Valley Ready For Big Shootout Friday

The Valley High Patriots, winners over Happy 28-8 last Friday night at Happy, have been busy this week oiling up the big guns in preparation for the "big shootout" with district foe, the undefeated Motley County Matadors.

The Patriots drove to Happy last Friday night for an encounter with the Cowboys and head Patriot boss Rick Dill said that evidently the Patriots were looking ahead to this week for he thought they would never put it together enough to win; but win they did even though they did not look very impressive in doing so. The Patriots made 16 first

downs to the Cowboys' 4; Valley accumulated 387 total yards while holding the Cowboys to 87 total yards.

Darrell Dowd scored twice in the first period on runs of 82 and 25 yards and another in the third quarter on an eight yard run and also carried over for a 2-point conversion. Kenneth Helms scored a TD on a two yard plunge and Kenny Chandler caught a pass for a 2-point conversion. The Cowboys scored their only TD in the final period on a pass play and then made a 2-point conversion.

The Patriots, to keep their hopes alive for a shot at the Zone 2-B North championship, must win over the Matadors here Friday. The Matadors are undefeated thus far while Sudan and Valley each have lost one. Sudan defeated Valley 18-0 three weeks ago while Motley squeaked by Sudan 34-31 week before last at Sudan. Sudan dominated all the statistics with the exception of the final score. The teams each scored five TDs but Sudan made only one extra point while the Matadors only missed one point after.

Comparing scores of teams Valley and Motley have each played, it would appear that Valley might be a bit tougher on defense than the Matadors for Sudan scored three times against Valley and only had to really work for one TD, while the Hornets scored five times against Motley. Statistics, however, are not usually a very reliable measuring stick and it all boils down to the fact that a team must put more points on the scoreboard. The Patriots have proven all season long that they get after their opponents on defense and are very stingy when the opponents get near their goal line. On the other hand the Patriots have also proven that Valley has a scoring team that takes a back seat to no one. The backfield, composed of quarterback Kirk Proctor, Randy Woods, Kenneth Helms and Darrell Dowd, is capable of breaking for the long one on any play. Darrell Dowd is the 10th leading scorer in the state of Texas, having crossed into paydirt for 15 TDs from all over the field. Darrell had one 99 yard scamper called back because of a penalty. In seven games thus far he has run for more than 1200 yards. Kenneth Helms, the power runner in the backfield, is also capable of breaking the big one and has several long runs and TDs in his credit. Randy Woods is a good runner and bears watching. The coaches are very high on Randy as a blocking back and credit him with supplying the blocks to break the other backs loose on their runs. He is a very unselfish player and gives it his best both on offense and defense. Quarterback Proctor throws a good pass and, given

Highlower Disappointed Over ASCS Provision

Congressman Jack Hightower today expressed disappointment in a provision of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service regulation that prohibits grazing of diverted wheat acreage. The regulations were published Friday in the "Federal Register." The Congressman stated, "The financial pressure on producers mandates this land be grazed. The income derived from grazing and harvesting that 20 percent as compared to the income from deficiency payments on the 80 percent will push producers out of the program." Hightower went on to point out that if producers are not in the program they will not take any acres out of production and our price problem will continue.

"I hope every wheat farmer and cattleman concerned about this prohibition will write the Department of Agriculture before November 14 and explain why producers need this option," said Hightower. "I intend to again express to the Secretary the dire need for this provision." Comments on any section of the proposed regulations should be addressed to the Director, Production Adjustment Division, ASCS, P. O. Box 2415, Washington, D. C. 20013. The regulations will not go into effect until after this 30 day period. Hightower urged producers to talk to local ASCS offices for details on the proposed regulations.

TERRITORY ORDERED DETACHED FROM VALLEY SCHOOL DISTRICT

In recent action taken by the Board of Trustees of Hall County, Texas, a sizeable portion of land which is now a part of the Turkey-Quitaque Independent School District was detached and ordered to be annexed to the Estelline Independent School District. The action by the Board followed a petition presented by residents of the territory in question asking that 6.15 sections of land located in the Weatherly community be transferred from Turkey-Quitaque to become a part of Estelline ISD.

The petitioners earlier had requested that 21 sections of land located in the same area be transferred. Due to opposition by the Board of Trustees of the Turkey-Quitaque district the request was denied. The county trustees did indicate, however, that a request for a smaller amount would be considered more favorably if presented. The county trustees have statutory authority to either grant or deny petitioners' requests even though the district from which the land is being taken does not approve. Either party can appeal to the Commissioner of Education who has authority to uphold or reverse the earlier decision.

The territory in question, if approved, will add sufficient square miles to the Estelline district to make it a sparse area district. According to school finance laws, a sparse area district can receive additional state funds for the local school. Valley School is currently a sparse area district.

The Turkey-Quitaque district will lose approximately \$2700.00 revenue annually based on current tax records if the decision is allowed to stand.

The Turkey-Quitaque and Estelline school boards have met on two occasions in an attempt to resolve the differences but no agreement has been reached. The Turkey-Quitaque district has appealed to the Commissioner of Education for a reversal of the county boards' decision. A hearing will be held sometime in November.

