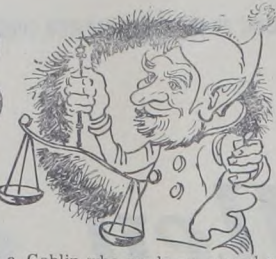

Lebkuchen Rounds Are Favorite

| 1 cup honey | 1/2 teaspoon soda |
| 3/4 cup brown sugar | 1/2 teaspoon allspice |
| 1 beaten egg | 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg |
| 1 tablespoon lemon juice | 1 teaspoon cinnamon |
| 1 teaspoon grated lemon peel | 1/2 teaspoon cloves |
| 2 1/4 cups sifted flour | 1/3 cup chopped citron |
| 1/3 cup chopped almonds, whole | |

Bring honey to boil, then cool. Add brown sugar, egg, lemon peel and juice. Sift flour with soda and spices and stir into honey mixture. Add chopped citron and almonds. Store overnight in refrigerator. Roll out to one half inch thickness; cut into 4-inch rounds. Decorate with blanched almonds arranged as petals of a daisy with a round piece of citron or angelica for the center. Bake at 400 degrees about fifteen minutes. Brush with glazing icing—confectioners' sugar and water—immediately after taking from oven.

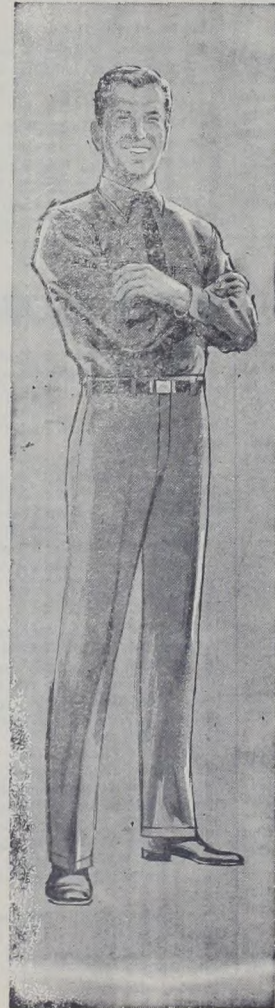

For thousands of men and women serving overseas in the armed forces, Christmas will have to come in the form of a package from home.

"Space Available Mail", or SAM for short, is airmail service provided by the Post Office Department for "surface prepaid mail addressed to, from or between overseas military personnel." There are four categories of SAM: First-class letter mail; sound-recorded personal correspondence; newspapers and periodicals addressed to combat zone only (Vietnam and contiguous waters); and parcels (including those with a letter attached) weighing no more than 5 pounds and measuring no more than 60 inches, combined length and girth.

In mailing packages overseas, there are some prohibitions worth noting. It is against regulations to send cof-

fee, tobacco and currency to some destinations, so either don't include these items or check with the Post Office. In fact, it's a good idea to check with postal authorities whatever the destinations of your package. Nothing perishable should be sent, of course.

For packing the Post Office strongly recommends a double corrugated box, the kind you may get from a grocery store. Pack the box solidly, then stuff popped corn, shredded paper or excelsior between items. Use heavy brown wrapping paper on the outside and tie with strong cord, whether or not you have used tape. If you wish to use the SAM service, you must take your package to the Post Office to be stamped.
