Honoring Those Who Served A Salute To Local WWII Veterans



Lester Oran Wynn

Lester Oran Wynn entered the Armed Forces on September 5, 1942. He was a Combat Infantryman and a Laboratory Technician. He attained the rank of Sergeant. He was wounded in the Battle of the Bulge in Germany in March of 1945. As the result of these injuries he lost both of his legs.

He was awarded the European African Middle Eastern Service Medal, the Bronze Battle Star, Good Conduct Medal, Purple Heart, World War II Victory Medal, and the American Theatre Ribbon.

After spending time in hospitals in Germany and England he was shipped to the United States where he received his discharge from the military at Lawson General Hospital in Atlanta, Georgia on March 27, 1946. After spending some time in the hospital in Temple, Texas he returned to his home in Turkey, Texas.



James Smith Guest

James Smith Guest entered the Armed Forces on October 22, 1942. He attended basic training at Camp Butner in Durham, N.C.

James was assigned to Co. B, 102nd Engineer Battalion attached to the 27th Infantry Division in Hawaii.

He served in Theatre of Operations in the Marshall Islands, Marianna Islands, New Hebrides, Ryukyus Islands, Okinawa and Korea.

He was awarded 3 Bronze Stars on his Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal. He also received the Purple Heart for a wound he received on Okinawa.

Other awards included 1 Victory Ribbon, 1 Service Stripe and 5 Overseas Service Bars.

James received his Honorable discharge from the Army on December 7, 1945. He served a total of 38 months.

COOK'S CORNER

I don't know if it's all the talk about Krispy Kreme Doughnuts coming to Lubbock and Amarillo, or the TV commercials for doughnuts, but some readers have asked for homemade doughnut recipes. Since the small towns in our area can't support a bakery or doughnut shop, if we crave a hot, fresh doughnut, we either have to make them ourselves or drive to the city. I have two excellent recipes for you to try-one cake doughnut and one yeast, because each kind has its fans. TIP: Strain your frying oil and use over and over since the doughnuts don't flavor it or break it down.

RAISED DOUGHNUTS

- 1 1/4 cups milk
- 1 package (1 Tablespoon) yeast
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 4 1/2 cup flour
- 3 Tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 teaspoon salt

Scall the milk, pour into mixing bowl and cool to lukewarm. Stir in yeast and 1 Tablespoon of the sugar. Add 1 1/2 cups of the flour and beat well. Cover with a clean towel and let rise in a warm place about 1 hour.

Cream the butter or margarine, add remaining sugar and cream until light and fluffy. Add egg and salt. Mix well and stir into yeast mixture. Add the remaining 3 cups of flour and beat well. Cover again with the towel and let rise until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour. Then turn out on a floured board and roll about 1/2 inch thick. Cut with floured doughnut cutter and let rise until doubled in size, about 30 minutes. Heat 3 inches of oil in an electric skillet or Dutch oven and fry a few doughnuts and holes at a time, about 2 minutes per side. Drain on paper towels then shake in a paper sack with granulated sugar, powdered sugar, or cinnamon sugar. If you feel really decadent, then glaze the doughnuts on one or both sides with this:

- GLAZE: 2 cups powdered sugar
- 1/4 cup water

Mix until smooth. Recipe makes about 30 doughnuts and holes.

CHOCOLATE CHIP DONUTS

- 3 cups dry pancake mix
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 2 eggs

- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 2/3 cup sour cream
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/4 cup mini chocolate chips

Combine first three ingredients in mixing bowl. Whisk eggs, sugar, sour cream and vanilla in second bowl. Stir dry mixture into egg mixture. Place on floured board and knead in chips. Cover and chill 3 hours. Then, pat dough to 1/2 inch thickness on floured surface. Cut with doughnut cutter. Heat 3 inches of oil to 365degrees and fry a few doughnuts and holes at a time, for about 2 minutes per side. Drain on paper towels. Shake with sugar or glaze as desired.

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



Web Based Farm Program Evaluation

Evaluation of acreage and yields are now available on-line. Producers can access a free Base and Yield Analyzer program at <http://www.afpc.tamu.edu>. This Web site will help farmers and landowners evaluate which updating options are best for them. It will help update base acreage and yields along with the new farm bill. Producers can enter their own information on planted acres and yields for 1998 through 2001, as well as their current base acres and yields. The Analyzer will then analyze their options and provide comparisons for each base and yield update option. This will give a more accurate reflection of yields because of the updated number of acres being reported. The Web site serves as a one-stop source for farm bill information and has an on-line question and answer forum. Slide presentations about the farm bill and a link that lists farm bill educational meetings are also available.

