

FOOTBALL

Although football is considered an excellent "character builder" for youths, it can result in bodily impairment if a boy is not in good physical condition. Secure a medical clearance from your doctor before allowing your child to engage in this rough contact sport. Also, make certain he has the necessary equipment—helmet, shoulder, hip, thigh, and knee pads, and shoes—to afford maximum protection. Boys engaging in this sport should play in groups of similar size and age.

HICCUPS

Practically everyone experiences an attack of hiccups at one time or another. While ordinary hiccups are not considered a medical problem and usually subside of their own accord, you may obtain faster relief with such remedies as sipping water, breathing deeply, holding your breath, or deep exhaling and inhaling into a paper bag. If hiccups persist for protracted periods of time, consult your physician.



SCHOOL SAFETY

Impress upon your child—especially smaller children—the importance of observing all safety precautions during the school year. Parents should instruct their children on the proper crossing of streets and intersections. Crossing guards are stationed there for the child's protection and should be obeyed. Other safety reminders should cover proper deportment on the school bus and the rules of bicycle safety.

APPLICATIONS STILL BEING TAKEN FOR APPOINTMENTS TO SERVICE ACADEMIES

New applicants for the Army, Air Force and Navy academies still have time to take the Civil Service exams scheduled for early October and November, according to Congressman Bob Price.

Price said that vacancies exist in the classes beginning in June, 1969 for West Point, Annapolis, Air Force and Merchant Marine. Exams are scheduled in Amarillo and other Panhandle communities on October 5 and November 9. "Those nominated as a result of the Civil Service exams will then compete in a battery of tests given by the services," Price said. In addition to the principals selected in this basis for each vacancy, many of the alternates who qualify will also be selected by the services for other vacancies, Price added.

APPOINTMENT OF COUNTY COMMITTEEMEN ANNOUNCED

John Francis of Silvertown has been appointed to the three man Briscoe County Farmers Home Administration Committee, it has been announced today by Don Cruce, County Supervisor. The appointment is for a three year term beginning July 1, 1968.


Mr. Francis succeeds Beryl Long and will join the other two members of the committee, who are Wayne Whittington of Quitaque, and Norman Strange of Silvertown. The three-member committee serves in an advisory capacity to the County Supervisor and makes determinations as to eligibility for loan advances for the Agency. They are also frequently called upon by the County Supervisor to render assistance in the servicing of loans and the development of other services.

The Farmers Home Administration does not compete with private lenders in the field of agricultural credit; however, they supplement such sources of credit and make loans on a long-range basis for the development of farms and ranches as well as improvement of community facilities, and provide

housing for the rural residents. One of the most important programs is the family-type loan to young farmers in ever-increasing numbers throughout the State. Recent authorizations have been given the Agency to make loans for recreation facilities for rural residents as well as financing multiple housing for senior citizens and labor housing associations.

Other of the more extensive loan programs includes that of making loans for small towns and communities for the establishment or improvement of water and waste disposal systems. Farmers and cattlemen are acquiring needed land resources by forming grazing associations and obtaining financial assistance from the Farmers Home Administration.
