



This seems like this time of year when there are so many events going on- and many of them require you to bring something to eat. I tried two new cake recipes this week, and both are easy to make and delicious. Try one for your next event-but I hope you are in the mood for chocolate! Chocolate Coke Cake was sent in by B.J. Griffin, who also included these words of wisdom: "Families are like fudge, sweet with a few nuts." Here is her recipe. CHOCOLATE COKE CAKE Sift together: 2 cups sugar This seems like this time of year







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Senate Give Farm Bill OK; Now It's The Administration's Turn

One step at a time, that's how the Farm Security and Rural Invest-ment Act of 2002 (FSRI) has slowly gotten within sight of the President's desk and a final signature to make it law. The process has at times been unbearably painful. The two day Sen-

ate debate on the FSRI Conference Report brought much of that pain back into focus as opponents of the Bill stood one after another to rail against the legislation without offering a truly substantive alternative to solving agriculture's problems.

Unfortunately, most of these opponents of the Bill decided to base their arguments on a repetitive set of "facts" that were presented out of context in either a deliberate effort to muddy the debate or through an equally irresponsible lack of investigation.

Despite these last ditch efforts by organizations like the Environmen-tal Working Group and others, the measure passed the Senate on a strong 65-34 vote. Now the focus shifts to the White House and President George 65-34 vote. Now the focus smits to the white House and President George W. Bush's pledge to sign the law once it gets to his desk. Current infor-mation has the signing ceremony set for Monday, May 13. The President's signature will fully set in motion the already shifting tide of implementation. United States Department of Agriculture offi-

cials have been working proactively to develop implementation procedures for these provisions that have long appeared to be destined for final inclusion and the Bill.

State and Country Farm Service Agency offices are already gathering the available files to determine what additional information, if any , will be needed to help producers make decisions on updating bases and payment yields.

Other features of the Bill will require the dusting off and updating of rules governing delivery of direct and counter -cyclical program payments. Work is also underway to utilize the additional funding allotted for

conservation programs like the Environmental Quality Incentives Program $({\rm EQIP})$ in the Bill.

Two new provisions that will not see implementation until 2003 are the Conservation Security Program and the Adjusted Gross Income Pay-

ment eligibility cap. One new set of statistics that growers should get used to keeping up with is the Average Price Received by Growers for program crops. Pub-lished monthly, the Average Price Received by Growers will provide the monthly marketings and average price received for each program commodity.

The resulting 12 month (marketing year) weighted average price will then be used to determine the availability of counter -cyclical payments under the Bill. These numbers will also be used in the calculation of the final CC payment rate.

For cotton the marketing year will begin August 1 of the year the crop is harvested and end July 31 of the following year . For the 2002 crop the Counter-cyclical payment rate will be determined using the August 1, 2002 through July 31, 2003 marketing year .

May Is Water Month In Texas

Many Texans are realizing the importance of conserving water as our population grows and demand increases during the sweltering Texas summer.

Governor Rick Perry and the Texas Water Foundation have declared the month of May as "Water Month" in Texas. During the month of May, Texans are urged to learn more about making a difference through protecting and conserving water

Governor Perry said that he had "designated the month of May for an awareness campaign to remind Texans that the responsibility lies within each of us to be wise stewards of our water resources.

One agency active in water conservation and preservation in Texas in the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board (TSSWCB) headquartered in Temple. The TSSWCB promotes wise and productive use of the state's soil and water resources through cooperation with Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCD's), landowners, and state legislature.

There are 216 SWCD's in Texas, and each is governed by a five member board of directors elected by landowners in the district. Each SWCD is designed to deliver local conservation programs that best conserves and promotes the wise use of renewable natural resources

Not only does the TSSWCB coordinate programs with SWCD's by providing technical and financial assistance to improve soil and water quality, they are also responsible for implementing constitutional provisions and state water quality rules and regulations.

The State Brush Control Program develops and implements resource management plans to increase the available supply of water in areas impacted by Brush.

The Statewide Management Program assists in the protection of water quality from nonpoint source pollution and administers funds from the Clean Water Act Section 319 Grant Program.

The Total Maximum Daily Load Program works closely with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC), local SWCD's and other entities to identify water bodies that do not meet state water quality standards for their use and then decided the maximum amount of pollutants that the body of water can receive on a daily basis without seriously harming its benefi-

Lastly, the Coastal Nonpoint Source Pollution Control Program works closely with the Coastal Coordination Council to develop a federally approvable program to provide for the implementation of best management practices to control coastal pollution from an unidentifiable source

The TSSWCB is dedicated in its work to preserve renewable natural resources in Texas. During Water Month this May, The TSSWCB urges everyone to conserve today what we will needed tomorrow.

Heart Attack Signs Different For Women Than Men

Heart Disease Kills Ten Times As Many Women Every Year As Breast Cancer. Despite this fact, many women continue to think of heart disease as a condition of men and know little about the warning signs of a heart attack

Studies conclude that after the age of 55, women and men are at equal risk for a heart attack. But 38 percent of women who have heart attacks risk for a heart attack. But 35 percent of wonten who have heart attacks die within a year, compared with 25 percent of men. Part of the reason for this is that many women are not diagnosed or treated for a cardiovascu-lar disease before their attack. Women suffering heart attacks often do not experience the same symp-

Women suffering near attacks often do not experience the same symp-toms as men, such as chest pressure, pain shooting down the left arm, sweating, fainting, and light-headedness. Instead, women's signs include: unusual fatigue; unusual shortness of breath; nausea; dizziness; lower chest discomfort; back pain; pain spreading to shoulders, arm, neck and jaw; and indigestion or gas-like pain.
