

A June 6 wedding is planned in mosquitoes start breeding. So take an inventory of your property. Walk around outside of the house and take a good look. What do you see? Did you notice whether the gutters were level and not saging? Mosquitoes like to breed in the water that collects in sagging or stopped-up gutters. Just a few minutes time on your part will eliminate this house.

How many bottles, cans, tires, or other water-holding containers are partially hidden under the shrubs? These provide more breeding places for mosquitoes.

You may be surprised to know that most people grow the mos-quitoes that bite them. Since most of the water - holding containers are valueless, again it is a simple matter to place them in the gar-

Should you have a container you want to keep, place it in a shed to it won't collect water.

Mosquitoes won't breed on your premise if you don't leave any wa-ter standing around. If there's a knothole in one of your trees, it can be plugged with cement mor-

If you have pets, develop a rou-tine of washing the watering bowl a couple of times a week. And while you are at it, you should clean the birdbath the same num-ber of times. This will also keep the growth of algae down and

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
