AT QUITAKE BAPTIST

An old-fashioned outdoor revival is scheduled to begin Sunday at the First Baptist Church at Quitaque, Sunday, August 25 and will continue through the following Sunday, September 2.

LT. DANNY GRANT DECORATED FOR BRAVERY IN VIETNAM



First Lt. Danny R. Grant, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Grant of Lubbock, recently was awarded the Silver Star for his action in Vietnam.

In the absence of his company commander, Lt. Grant assumed command of B Co. and during Operation Pegasus when the 1st Cavalry realized the Marines of the Khe San base defense, his company was engaged by a large enemy force, and on April 5th, immediately before closing the Khe San base he distinguished himself in action and was decorated for his efforts.

He also has been awarded the National Defense Medal, Vietnamese Campaign Medal, Vietnamese service Medal, Combat Infantry Badge, Purple Heart, Air Medal and Bronze Star.

Lt. Grant is the grandson of Mrs. Sam Stone of Turkey and Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Grant of Olton.

He will be home in Lubbock on a 30 day leave before reporting to his assignment at Fort Polk, La.

QUITAKE FACULTY READY FOR SCHOOL

Lyles of Turkey as a Math teacher in the intermediate grades and he will also coach the boys in the high school that does not make the basketball team. A. B. will also teach Chemistry in high school provided there are enough students to justify the course being offered.

The other members of the 1968-69 teaching staff and assignments are as follows: Mrs. Novelle Wise, First grade; Mrs. Dora Hawkins, second grade; Mrs. Ina Mae Baird, third grade; Mrs. Mary Mann, fourth grade; Mrs. Ann Jones, fifth grade; Mr. Tommy Haralson, sixth grade; Dean Johnson, Elementary principal and Junior High school basketball coach for boys and girls. Mrs. Luella Moseley, Special Reading, Mrs. Betty Wise, Special Reading. There will be some departmental assignments in subjects in grades five through eight. A. B. Lyles will teach Math in Grades five through eight and Dean Johnson will teach the Science in grades five through eight. There will probably be some more subjects departmentalized in the upper grades.

In high school, Mr. George R. Colvin will serve as high school principal and teach Science and Health, Mr. Elmer Berryhill will teach Vocational Agriculture, Mrs. Frances Wise will teach Vocational Homemaking, Mrs. Betty Nan Tiffin, who is new to our school system, will teach English in all four grades and one new class of makeup English. This new class will make it possible for students who wish to do so, make up credit in English for graduation. Mrs. Jo Mae Merrell will teach Math and Business subjects and Mr. Frank Muir will serve as high school basketball coach and teach History and Government in high school and Junior high. Mr. Muir will also be serving as new teacher in the Quitaque system.

Mrs. Josephine Johnston is the Tax - Assessor collector for the school. Roy Smith will start another year as school custodian and Mrs. Faye Brummett and Mrs. Iva Barefield will operate the cafeteria. Johnny Brummett will service the buses and Tommy Haralson and Ralph Carter will serve as bus drivers. There will be only two bus routes operate this year. The route south of town will remain the same as last year and the route that serves the Gasoline community will combine with the route that operates north of town. SOCIAL SECURITY NOTES

A record \$31,100.00 was paid out in social security cash benefits to 416 residents of Briscoe County for February 1968, according to Travis C. Briggs, Social Security district manager.

"February was the first month in which increased benefit rates provided by the 1967 amendments to the Social Security Act were payable," Briggs noted.

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and children exceeded \$2 billion, 2.2 million receiving benefits were disabled workers under age 62 and their young dependents. About 3.4 million beneficiaries were young widowed mothers and their children. Briggs said that a total of about \$19 billion has been paid to orphaned children and their mothers since January 1940, when monthly survivors benefits first became payable.

Most of the changes in the 1967 amendments provided for protection for younger people. Children are now eligible for benefits based on the earnings of an insured mother who has died or is entitled to retirement or disability benefits. Previously, the mother needed to have worked for at least one and a half years in the last three before retirement, death or disability.

The amount of social security covered work required for payment of disability benefits to workers who become disabled before age 51 has been reduced substantially—for those below 24 to as little as a year and a half.

Widows of insured workers can get monthly benefits as early as

age 50 if they are unable to work because of severe disability which began not later than 7 years after the death of their husband or after the end of their entitlement to benefits as a widow with a child in her care.

In the county, 68 children of retired, deceased or disabled workers received \$4,096.00 for the month of February. These payments continue monthly until the child is 19 unless some terminating event occurs. If the child does not marry and continues school full time, the payments do not stop until age 22.

