Dreamland Improvement Pride Of Turkey Citizens

Dreamland Cemetery at Turkey has received quite a facelift over the past two or three years. A lot of hard work has certainly paid off for the citizens of Turkey.

The cemetery, located two miles south of town, had taken on the look of a deserted, sandy, windblown cemetery with some tombstones buried under more than three feet of sand, blown from a nearby cotton field. Dead trees and damaged shrubbery added to the rubble look.

A Fence Fund had been the dream of some of the community for several years, but always put on the back burner until a later date. Not until it was realized just how much revenue the 1986 Texas Sesquicentennial Wagon Train would bring in to each city and town on its route, did the idea of a Cemetery Fence Fund resurface, this time with a real possibility. After much discussion, the Sesquicentennial Committee of Turkey elected to go with it. At last, the Fence Fund was a reality. It took top priority over all other suggested projects.

That was the easy part for the citizens of Turkey, then the back breaking work began. A major clean up, dig up, fix up campaign was under way. Saturdays were work days for a lot of dedicated people. Dirt movers were busy, lawn mowers roared, garden tools were being hauled to the cemetery, chain saws were buzzing, tree stumps being pulled out of the ground, trees trimmed, until finally, it began to take shape.

With the sale of Wagon Train souvenirs, cookbooks,

quilt raffles, memorials, game nights, meals, and the like, a total of \$16,885 (after expenses) was raised to spend on regaining the dignity of Dreamland.

Windbreaker trees were planted around the west side (the old part) and along the south side of the new part across the road. Cinder blocks were purchased to begin work on the fence. It was decided to start on the west side, because it was in more dire need of immediate attention.

Citizens were very interested in the remodeling of their cemetery, as graves were being re-surfaced, head stones uncovered, unmarked sites were once again marked for identification. What once looked like a deserted, forgotten cemetery took on the look of a well manicured restful garden. Pride was restored in the community. They had done it!

The cost to fence the west side of Dreamland was \$16,250. The remaining cinder blocks are being stored until more funds can be raised or donated to complete the east side of the cemetery fencing and possibly the land adjoining that was recently acquired by the Cemetery Association for future development.

On any given day, workers can be seen at Dreamland. Such as last Friday, when the Wallace Monument crew headed up by Lewis Eudy, were working on updating a gravesite of a long distant relative. When word spread of the work being done here, we began to receive calls from relatives of loved ones buried here, wanting us to do repair work, or set new monuments,

or maybe they'll want a curb around the site. That's what we do. They can't do the work, so they call us. I'm proud to see the interest in our cemetery," said Eudy, "Look around, it's nice, isn't it?"

The Fence Fund for Turkey Dreamland Cemetery continues at the Turkey Branch of the Memphis State Bank in Turkey, and the

chairman of the committee remains to be Mrs. Marjorie Bell. A lot of work remains to be done, but the cemetery is much nicer now, thanks to the dreams and efforts of a few citizens that refused to give up on an idea.

A work day has been scheduled for this Saturday, April 15, 1989. All workers are urged to bring their garden tools.

Amy introduced the 1989

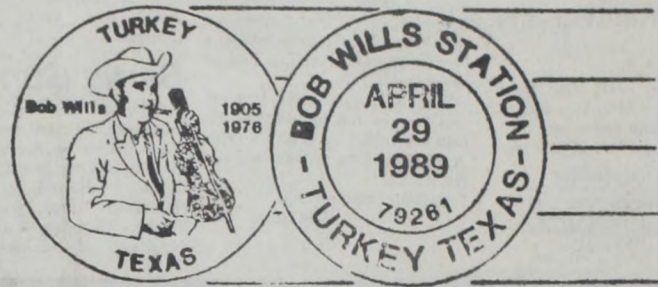
Cemetery Work Day Set In Quitaque

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Briscoe County Extension News

The Briscoe County Extension Ag Industries Committee is sponsoring a meeting Thursday, April 20 at 7:30 p.m. in the Pioneer Room of First State Bank in Silverton. All Briscoe County farmers and ranchers are welcome to attend. The County Wildlife Handbook will be updated. Anyone not listed in the current handbook that would like to be are urged to attend. All persons that are currently listed are urged to attend to help restructure the handbook. Funds for the handbook will also be discussed. The handbook is excellent publicity for your hunting leases and for Briscoe County. All interested persons are welcome. For more information contact Curtis Preston at the County Extension Office.

The alfalfa weevil has only one generation per year and is usually only a pest of first cutting, said Preston.

After the larvae finish feeding, usually by mid May in our area, the larva spins a net-like cocoon on the plant or in the soil debris. The adult weevil emerges from this cocoon and leaves the field. The weevils stay out of the alfalfa fields all summer and re-enter them in the fall. The adults overwinter in the field and the cycle then repeats itself.

Since the larvae are a pest of first cutting, it is sometimes possible to cut a little earlier than usual and avoid chemical treatments. Cutting results in exposure and a lack of foot which kills many of the remaining larvae. Winter grazing by livestock helps reduce weevil populations.

April is a critical time for alfalfa producers on the South Plains, cautions Curtis Preston, Briscoe County Extension agent for agriculture.

This is the time when producers need to examine their alfalfa for the presence of alfalfa weevil larvae, Preston said.

With the beginning of warm spring weather, overwintering female weevils begin laying eggs. The young larvae which hatch out are very small, yellow-green in color and feed in the growing tips and developing buds. Older larvae are green with a white stripe down their back.

