## CONSUMER ALERT

AUSTIN — The bill collection agent plays a necessary role in our society, since so much of our economy is based on credit transactions.

His purpose and the creditor's rights are well recognized in our laws and our courts.

But the laws also recognize the fact that an over-zealous bill collector should not infringe on the rights of a debtor, and the Consumer Protection Division of the Attorney General's office works to enforce the prohibitions against harassment and false collection practices.

The average creditor and the average professional collection agent are interested only in getting debts settled. They work under the assumption that if a person gets behind in his payments, he has a good reason, and they try to find out the reason and work out a payment plan to suit the debtor's individual situation.

Some bona fide retail credit bureaus even offer debt counseling services, without charge, to help both the consumer and the merchants.

So, if an illness job problem or some other personal crisis leads to a money problem and you have to delay bill payments, you should not hesitate to speak honestly about them to your creditors. You'll probably find them more than willing to help you work through that difficult time.

The prohibitions against deceptive debt collection practices are aimed at the unscrupulous few who would resort to misleading, and sometimes harmful, methods of collection.

These are well-defined in the Federal Trade Commission guidelines:

1. A debt collector cannot threaten that he is turning an account over to an attorney unless he is actually doing so.

2. He cannot pretend to represent an independent collection agency, if he actually works for the creditor or its subsidiary.

3. He cannot state that the consumer's credit record will be adversely affected, or that his employer will be notified, unless those are true facts.

4. He cannot use stationery, letterhead or envelope designed to imply an official government as-

sociation. (Under Texas state law, it is a misdemeanor to simulate legal process. So a collection notice designed to look like a court order is illegal.)

5) If he is trying to "skip trace" (locate a missing debtor), the creditor must clearly indicate in his correspondence that that is his purpose. Some collectors have used such wild tactics that the F. T. C. clearly forbids misrepresentations that a collector is "in the business of a casting service for the motion picture or television industry." And one famous court case involved a collector who had "skip trace" letters mailed from Ireland, claiming that the person sought had won the Irish Sweepstakes.

My Consumer Division has had occasion to take legal action for some of these abuses.

Under common law, an individual can bring suit through a private attorney for intentional infliction of emotional harm.

While the vast majority of consumers do not make credit obligations unless they intend to meet them, and most people do their utmost to pay their debts, we have to remember that there are also some who are financially irresponsible. If you ignore a routine request for payment of a past-due account, the collector might as-

sume you are in the latter category.

So, make a determined effort to clear up money misunderstandings. If you attempt to correct a mistake, or make a payment, and still encounter the deceptive practices outlined, do not hesitate to contact the Attorney General or

your local district or county attorney.

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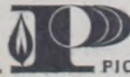

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# STATE Capital NEWS

AUSTIN, TEX.—Legislators have a lot more left to do than they have done so far in almost four months.

Of the nearly 1,700 House bills and almost 1,000 Senate bills introduced, fewer than 100 actually have reached the Governor's desk.

If the 63rd Legislature accomplishes as much as the 62nd did numerically (more than 1,000 bills passed, about 99 per cent of the floor action must be capsuled in the brief period before the May 23 adjournment deadline. Slow-moving debate in the

House — where more than 200 amendments were offered — on the \$9.7 billion appropriation bill fanned some speculation that a special session may be necessary to complete mandatory work.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe, who holds the key to calling such a session, has made clear he doesn't want one.

Senators banged through their \$9.5 billion version of the State budget in an hour and 21 minutes.

In spite of the two weeks spent on the House spending bill, Speaker Price Daniel, Jr. maintained "plenty of time" remains to consider other "must" legislation.

Daniel predicted House passage of these measures before May 28:

- \* Mass transit
- \* Drug law reform.
- \* Bills to improve fiscal responsibility in government appropriations.
- \* Restoral of capital punishment.
- \* Penal code revision.
- \* Water district reform.
- \* Public school finance.
- \* Competitive insurance rating.

While the work load appears staggering, Texas legislators are used to concentrating most of their floor session in the last month of their sessions.

