Farm Bill Explanations Offered By the National Cotton Council

The National Cotton Council has scheduled additional meetings with cotton producers and other industry members in Texas and Oklahoma to explain key provisions of the 1990 Cotton Title.

Texas meetings scheduled are: January 14--Lubbock, Plains Cotton Cooperative Association Board Room, 2 p.m. and at Plainview, Agriculture Center, 2 p.m. on January 15.

"Even though the 1990 farm bill tracks the 1985 Food Security Act (farm law) very closely, there are enough new provisions and changes to warrant these

face-to-face meetings," said Council President Tommy Funk, a Harlingen, Texas producer.

For example, the 1990 farm bill freezes the target price level for cotton for 1991-95 at the current rate of 72.9 cents/pound, but calculations of deficiency payments and loan rates, as well as terms and conditions of the loan, remain unchanged. Council economists calculated the loan rate at 50.77 cents/pound.

Among topics to be addressed are planting flexibility, trade, competitiveness, conservation and the environment and the current economic situation.

Irrigation Conference Tackles Tough Issues Of Water And Chemical Use

Agricultural producers will hear about the political issues concerning irrigation water use as well as the newest irrigation technologies at the South Plains Irrigation and Water Management Conference and Trade Show on January 17.

The general session held in the morning will focus on the effects of federal and state policies on agricultural water and chemical use. Afternoon sessions will concern increasing efficiency of water use and farm profitability with appropriate irrigation techniques and practices.

The Conference and Trade Show will open at 9:00 a.m. at the Lubbock Plaza Hotel on the South Loop 289. Those planning to attend need to pre-register by January 15 to guarantee their lunch. The cost of the conference will be \$15 which

includes lunch. Pre-registration forms can be picked up at any county extension office, the Texas A&M University Re-

An afternoon session will consist of four professionals and several farmers discussing LEPA irrigation and chemigation with center pivots. A concurrent session will discuss irrigation technologies affecting farm profitability. This session will deal with other forms of irrigation such as surge irrigation and drip irrigation for field crops.
