Dear Aubrey: Since I can't afford a weekly, professional manicure, can you give me a few hints on doing my nails myself? Sincerely, B. D., Gullport, Miss.

Dear B. D.: A weekly manicure is a necessity to keep nails attractive. For a professional-looking manicure at home, follow these nine easy steps:

1. Working from the sides to center, file the nails in graceful ovals.
2. Soak hands in soapy water and scrub nails with a soft brush.
3. Dry hands and gently push back cuticles with an orange stick.
4. Clip any hangnails with cuticle scissors.
5. Massage hands with hand lotion.
6. Dip fingertips in warm water to remove the lotion, and thoroughly dry your hands.
7. Place your finger on Fashion Two Twenty's new Polish Palette, a pretty molded plastic finger rest with room to hold two bottles of polish. ## Combine Tuna and Pimiento For Treat



Tuna, pimiento, eggs and cheese make a savory and nutritious breakfast or brunch treat when served as a variation of an old favorite, Eggs Benedict. For lunch or supper, serve this entree with asparagus or broccoli.

### Tuna-Pimiento Eggs Benedict

- 2 cans (6 1/2 to 7 oz. each) flaked tuna, drained
- 1 jar or can (4 oz.) pimiento, drained and chopped
- 2 Tbs. chopped onion
- 1/4 cup mayonnaise
- 1/4 cup dairy sour cream
- 1/2 tsp. oregano leaves
- 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 4 English muffins, halved and toasted
- 8 eggs, poached
- 3 Tbs. butter or margarine
- 3 Tbs. flour
- 1/2 tsp. each: salt, dry mustard
- 1/2 tsp. white pepper
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 1 cup shredded Gouda cheese

Mix together tuna, 1/2 of the chopped pimiento, onion, mayonnaise, sour cream, oregano, Worcestershire and 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Place 1/2 mixture on each muffin half. Cook under broiler until tuna mixture is lightly browned and heated through. Meanwhile, melt butter in medium saucepan; stir in flour, salt, dry mustard and 1/2 teaspoon white pepper. Gradually stir in milk; cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until sauce thickens and boils 1 minute. Stir in cheese until melted; stir in remaining pimiento. Top each muffin half with a poached egg. Serve sauce over tuna muffins.

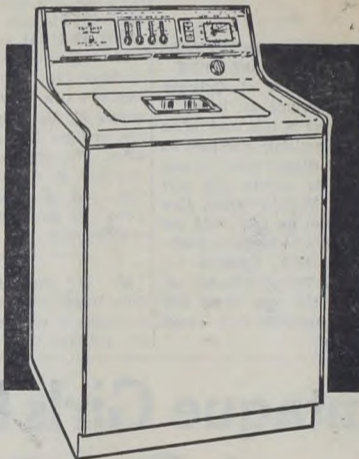

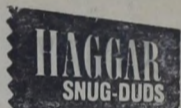