"We expect to have our peak alfalfa weevil activity in April in our area," said Preston. If larvae numbers are high enough to reach the economic threshold, one properly timed application should give control. Treatments should be applied in alfalfa 2 to 6 inches tall when populations average one larva per stem or when 30 to 40 percent of the plant terminals show weevil feeding damage. Taller plants 7 to 14 inches tall should be treated when larvae average 1.5 per stem or when 25 to 30 percent of the terminals are damaged. Several effective insecticides are registered for alfalfa weevil control.

Traffic Fatalities Increase In '88

For the first time since 1984, Texas experienced an increase in traffic fatalities in 1988.

The traffic death toll in Texas for 1988 was 3,395, an increase of 4.1 percent from the 3,261 deaths recorded in the state in 1987, according to DPS Director Col. Joe E. Milner.

The DPS director said that 40 percent of all traffic fatalities in 1988 were alcohol or drug related.

"We know that 1,363 persons lost their lives last year in accidents caused by alcohol or drug abuse," Milner said. "Unfortunately, this represents an increase from the previous year."

Waylon To Unveil Mammoth Exhibit

Wayland Baptist University's Museum of the Llano Estacado will formerly unveil its Imperial Mammoth exhibit on Friday evening, April 14, 1989, it was announced.

The ceremony is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. on the exhibit floor of the museum, located at Eighth and Smythe Streets on Wayland campus.

The exhibit centers around the two-ton skull and tusks of a prehistoric elephant unearthed last May by archaeologists near the Castro County community of Easter, about 60 miles northwest of Plainview.

A reception, sponsored by the Plainview Cultural Arts Council, will follow the ceremony, and all activities are open to the public.

"The death toll on rural interstate highways, in both 65 and 55 mile an hour zones, jumped by 20 percent. One of the primary reasons for this may well be the higher speed limit that now applies to rural interstates."

A third contributing factor to the fatality increase is the failure of motorists to use safety belts.

"Last year, 76.3 percent of persons killed in the front seat of cars or light trucks were reported as not wearing safety belts," Milner said. "This is an increase from 1987, when 75.3 percent of the fatalities were not reported as belted."

Texas has had a seat belt law since Sept. 1, 1984, Milner said, but the most recent statewide survey indicates only 60.6 percent of Texas motorists are using their belts.

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

Farmers and farm workers should be sure to note the rules that cover farm wages for social security purposes. The rules determine how workers earn social security protection for themselves and their families.

Farm workers get credit for work for an employer who spends \$2,500 or more a year for agricultural labor, regardless of the amount of wages earned or how many days they worked.

A recent exception to this rule provides that if a person works as a seasonal hand harvest laborer commuting to work daily from home, and is paid on a piece rate basis, the work is ONLY covered if cash wages amount to at least \$150, regardless of the amount of total farm wages the employer pays.

In all other cases, if an employer spends less than \$2,500 a year on agricultural labor, the worker is still covered if paid at least \$150 in wages during the year.

The reporting of farm wages is important to the financial security of farm workers. The coverage can mean benefits to a worker and his family when a worker retires, dies, or becomes disabled. Although the benefits are intended to be a base and not total income, for many low income workers social security becomes the main source of income in retirement, or if they become disabled, or to their families should they die.

The farmer is responsible for keeping a record of wages paid, deducting the taxes owed, reporting the wages to the Social Security Administration the taxes that are due. Failure to do so can result in a penalty.

When the farmer hires farm crew workers, the crew leader

may be the "employer." This is true if there is a written agreement, or the crew leader pays the workers. If the farmer pays the workers, whoever has the final right to control the workers on the job is the employer.

Farm workers who wish to check to make sure their earnings have been reported may contact any social security office. The office will send them a Form 7004

with which they can request a "Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement." The statement will indicate the earnings credited to their record and the benefits payable at retirement, or if they become disabled, or to their family should they die.

Effects Of Strychnine Stressed In Matadors

The threat of a real disaster remains in Matador, as the investigation of the dog poisonings continues. Although the exact number of animals that have died is not known, since some dogs are strays, the count is above sixty.

Investigators have concluded that strychnine is being put on/in weiners, and thrown randomly to dogs, some in pickups, some in fenced yards.

The threat of a small child picking up a weiner and eating it is getting more and more frightening to citizens, so much so, they have had several town meetings on the subject.

Several specialists have attended some of the meetings to relate the dangers of the poison, what to

do if you suspect poisoning, how to dispose of the dead dogs, and to alert citizens NOT TO INDUCE VOMITING if one suspects their child has eaten it. Texas Rangers,

game warrdens, and other law officials are investigating the case, as well as local law officers. It has received air attention of a Lubbock television station

and has been featured in the Lubbock newspaper as well other surrounding newspapers. Yet the case goes unsolved, and as yet, no child has been injured.

A reward of over \$2750 has been pledged for the arrest and conviction of the person responsible. Anyone with information in the case is asked to please contact the Matador law office.

Future Homemakers Busy Bunch of Young Ladies

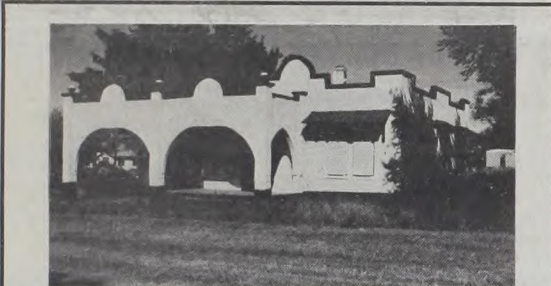

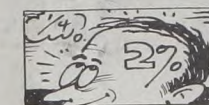
Here's an eye-opening look at the past and present of places to sleep.