LONG-TIME RURAL MAIL CARRIER RETIRES AFTER 26 YEARS SERVICE

Morris Wilson, who started his mail carrying job when he took over the Quitaque rural route on March 12, 1951, ended that career when he retired the last of September. Mr. Wilson carried the Quitaque Route until March 3, 1974, then the Post Office Department combined the Turkey

and Quitaque routes and he has served both communities. W. C. Womack was the carrier he succeeded at Quitaque.

A couple of years ago Mr. Wilson received two awards, the first a Safe Driver of the Month Award for driving 28,572 miles without an accident. Then he was made a member of the Million Miles Drivers Club and was given a Silver Medallion Issue, which contained \$35.00 worth of silver,

a very beautiful treasure. The mold for these medallions was destroyed after they were struck and they will be the only ones ever awarded to anyone.

Looking back down the years, Mr. Wilson says there are a lot of events that come to mind, many of them pleasant happenings, some that caused some anxious moments and there were a few that were downright hair-raising. Morris said that the first thing that came to mind, and the scarriest event that ever happened to him was in 1959 when he was driving past the Glyn Morrison farm and discovered Glyn trapped under his overturned tractor. Glyn had been trapped for quite some time but was still conscious. Morris could see no one to call for help, but knowing that he must try to help the victim, he went to work. He took the tractor jack and managed to lift the tractor

high enough that he was able to pull Glyn from underneath the tractor. The tractor had been resting on one of Glyn's legs. Mr. Wilson then attempted to help the victim into his mail vehicle, but Glyn became so ill he had to give up. At about this time Reg Cushenberry, driving a road maintainer for the county, came in to view, and Mr. Wilson hailed him and sent him to the nearby Murry Morrison farm to summon help. Mrs. Johnnie Morrison then summoned Bill Griffin and the ambulance. Slug Ramsey had driven along during the meantime and together, they were able to load Mr. Morrison when the ambulance arrived. He was taken to a hospital for treatment.

Not too long after that Mr. Wilson was again on his route when he spotted an overturned road maintainer in the ditch up ahead and once again Mr. Wilson envisioned a possible emergency for he saw no one around the maintainer. However, as he neared the vehicle, Richard Lanham, the operator of the maintainer, stepped out from behind it, unhurt, much to Morris' relief.

Another incident Mr. Wilson remembers was when Mrs. S. H. Kimbell came running across the pasture at their farm to hail Mr. Wilson and report that Mr. Kimbell was very seriously ill and she needed an ambulance. An ambulance was called by Mr. Wilson and Mr. Kimbell was rushed to the hospital. Mr. Kimbell survived and lived several years following that illness. Still another time on his route he came across a Mexican family whose baby had just drunk some kerosene and was very ill. Morris took the baby in his pickup to the H. B. Finney home and the Finneys then rushed the baby to a doctor where it received medical attention and survived.

Mr. Wilson remembers much stormy weather, one blizzard in particular when he became stuck in the snow near the D. J. Anderson farm. Morris went to the Anderson farm for help. D. J. took his pickup and went with Morris to pull the other vehicle out of the snow, only to become stuck himself. D. J. wound up having to go back home for his tractor to pull both of the vehicles out of the snowdrift.

He recalls at least three times when his vehicle quit while delivering the mail and the people on the route either carried him around the remainder of his route or loaned him their own vehicle. Those people were Mrs. Mary Clay, the Ike Reeds and the H. B. Finneys.

Another incident remembered by Mr. Wilson was the fact that Weldon Griffin repaired one tire 29 times before the tire was replaced. This reporter asked how in the world they knew that little gem and Mr. Wilson replied that they counted the patches! Mr. Wilson also said that John T. Reagan did the repair work on his vehicles to keep them running, and that Mr. Reagan spent a lot of time working overtime and at night getting the vehicle ready to go for the next day. Since Mr. Reagan retired, Weldon Hall has taken care of the vehicles.

Morris recalled that there are several still on the route who were there when he started carrying the mail. These include the J. A. Mayfields, the Tom Barbees,

Mrs. Ike Reed, the Vernon Cagles, the D. J. Andersons, Mrs. Mary Clay, Mr. and Mrs. Shorty Woods, Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Brummett, Mr. and Mrs. Bly Shannon and Lamb Dowd.

Mr. Wilson said that there was no way of knowing the amount of fruits, vegetables and other good things that have been given to the Wilsons down through the years and he assures everyone that all the gifts and kindnesses have been sincerely appreciated. He says that he could have continued working several more years but due to illness, in the family he decided to retire now.

Clyde Morrison had the misfortune to swallow a nail Thursday of last week while doing carpenter work. He was taken to Central Plains Hospital in Plainview where he was x-rayed and the

x-rays showed the nail to be lodged in his throat. He was transferred to Methodist Hospital and remained there two days. He was later x-rayed and the nail had entered the stomach, so he was permitted to return home. Mrs. Ethel Slover of Matador was in Turkey Monday for medical care.
