### SUTHERLAND WAS FEATURED SPEAKER AT CONVENTION

J. P. Sutherland, District Supervisor for Jehovah's Witnesses in Texas, was the featured speaker Sunday at the circuit convention of the group at the high school in Plainview, as he discoursed on the well-advertised topic, "Are You Marked for Survival?" according to Von D. Tiffin, local presiding minister.

Speaking to an audience of 1550 Sutherland said, "Survival is a matter of vital concern to all. When threatened with a disaster people will put forth much effort to ensure survival and continued happiness. If we can be warned of a disaster before it occurs, there is more chance for survival. On a world-wide scale, warning signs are up now. Leaders of nations express fear of a disaster on many fronts. The Bible gives a warning of even greater changes. If this warning is true, and if you are informed, it may mean the saving of your life and the life of your family." Sutherland then gave scriptural evidence of an early intervention by God into man's affairs to rid the earth of the wicked.

"Ezekiel's prophecy reveals that for survival, one must also become one of God's marked ones," Sutherland continued. "In actuality, the symbolic mark is the evidence, as if it were displayed on a person's uncovered forehead, that he is a dedicated, baptized disciple of Christ Jesus and has a Christ-like personality that differentiates him from all hypocritical Christians." The local Witnesses have now returned home and the schedule of meetings at the Kingdom Hall has been resumed as normally, according to Tiffin.