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR37)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52e to read as follows:

"Section 52e. Bonds to be issued by Dallas County under Section 52 of Article III of this Constitution for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, may, without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation, be issued upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall

have printed on them the following:

"FOR the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

"AGAINST the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR14)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 14 proposing an amendment to Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section 52a to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52a to read as follows:

"Section 52a. The Legislature shall have the power to authorize counties, cities, and towns to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes, or in aid thereof; provided, that property acquired from proceeds of the bonds shall be subject to ad valorem taxes. Legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature. The tax revenue, the utility revenue, and the revenue from services of any county, city or town may not be used to pay any

bonds issued pursuant to this authority nor the interest thereon."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-6 to read as follows:

"Section 1-6. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."

"2. The State ad valorem tax authorized by Article VII, Section 3, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974: On January 1, 1968, Thirty-five Cents (35¢); on January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (30¢); on January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (25¢); on January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (20¢); on January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (15¢); on January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (10¢); on January 1, 1974, Five Cents (5¢); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State.

"3. The State ad valorem tax of Two Cents (2¢) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation levied by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. At any time prior to December 31, 1976, the Legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and such Texas Rangers and their widows as are eligible for retirement or disability pensions under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 66, of this Constitution, and after such fund is established the ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, shall not thereafter be levied."

"4. Unless otherwise provided by the Legislature, after December 31, 1976 all delinquent State ad valorem taxes together with penalties and interest thereon, less lawful costs of collection, shall be used to secure bonds issued for permanent improvements in institutions of higher learning, as authorized by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution."

"5. The fees paid by the State for both assessing and collecting State ad valorem taxes shall not exceed two percent (2%) of the State taxes collected. This subsection shall be self-executing."

Sec. 2. That Article III, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public moneys to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient, and to their widows in indigent circumstances under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient; provided that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."

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I have heard again and again the odious echo of your sophomoric plea to "Get out of Vietnam." Now I feel compelled to make a plea of my own: "Get Out of my America."

I have more right, more dignity and honor being in Vietnam than you have being in my America.

What will happen when I return to America? Are you willing to answer to me when I come home? Do you really think you have all the answers?

If Vietnam is not supposed to be of concern to me, then why should it cause you so much concern?

Do you feel remorseful that American men are dying here? Then why do you insult the dignity of the passions that bring them to spend their lives in the aid of Vietnamese people.

I, and thousands of servicemen like me, chose to come here. There are thousands of us that the government did not send here. We asked to come.

When did you ever ask to help humanity? You see fit to question our right to be in Vietnam, yet I cannot help but wonder about your right to be in America.

Let's talk about Vietnam and the Vietnamese people.

They have never known anything but a lifetime of war. I don't mean a television war, a newspaper war or a political war.

I'm speaking specifically about burning homes, destroyed crops and murdered children. I'm speaking of the fear that comes with the knowledge that today might be the very last day of all. This has been the heritage of these people for countless years.

Now they are on the threshold of escaping all this. They cannot do it all alone. As Americans we have been entrusted to see that the Vietnamese are allowed to live as they choose.

What about you as an American? What are your plans for tomorrow? A football game? A concert? Or a protest rally and a march on Washington?

One thing is certain: your village will not be raided nor your crops destroyed. You will not return home to find your house burned to the ground with your five children lying outside with their stomachs split open from navel to neck.

No, your tomorrow—and you will have a tomorrow—will contain the same freedom of pursuit and peace that have filled all of your days.

I choose to be in Vietnam because these people are being denied the right to their own pursuit

of Life. They need the help that I am able to give.

My country has given these people the same promise of tomorrow that our country has given you. You contend that we should break our promise. Should our country also withdraw its promise to you?

We are working hard to free a people from Communist oppression and terror.

Please explain to me: Just what is it that you are trying to do for America? What does America need that your protests will give to it?

I hesitate to call you all the worn names that fit your kind. I do, however, submit that you are uninformed, misguided and have the proclivity of a fool for pseudo-intellectualism. I submit that you have been conned by a lack of initiative into adopting false ideologies that even a child would sense to be wrong. I further submit that you are making a vulgar but vain attempt to enlist others in your parade of idiocy.

You say that the profession of arms is without honor. You also

say that to aid an oppressed people is without honor. I ask you what then is honor?

I think when I come home to the haven of America I shall teach you just what communism is and why it must be faced by Americans who are empowered to stop it.

How would it be to you if, when you burned your draft card, the government burned your house? What would be your consolation if, when you marched along with a sign in one hand and a club in the other, the government clubbed your children to death? You would truly learn the meaning of tomorrow if all your tomorrows were taken away from you.

