COUNTY COMMITTEE MAY RULE ON FARM CONSERVING BASES

A producer whose farm conserving base is a limiting factor in operating his farm in line with good management practices may appeal for an adjustment of the base through the end of farm program sign-up, April 8.

Three important provisions will be observed by the ASC County Committees in adjusting conserving bases for changes in farming operations, according to Mr. Louie Kitchens, chairman, Briscoe County ASC Committee. They are:

—Downward adjustment of a conserving base will be made only upon a determination that farm operations have changed from conserving crops to nonconserving crops in recent years, or in the judgment of the county committee, such a change will be made this year.

—Acreage removed from the conserving base will be limited to that determined to be suitable for continuous cropping.

—Downward adjustment will not be made to accommodate a farm's required set-aside acreage under the 1971 farm programs.

Basically, the rules on conserving bases are being updated in line with modern farming operations. Today's market-oriented farm policy requires that farmers have more freedom for decision-making about their farm operations. The set-aside farm programs of 1971 provide for this by getting away from the rigid crop limitations of previous programs.

As for conserving bases, although adjustments have been made over the years for tangible changes in farm operations, in some instances conserving bases still tended to keep producers locked into types of farming operations that were no longer in their best interests.

Or they may have had to choose between staying out of farm programs or continuing an uneconomical farm operation.

For instance, a dairy farmer with 500 acres was following the recommended grass-silage feeding program when his conserving base was established. So his conserving base was on this basis. Since that time he has determined that grain silage would be the most efficient feed for his herd, and he has been growing corn. But he couldn't participate in the feed grain program because he didn't maintain his conserving base. Now his county ASC committee can adjust his farm's conserving base in line with his actual farm operations, if the farmer asks for a downward adjustment.

Mr. Kitchens emphasized that adjustments cannot be made to accommodate set-aside acres. By that, we mean producers cannot be given an adjustment in their conserving base simply to make up for the land they must set aside in order to participate in the 1971 farm programs. The county committee will review the entire farm operation on the basis of intended cropping.

He also emphasized that conserving acreage which is recommended only for conserving uses, such as grass cover, must remain the conserving base. No authority is given for making an adjustment that will result in a conserving base of less than the acreage recommended for conserving uses.

Naturally, it is not known how many adjustments will be requested and granted locally, nor for how much acreage, but U. S. Department of Agriculture officials feel that conserving base adjustments on a national scale will not be of major consequence. For individual farmers involved, of course, it could be quite important.

WELDING SHORT COURSE SCHEDULED FOR TURKEY

A farm welding short course for adult farmers will be held May 24, 25, 26, 27, 1971 under the Turkey High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Loran Denton, Superintendent, and Jay L. Eudy, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Joel R. Barton, welding specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Department, will do the instruction in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Barton is a native of Glasscock County, Texas, and was reared on a West Texas ranch. He attended grade school at San Angelo and graduated from high school at Big Lake, Texas. He holds a B. S. degree in Animal Science from Texas A&M after five years as a pilot in the U. S. Air Force. Mr. Barton served as an agricultural specialist in Texas state hospitals and special schools. In addition to regular classes, he set up farm shops and gave instruction in farm welding and general farm repair.

Mr. Barton joined the Agricultural Education Adult Specialist Program as Arc Welding Specialist in October, 1969. He has attended Hobart's Welding School for instructors in Troy, Ohio, and a special school on hard-facing conducted by Industry personnel from Whittier, Calif.

"Many welding courses in various parts of the state have been taught" by Mr. Barton and all have met with outstanding success," according to Walter Labav, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, of Plainview. Arrangements for the adult education short course in welding and in other fields are made through Mr. Labav's office.

The short course at Turkey High School is scheduled to begin May 24 at 7:30 p. m. in the vocational agriculture building. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Barton will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Jay Eudy.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Loran Denton, or vocational agriculture teacher, Jay Eudy. An entry fee of \$5.00 will be charged. Farm Welding Short Course Certificates will be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Barton states that the short course will be adjusted to the wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety in welding, factors controlled by the operation in running a head and striking an arc, types of electrodes, preparation of joints, distortion, cutting, hardsurfacing, and pipe welding.

"Short courses in yielding, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under a cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University, who coordinate Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University, who coordinates the program for Texas A&M.

