. This was 7 less accidents, 4 less fatalities, and 31 less injured in 1973 at the same period of time.

The 24 traffic deaths for the month of August 1973 occurred in the following counties: Montague, four; Armstrong, Castro, Dallam, Swisher, Baylor, Clay, Wise counties, two each; and Deaf Smith, Donley, Parmer, Haskell Lubbock and Lynn counties, one each.

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**A COMMON SENSE APPROACH TO MAKING OUT A WILL**

BOSTON — One of life's more sombre but necessary tasks is facing up to the reality that all of us need a legally recognized will. And it should be regarded as a positive instrument not something to remind us that we are mere mortals.

In simplest terms, a will is a vehicle providing for the orderly distribution of property in accordance with your predetermined wishes at time of death. Every adult probably needs a will, even those in modest circumstances.

Americans today often begin building sizeable estates in their early twenties. The relatively liberal fringe benefits now provided in most occupations can have a dramatic impact when one takes stock of his total financial worth. With group life insurance, company profit sharing, home ownership, pension plans and the now increased social security benefits, many people on the lower end of the economic ladder can point to estate planning potential far ex-

ceeding what one might normally estimate, without taking an exact personal inventory.

According to John D. Goethal, associate legal counsel of the John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance Co. here are the three steps you should consider now to prevent grief and potential hardship later.

★Retain the services of a trusted family lawyer or contact a local professional lawyers organization for the names of lawyers in your area who will be pleased to assist you in the drawing up of the will. Of course fees can vary but a basic will for someone of modest means should be relatively inexpensive. Don't hesitate to ask the attorney in advance to estimate what his fee will be. You will need to plan, ahead of your appointment, a complete inventory of assets. Include: savings; shares of mutual funds; stocks and bonds; life insurance, whether purchased individually or through a group plan at work; all property (home, car, furnishings, etc.); a coin or stamp collection, in fact, anything of value to you or your heirs. Then go over the list with your spouse,

a relative or close friend. They often can remind you of other assets that have been overlooked.

★After review of your list of assets, the lawyer will need to know your plan for distribution. He should be shown deeds, bank books, stock certificates, appraisals and other similar documents to best advise you whether a change in title might be prudent in order to save taxes or to carry out your desires. Also in the event of death of your will's chief beneficiary—for instance your wife killed in a car crash that also takes your life—who would receive the benefits in her place? If one is not designated, the state in its impersonal way will take over and may distribute in a way contrary to your current wishes. Think this over carefully since it can be the most crucial aspect of determining the will, and any probate lawyer will be quick to recall examples of the least conceivable events —the ones that did result! The will is a very flexible document and as many alternative plans as you desire can be incorporated in it. Allow logic to prevail — a family squabble is no time to make a resentful decision that you may not live to regret.

Another extremely important consideration if you have minor children is to agree in advance who will be the guardian if you should die prematurely. The surviving spouse will almost automatically be appointed but in the event of a common disaster, it is comforting to know that a relative or friend with child rearing beliefs similar to yours will assume the heavy burdens of parenthood. The lawyer will also ask you to appoint an executor whose chief

responsibility is overseeing distribution according to terms of the will. A simple, modest estate (one in which assets consist primarily of cash or property easily convertible to cash) could be served, in the interest of economy, by your spouse or trusted relative as executor.

A more complex estate should probably have the services of a co-executor — frequently a bank. There is a fee for this service but it is invariably worth the nominal charge since settling your estate might involve a highly technical real estate transaction, liquidation of common stock holdings at a favorable time, or a host of other problems that can arise. In the case of substantial assets it might be wise to consider the services of a qualified estate planner. All lawyers can draw a simple will but a lawyer who specializes in estate planning may be more versed in ways in which you can better accomplish your aims and often save substantial amounts on estate and inheritance taxes.

According to John Hancock's law department, if you already have a will, review it periodically and if any of the conditions listed below has occurred, steps should be taken immediately to update it. Failure to do so could result in certain portions of the will being invalid or terms of distribution might now be contrary to your previous wishes.

- ★Sale of property specifically left to an heir.
- ★Your executor dies, becomes incapacitated or has moved out of the area.
- ★You've moved to another state or have taken up residence outside the country.