### CONSTITUTIONAL HEARINGS BEGIN

The Constitutional Revision Commission began the first of its three-month series of hearings in the Panhandle and Far West Texas.

Initial hearings were held in Amarillo, Lubbock, El Paso, Midland-Odessa and San Angelo before moving South to San Antonio. A total of 18 hearings will hear citizens' views on how the constitution should be revised.

Witnesses offered suggestions on everything from dipping cattle in cold weather to legislative pay and the rights of individual citizens. Some told the Commission it should move cautiously in changing the Constitution.

Further hearings are slated at Arlington, Texarkana, Tyler, Lufkin, Nacogdoches, Houston, Laredo, Corpus Christi, McAllen, Beaumont - Port Arthur-Orange.

Abilene, Wichita, Falls, Waco, and Austin between now and the end of June.

### FEE, JURY BILLS PASSED

Higher hunting and fishing license fees and lower age limits for jury service are virtually assured.

The Senate passed amended bills authorizing both and returned them to the House where they originated.

The hunting license will cost \$5.25 instead of \$3.35 and the fishing license \$4.35 instead of \$2.15. A combination license is available for \$8.75. Out-of-State hunters visiting Texas may pay \$37.50 for their licenses. A special three-day, non-resident salt fishing license may be obtained for \$1.25.

Under the new juror age legislation, 18-20-year-olds can serve on any Texas state trial jury.

A bill to provide full maturity rights to the 18-20-year-olds finally passed the Senate and went to the House.

### COURTS SPEAK

A Midland murder conviction was reversed by the Court of Criminal Appeals because portions of a confession referring to another crime were introduced at the trial.

A Dallas case involving obscene calls and acts was reversed by the same court because a police "beef sheet", including matters not connected with the charge, was permitted in evidence.

A Corpus Christi lawyer convicted of professional misconduct won a new trial through a Supreme Court order, which upheld a 13th Court of Civil Appeals earlier finding.

In an Amarillo case, the Supreme Court held a public utility was not exempt from municipal zoning ordinances.

### AG OPINIONS

Att. Gen. John Hill held constitutional bills to require Legislative Budget Board to establish a system of audits of state agency programs (including biennial reports to the Legislature) and to identify the cost of legislation through fiscal notes.

In other recent opinions, Hill found constitutional:

\* SB 499 ratifying creation of the Crosby Municipal Utility District of Harris County.

\* HB 25 providing that governing bodies may require real estate sub-dividers to provide up to 10 percent of subdivisions for schools, park or playground purposes.

\* HB 1096, requiring appointment of two additional public housing authority commissioners "who must be tenants" of a public housing facility.

In other recent opinions, Hill said:

\* Ambulance attendants may perform emergency "nursing care" under radio or telephone directions of a licensed physician.

\* A simple majority vote can authorize bonds for seawalls and breakwaters.

\* A bill to grant emergency furloughs for convicts is constitutional if the leaves do not constitute reprieves, pardons or paroles. (Governor Briscoe returned the bill to the Senate where it originated.)

\* A hospital district cannot render services as regulatory restaurant, meat, milk, sewage, and water inspections.

\* Railroads cannot be forced to comply with crossing marking requirements contained in an appropriations bill rider unless present law requires the same.

\* Student fees may be collected to cover public interest research activities.

\* A bill to validate a \$1.5 million Corpus Christi bond issue to buy facilities for a new college unit is constitutional.

\* One appointment by former Gov. Preston Smith to Rio Grande Valley Municipal Water Authority is invalid because Starr County was not represented.

\* Conservation and reclamation districts are not authorized to contract with other local governments to fire protection except under limited conditions.

\* The multi-colored feral pigeon is a variety of wild pigeon.

\* No law authorizes withdrawal of a portion of legal recovery by a minor or the interest fee from it to support the child or for other purpose.

The Governor has signed into law bills providing for optional personal injury auto insurance up to \$2,500 per person and permitting right turns on red traffic signals.

An omnibus drug bill which includes a provision lowering the first offense of marijuana penalty to a misdemeanor received House Criminal Jurisprudence Committee approval.
