**EXTERNAL PARASITES LOWER PRODUCTION LEVEL**

External parasites of livestock and poultry are profit robbers. They lower the production of meat, milk and eggs by sucking blood from animals, transmitting diseases, and causing loss of energy from annoyance and a waste of feed.

They can be controlled, and their profit-grabbing greatly reduced through planned control programs.

Insecticides are of major importance in control programs. Livestock insecticides are formulated as wettable powders, emulsifiable concentrates, smears, dusts and

aerosoles. And, all insecticides are toxic to warm-blooded animals. They should always be handled according to label instructions.

Only the insecticide formulations prepared specifically for livestock should be used on livestock. Formulations for plant use should never be used on livestock. In order that livestock producers may have the latest available information on control methods with insecticides, MP-691, "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry" is available at the County Extension Office.

### GREENBUGS HAVE GROWN RAPIDLY IN FIELDS

Greenbugs have grown rapidly over many fields in Briscoe County during the last several days. Counts up to 5,000 greenbugs per foot of row have been seen in a few scattered spots, according to County Agent Ken Cook.

Some fields are almost clean and have few greenbugs while others are quite heavily infested.

Some spraying has been going on during the last two weeks and populations have been cut down as a result of the spraying. The need for chemical application is dependent on the number of greenbugs, your plant size, stage of growth, and moisture conditions. These factors should determine the feasibility of spraying. The application of Systox at one pint per acre or Parathion at one pint per acre is recommended.

Remember that you must wait 35 days before harvesting wheat after the application of Systox. Winter weeds are hurting some wheat in Briscoe County because of the plant sapping moisture otherwise available to the wheat plants. Most of the winter weeds have matured and are very difficult to kill with chemicals at the present time.
