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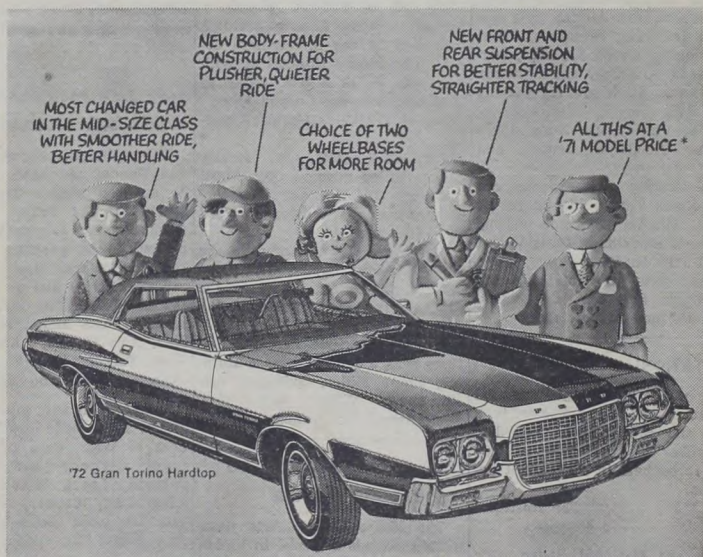
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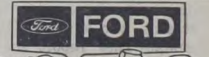

Charlie Payne, Principal, Silverton Junior High School, has been named to direct the activities for the 1972 Spelling Bee program in Briscoe County.

April 8, 1972 is the deadline for the event to be held in the county, and the winner named will be a participant in the 24th Regional event in Amarillo on April 29, 1972. The youngster who catapults to the top regional spot in Amarillo will be the lucky recipient of an all-expense trip to Washington, D. C. June 5-9, 1972, for himself and a parent. In the nation's capitol he'll compete for the 44th national title with other area winners from throughout the United States to Guam. The week's stay in Washington will be highlighted by various tours throughout the nation's most famous city.

Any boy or girl who has not reached his 16th birthday or passed beyond the eighth grade by June 1, 1972, is eligible to enter. The 1972 Golden Spread Bee will be co-sponsored by West Texas State University and the Amarillo Globe-News. L. J. (Jack) Edmondson, director of public services at the university, will be coordinator for the Golden Spread contest. This year's regional spelling-down is the 24th annual contest sponsored by the newspaper and WTSU, and 46 counties in the Texas Panhandle, Oklahoma, Kansas and New Mexico comprise the Golden Spread area.

In 1971, Jill Hutsell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Hutsell of Silverton represented Briscoe County in Amarillo, and placed seventh in a field of 46 county winners. She attended Silverton Junior High School, where she was in the eighth grade.

A secondary contest—the only one of its kind within the National Spelling Bee program sponsored by 59 leading daily and Sunday newspapers—will be open to youngsters from the sixth and lower grades. These youngsters will be guests at the Amarillo Globe-News Spellers' luncheon on April 29, 1972, but WILL NOT spell unless they represent both divisions. The Junior Briscoe County winner in 1971 was Susan Grabbe, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Warner Grabbe of Silverton.

At the Regional Bee, each county winner will receive a gold lapel pin and a plaque; each county junior champion will be awarded a trophy and silver pin. All contestants—both divisions—will receive entry ribbons and winner ribbons.

The National Spelling Bee, founded in 1925, has continued without interruption except for the World War years of 1943-44-45, and is administered by the Scripps-Howard newspapers.

The Texas Highway Commission remains convinced its new \$20 million state headquarters building should be located near the capitol and the governor's mansion.

A re-evaluation study of the controversial site, ordered by the Legislature, was delivered last week to Gov. Preston Smith.

Legislators suggested the site southwest of the capitol and across the street from the governor's mansion should be developed as a park, parking lot and tourist information center. They recommended moving the new highway building far from the downtown Austin area.

The Commission, on review of its plans, concluded the massive building, rising to 10 stories at its tallest point, would "enhance the beauty and interest of the capitol complex."

At least, observed the new report, the structure will be most attractive thing ever located on the barren block, now given over largely to a parking lot and the remains of old buildings.

The historic Lundberg Bakery still on the site will be preserved, incorporated into the new building and used as a tourist center and Texana museum for artifacts uncovered in excavation. The temporary state capitol once stood on the block.

North and east portions of the highway building are planned at

two-story level to maintain scale with the governor's mansion and preserve the view of the capitol from there. Maximum height of 10 stories will be reached at the south edge of the block.

Architects plan a public plaza with pools, greenery and shaded walkways along 11th St. nearest the capitol. Landscaping will comprise about 50 per cent of the block if plans are finally approved. The building will be by far the largest of many new state structures in the capitol area.

Business Gears For Political Year
Organized labor announced its political priorities three weeks ago, and last week in Houston business leaders in Texas looked at their "public affairs" program for 1972.

At the 49th annual Conference of Texas Industry by the Texas Manufacturers Association, representatives of the business community heard:

Sen. John Tower ask for labor law reform.

Richard Armstrong, Washington, D. C., challenge businesses to develop public affairs departments.

Irving Shapiro, vice president, E. I. duPont de Nemours and Co., ask business to work with labor to develop new national objectives—with everybody sharing the gains.

Senator Tower laid the blame on the nation's existing economic ills on "existing labor laws that are in dire need to reform."
