New Law Pertains To School Buses

A new State law, effective August 30, will no longer permit Texas motorists to stop and then pass a school bus which is loading or unloading children.

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said the new law, passed by the 62nd Legislature, applies in both cities and rural areas and requires motorists moving both directions on the same roadway with a school bus to stop and REMAIN STOPPED as long as the flashing lights on the bus are in operation.

Under current law, which applies only in rural areas, drivers must stop for a stopped school bus, but may then proceed around it at a speed of not more than 10 miles per hour if safe to do so.

The new law will not require those vehicles on another roadway of a divided highway to stop, and stops are not required if the bus has stopped in a loading zone of a controlled access highway where pedestrians are not permitted to cross.

Speir noted that provisions of the new law will be strictly enforced to afford maximum protection to the school children of Texas.

President's Action Will Help Farmers, Says Clifford Hardin

WASHINGTON, August 16 — "American farmers stand to benefit from the actions announced by the President to combat inflation, to spur the competitiveness of the U. S. economy, and to improve our foreign trade and monetary position," Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin said tonight.

"Farmers will benefit by the actions taken to fight inflation. The cost-price squeeze is the number one problem facing American farmers. Therefore, we strongly welcome the actions taken.

"Secondly, the steps announced to spur investment in equipment and to reduce taxes are designed to bolster our own domestic economy and make jobs. These will provide stronger markets for our own producers.

"Finally, the action taken to impose a temporary surcharge on imports and the withdrawal of gold support from the dollar are comparable to what other countries have done in similar balance-of-payments situations and, as anyone concerned with agriculture knows, the use of variable levies by some countries to protect agriculture systems constitutes permanent border protection which should be of far greater concern to the world than temporary surcharges.

"I hope that as our friends abroad digest this series of actions they will recognize that the President is saying that all of us need to find better solutions to our trade and international monetary problems. Obviously, American agriculture could make a much stronger contribution than it already has to our balance-of-payments problem if other countries of the world would admit more of our farm goods."