"This cooperative program," states Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

FARMERS UNION PRESIDENT SPOKE AT TURKEY MONDAY

Farmers and businessmen from Hall, Briscoe and Motley Counties heard Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco describe the Administration of the new farm program as a "nightmare of regulatory blunders" in a speech made at Turkey Monday night. Naman was the principal speaker at a dinner sponsored by the Turkey Local of the Hall County Farmers Union at the school cafeteria.

The Texas farm leader said, "USDA decisions concerning physical requirements for set-aside, transfer of cotton acreage, projected yield, net weight trading, penalty on late planted cotton, and CCC cotton sales policy, indicates what happens when administrative officials are called upon to make an unworkable farm program work. The people in USDA are floundering in a maze of administrative decisions. In an effort to administratively bring about supply management and move the production of various crops from one producing area to another, the pencil-pushers in Washington are imposing unworkable regulations on harassed farmers."

USDA's administration of the farm program is a nightmare of administrative blunders. The resulting hostility of farmers indicates that they recognize an intent on the part of the policymakers to destroy farm programs by over-administering them," Naman said.

Naman cited the recent demonstration on the floor of the House of Representatives in Washington as an

indication that a new farm bloc is being formed.

He said, "The series of 'First Monday Farm Days' that will be used by congressmen to dramatize the critical economic situation in agriculture indicates the bipartisan support in Congress for improved farm programs. Several Texas congressmen participated in the first of this series, and others have announced their intention to be heard during future sessions. This partisan and spontaneous protest against low farm prices could be the beginning of a better day for farmers."

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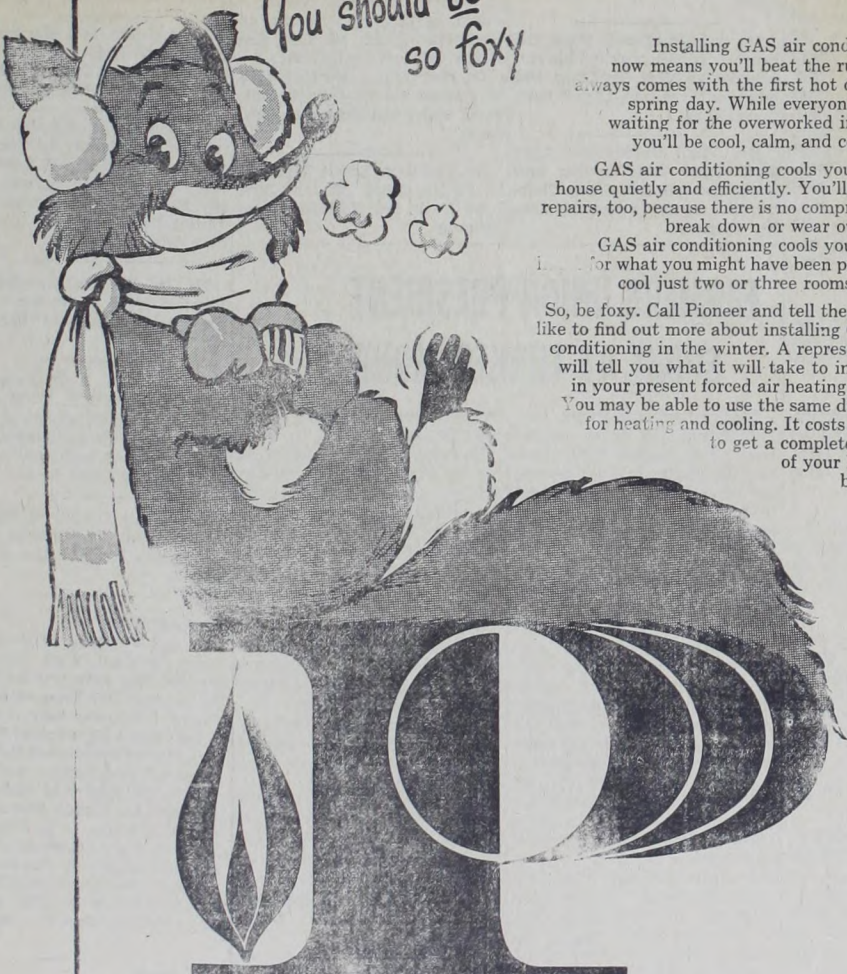

