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Valley Teams Win A Pair Over McLean

The Valley High basketball teams drove to McLean Tuesday of this week to start the second round of action in district competition and came off with a pair of wins, the boys sailing past the Tigers 78-55 and the Valley girls, who were facing an almost "must" situation, overwhelmed the Tigerettes 69-35 to take sole possession of first place in the race for the district championship. Prior to the win Tuesday night the Valley girls were tied with McLean following last week's upset loss to Wellington's Rockettes. The Valley girls had been in a scoring slump since before Christmas and local fans, knowing that the Patriots had the team to win, were nevertheless a bit worried about Tuesday night's

battle against the Tigerettes. The Tigerettes lost their high-scoring Sheri Haynes in the first period due to a knee injury and when she was lost the Tiger fans lost all hopes of winning. However, Miss Haynes would not have made the difference in Tuesday night's game for the Valley girls regained their scoring touch and four of the forwards got into double figures in the scoring. Eva Cheatham, who won scoring honors for the game, put 14 points on the board in the first period. Miss Haynes hit 7 points in the first quarter before sustaining her injury. Valley led all the way, the score at the end of the first period being 19-13, at half-time, 36-22 and at the end of three quarters the Patriots had upped their lead to 48-26. Mitchie Lipscomb was runnerup in the scoring column with 14 points, Janna Turner hit for 11, Cherri Brown netted 10 and Cookie Dowd and Bonnie Clary each scored 2 points. Sherrod scored 12 points to lead the Tigerettes. Valley's guards turned in their usual fine job of holding down the opponents scoring. The Valley girls now are 6-1 overall in district play, all the other teams having lost at least twice. Claude would appear to be the biggest hurdle for the Patriots, although they must respect them all, as they have already learned.

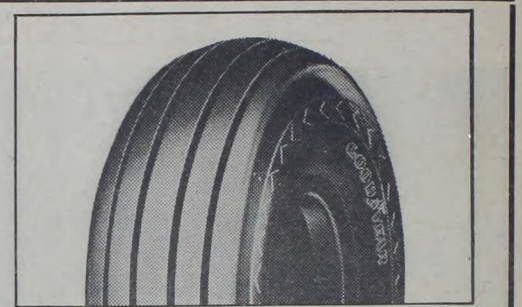

6 WAYS TO CONSERVE AND SAVE

ON WINTER HEATING

1. For savings on energy, set the thermostat on the temperature setting that provides adequate comfort (the President suggests 68°). Don't continually switch it up and down. Remember, the lower you set the thermostat in the winter the more money you save on energy.
2. A routine service inspection by a qualified service man is advisable prior to the heating season. Follow the manufacturers recommendations on this. Clean filters keep the heating unit operating at maximum efficiency and economy. Filters are the most neglected part of any forced-air heating system.
3. A wood burning fireplace should be equipped with an efficient damper. Be sure to keep the damper closed when not in use. A chimney with the damper open carries warm air out the house, wasting heat.
4. To decrease heat loss and reduce energy cost in rooms that are not in use at night or in extremely cold weather, draw the draperies and lower the shades over the windows, glass panels and doors. If the sun is shining on glass areas, open the draperies. The sun shining through the glass will supply additional heat at no cost.
5. Some wall heaters have fan-forced circulation. To clean, turn the unit "OFF". Blow dust out of unit with vacuum exhaust attachment. Clean the grill cover with a vacuum or warm detergent water.
6. Proper insulation and weather stripping will make your home more comfortable. It will help keep dust and dirt from blowing in, and will help to eliminate cold drafts in the winter time, thus saving money on your heating bill.

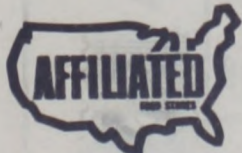

SPEED LIMITS TO BE LOWERED SUNDAY, JAN. 20

The Texas Highway Commission today set a statewide maximum speed limit of 55 miles per hour, effective at 12:01 a.m. Sunday, January 20.

The action was taken in keeping with the law passed by the recent special session of the Texas Legislature, empowering the Commission to set lower speed limits to comply with federal energy saving actions.

Under the terms of the Emergency Highway Energy Conservation Act signed by the President January 2, a state not establishing a 55 m.p.h. maximum speed limit would not receive its share of federal highway construction funds.

Federal taxes on items related to the operation of motor vehicles — notably a four-cents-per-gallon levy on gasoline — go into the Federal Highway Trust Fund. These funds are apportioned back to the state for the federal government's share of highway construction.

Texas' share amounts to some \$240 million annually which would be withheld if the lower speed limit were not set by early March.

Today's action is subject to review within eight days by Governor Dolph Briscoe. The lower speed limits will apply to all highways in the state, including highways under the control of the Texas Turnpike Authority, cities and counties.

New speed limit signs replacing the old 70-m.p.h. maximum speed limit on the State's major highways, will be in place by the effective date. The Highway Department will begin immediately the task of making and posting the

new signs.

The Commission also directed the Highway Department to monitor and document circumstances "which might relate to the establishment of speed limits and to report to the Commission on a monthly basis." This is in order that the Commission may make findings as to whether the 55 m.p.h. limit should continue in effect.

Many motorists in Texas have already voluntarily reduced their driving speeds to below 55, Highway Department spokesmen said.
