The Baird Star has been sold to day, S. W. Adams of Tyler by Eliza and Haynie Gilliland, the sale being closed Saturday afternoon and Mr. Adams took charge of the paper

The Baird Star was established by the late W. E. Gilliland, father of Eliza and Haynie Gilliland, on Dec. 8, 1887-56 years ago. Mr. Gilliland who had printed a little paper The Tecumseh Banner at Tecumseh for some two years bought the Callahan County Clarendon from Howard Allen on Nev. 28, 1887. The Clarendon, the first newspaper to be published in Callahan county, was established at Belle Plain, then the county seat of Callahan county, on Nov. 15, 1879 and was moved to Baird in 1883 when the county seat was moved here.

Mr. Adams has rented the J. N. Tyson residence in west Baird and Mrs. Adams, who is now with their daughter, Mrs. Glend Evans and family in Austin, will join him here about the first of the new year. Mr. and Mrs. Adams, also have a son, Lieutenant Mark Adams with the Naval Air Forces in the South Pacific.