As a human being I cannot help but feel sorry for you. Your sickness cannot be cured. I can only hope to contain it so you do not poison others. The only answer I can give your moronic babblings is no, I won't get out of Vietnam.

1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

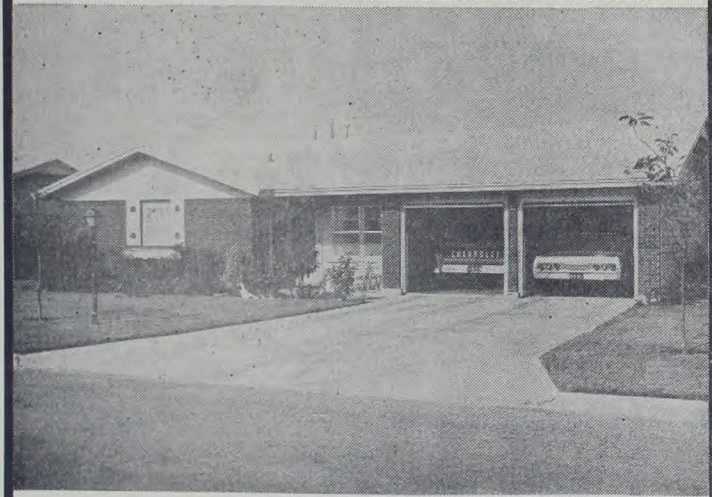

COUNTY COMMITTEEMEN NOW BEING NOMINATED IN BRISCOE COUNTY

In this time of local, state and National elections with their publicity caused by political showmanship, farmers are likely to forget that an election more vital to their livelihood is being quietly conducted. This is the annual election of community committeemen to serve the farmers of Briscoe County. The farm program cannot possibly serve local farmers if good men are not elected as committeemen.

Community committeemen are a vital link between the farmer and this office. Their main job is to serve as a channel of communication between the farmer and this office. Another important function that they perform is the election of one county committeeman each year. Of course the main responsibility for tailoring the farm program to local needs is borne by the county committee. It is, therefore, no insignificant job that the community committeemen have in regard to the election by them of a county committeeman.

Each farmer is urged to vote in this election for men of sound judgement who have the farmer's interests at heart.

A great deal can be lost by putting men in this important position who have personal interests at heart rather than the good of the farmer.

The following dates are called to your attention because of their importance in the up coming election.

September 18, 1968 — Final date to return ballots if they are to be counted.

September 23, 1968 — The ballots are to be counted by the county

committee at 8:00 A. M. in the local office.

September 25, 1968 — The newly elected community committeemen will meet at 8:00 P. M. in the ASCS Office for the purpose of electing a county committeemen.

for students and 60¢ for adults. There will be a special Milk program in the lunchroom this year and students may purchase extra one-half pints of milk for 4¢ each. There will be one-half pint of milk served with each lunch. Students may purchase as many one-half pints of extra milk as they wish as 4¢ each.

After a brief general assembly, all grade school students will report to their home rooms. All enrollment cards and book cards have been made except new students. The books have been covered and placed on a student desk with the name of the student written on the top book in chalk on the book cover. 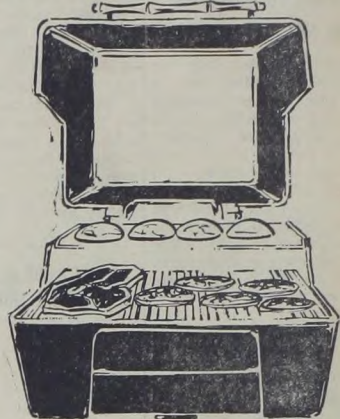
All parents are invited to come

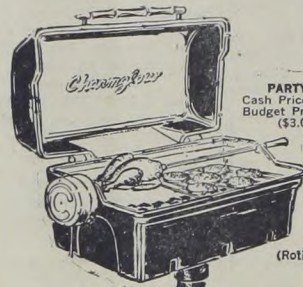

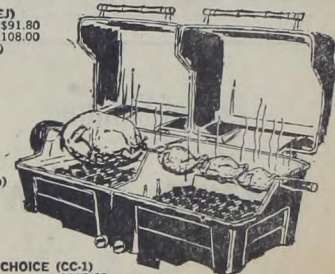

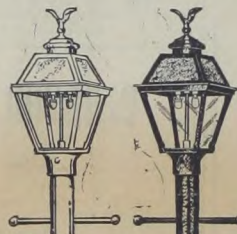