Texas Tomorrow Fund For Newborns

The Texas Tomorrow Fund is designed to help families with future tuition costs. It locks in tomorrow's tuition at today's prices. The fund is a constitutionally guaranteed trust fund backed by the full faith and credit of the state of Texas. To qualify, young children's enrollment must be received within a specified time period. But newborns can be enrolled anytime since babies aren't always born during the enrollment period. The fund may be more financial relief than new parents realize. The Texas Tomorrow Fund shows that college tuition and fees have increased 460% since 1985. Family incomes have only risen 117% in that time frame. So, that money can be used to help pay for the increasing attendance costs in any college or university in or out of state. Be Aware Of Ticks While Outdoors

Summer's here and the great outdoors beckons. But, people need to be especially careful of ticks. They are light brown and well designed to slip into a cat or dog's fur coat. Ticks are more likely in areas with cattle and other livestock. But they can be in any natural, wild area with woodland and grassy area. If bitten by a tick, don't panic, but be aware that it's possible for them to carry diseases. These diseases sometimes show up as a rash, or with flu-like symptoms. To prevent getting bitten, pant legs should be tucked into socks or cuffs should be sealed off with duct tape. Wear long pants and tuck in shirts to further discourage ticks. If a tick does bite, entomologists recommend removing it by grabbing the tick on the head as close to the skin as possible. Pull straight out with a gentle, steady pull. Old fashioned remedies such as hot match heads and Vaseline do not work and may increase chances of infection.

Bees! What Kind Are They?

Recently I have received several phone calls about bees swarming around barns, houses, fences, wells and other places. The first question is "Is it Killer Bees?" With all of the publicity the Africanized Honey Bee has received recently people are extremely worried when they see bees swarming. There are (2) two ways to determine if bees are European Honey Bees or Africanized Honey Bees. The first is a wing test performed under a microscope to measure the wings and veins in the wings. This test is more of an educated guess with a measurement range. The second test is a DNA test that will tell without a doubt if this is an Africanized colony.

If you see a swarm that does not belong or you want to get rid of it, there are some pest companies that will destroy the bees. To get bees checked, I need approximately 50 dead bees. For DNA test, the bees must be in a 95% alcohol solution such as ethanol alcohol or for just the wing measurements they can be placed in ordinary 75% alcohol solution or rubbing alcohol. Ag Approps Debate Postponed Until Sept.

Legislative calendars are never easy to predict and the FY 03 Agricultural Appropriations bill continues to be a moving target in terms of nailing down when the House of Representatives will actually begin to debate the measure.

Drought plagued farmers and ranchers across the nation are watching the progress of the FY03 ag spending bill closely since it is considered the most likely place to include much needed crop and livestock assistance.

Originally thought to be up for consideration this week, new information says the measure is now likely to be pushed back until after the August recess and not begin floor debate until September.

That means Ag Appropriations will join a lengthening line of appropriations measures that Congress must act upon before the end of the scheduled legislative activities this October.

Crop Progress Right On Schedule

Crops across the Texas Plains continue to look good as the end of July approaches. This is a welcome change for many producers who have been hard pressed to have any kind of crop in the last few years.

To say that the crop is the best ever would be stretching the truth a bit, however, it is not a stretch to note that area-wide the crop is probably looking about as good as many have seen in several years. The primary catalyst for that improved assessment is easily the status of the area's dryland crop.

The fact that current estimates show better than two-thirds of the dryland acres actually made it to a stand has been cause for celebration all by itself. Add in the fact that many of these acres have also received timely rains to date and you have significantly improved the chances that dryland cotton will make significant contributions to the 2003 production total.

Irrigated cotton also looks good across the area. Isolated hailstorms have impacted some acres, but accurate estimates are still not available at this time.

Whether or not the area's crop eventually lives up to the potential that is there right now will depend on a combination of factors, including weather and the continued arrival of timely, beneficial rains for both dryland and irrigated crops and insects.