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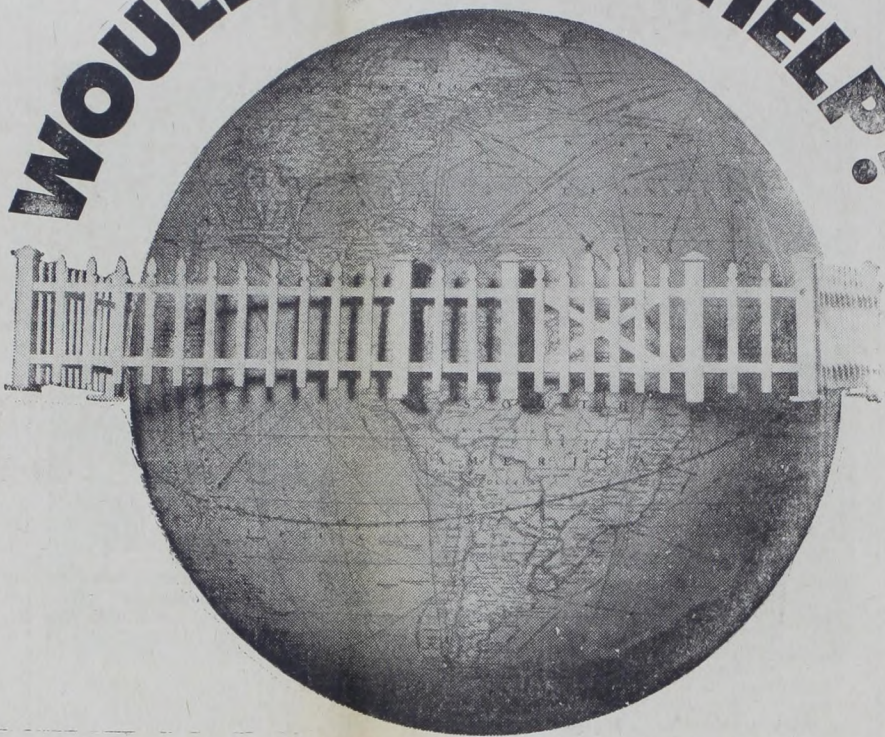

Shirttail Sermon

"He heard the sound of the trumpet and took no warning: his blood shall be upon him." Ezekiel 33:5

Here is a definite warning to all unsaved men. When in time of war an army is attacked and destroyed while they sleep and are unwarned, we would weep in deep sorrow. But if they had posted sentinels and those sentinels issued a loud, clear warning of danger and were ignored, we would sorrow but admit that they had invited disaster. So it is with unsaved men: if they have never

been warned, they are the victims of carelessness at the most. But if they have been warned and the warning was ignored, then we must say that they were at fault and no one else. Their blood will be upon them.

Almost without exception, every man has been warned of the consequences of sin and neglect of the Gospel. Many have heard and have prepared themselves to stand at the Judgment Bar, but many have heard and failed to heed the warning. They will have no defense and no mediator at the judgment. Their blood will be on their heads.

No one can plead that he did not understand the warning for it is plain in every respect. In a land where one language is universal, no man can misunderstand the warning of coming destruction. Many will try to make excuses for their neglect. Some will say that they did not believe that preparation was necessary. You know full well that there is a life after this life and that that life will be determined by the preparation

that you have made. Others may plead that they did not like the gospel that was preached to them. No one asks you to like it, only to heed it. Possibly it was harshly and loudly proclaimed, but it was proclaimed. It was a warning, not a lover's call.

Heed that warning, my friend, before it is too late.

MANY ATTEND WITNESS CONVENTION

Hundreds of Jehovah's Witnesses from this area who spent weekend before-last in Wichita Falls heard the answer to the question "What Is Behind the Spirit of Rebellion?"

1086 were on hand in the Hirschi High School auditorium to hear the main speaker for a 3-day convention remind the audience that rebellion consists in the home of

youths against parents, wives against husbands and then on a broader score, against school authorities as well as there being rebellion against police and government policies.

"Why these conditions?" Dugan asked. "Adam and Eve were the first human rebels, that were created perfect 5,995 year ago, and they willfully rebelled against one small stipulation. There was a rebel before them, however, a superior creature, a rebel angel identified in the Bible as Satan, the Devil."

Commenting on the results of such rebellion, Dugan stated that the first human pair were ousted from their paradise home and thus began to experience thorns, unhappiness and death. "Their first born son, Cain, was a rebellious murderer, after rebelling against the direct counsel from God," Dugan said.

"So today the modern rebels tend to justify their actions as did our first parents. Today's rebels feel justified. The Vietnam war, parental hypocrisy of saying one thing, then doing another, thus showing disrespect for the laws. They cheat on income tax as well as lying and cheating and stealing in the name of good business," Dugan continued. "They may go to church, yet their daily lives are unchristian."
