## Planting Rates A Critical Decision For Cotton Farmers

LUBBOCK — Cotton producers are now faced with numerous decisions about planting, and not the least among them is the questions of planting rates, says an area cotton specialist here.

According to Dr. Robert B. Metzger of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock, seeding rates will vary according to row width, seed quality and whether production is under irrigation or dryland.

"Due to low quality seed this year," says Metzger, "planting rates in many instances will have to be

increased by 25 percent or more, depending upon the level of germination."

Explains the agronomist, "the optimum plant population for the conventional 40-inch row width is 40 to 50 thousand plants per acre. This population is equivalent to three or four seedling per foot of row. Assuming 70 to 75 percent emergence, this would require five to six seeds per foot of row or approximately 20 to 25 pounds of seed per acre. It should be emphasized that to get 75 percent field emergence, a laboratory germination of 80 percent or higher is required."

For those considering narrow row cotton production, he explains, an average of three plants per foot of row is still a good rule of thumb. For 20-inch single rows or double rows on 40-inch beds,

Trophy buckles will also be given to the first, second and third place contestants.

Junior events for boys and girls 14 and under will include Steer Riding, Flag Race, Scoop Race and Breakaway Roping. Entry fees for these events are \$3.00 each, and trophy buckles will be given to the winners of first, second and third places.

Trophy saddles will be given to the All-Around Cowboy and All-Around Cowgirl. To be eligible for consideration in the All-Around event, participants must enter three senior events, placing in two. Stock will be furnished by Red Whatley of Crosbyton.

Admission is \$1.50 for adults and 75c for children 12 and under. A dance will be sponsored by the Silverton Young Farmers on Saturday night, May 12.

The agronomist concludes that in addition to planting rates, producers must consider other important practices such as variety selection, weed control, irrigation, and soil fertility for profitable cotton production.

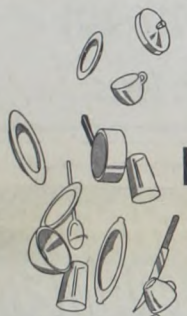

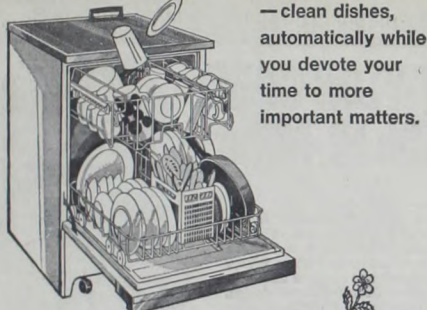
