TWO RELATIVES

Around the rim by

A couple of eulogies to Bob Wills, the Western Swing King, transmitted by the Associated Press recently reminded me of two relatives.

My uncle, we really weren't related, and my aunt, Gerry lived in Turkey, Texas, the home of Wills, even if he did sing, "Take Me Back to Tulsa."

Elmer Lacy was a long-time mayor of Turkey, a Panhandle town of about 800 population. He participated in the planning of a monument to Wills there.

When I was young, Turkey was a second home to me. Everybody knew I was Luther's boy, and I knew hardly anyone.

I remember Mark Lane, a large tall man who raised cattle with my uncle in the canyons and brushland too poor to farm. He used to buy big sacks of candy and spend the rest of the day forcing me to eat it.

After telling someone how things were, he'd insist they agree, saying "huh? huh?" impatiently.

Smashing into a car driven by a local woman with a baby one Wednesday night, I left the scene. I got my uncle out of a Church of Christ service and returned.

Well, the deputy sheriff said I ought to get a ticket, but he knew my uncle would pay for the damage. He did.

My aunt was irritated that I interrupted the service over such a petty matter. It was one of the few times she chided me. Anything I did usually was okay, as long as I ate three times what a normal human did and accepted all the money and gifts they offered.

I used to ride horses, chase cattle, shoot at birds with BB guns, plow under cotton (and then grain sorghum when he lost too much cotton), sit around the gas-flame stove in the hardware store with farmers, ride with my uncle in his cigar-reeking pickup for hours without saying a word and read comic books to kill time there.

They had a movie theatre downtown and a drive-in theatre halfway to Quitaque. The owners were close friends of the Lacy's, almost everybody seemed to be, and always refused to let me pay. I remember high school students talking to one of my cousins, a football player, about getting sick on cherry vodka at the drive-in.

One of the last movies I saw at the drive-in was "Hud". Filmed at Claude, not too far from Turkey, "Hud" was shown at the drive-in soon after its release. It seemed to capture the feeling of rural life in the Panhandle; lonely, desolate and monotonous. It remains one of my favorite movies.

Turkey was the scene of another several years later. The column I wrote about it follows: Many miles from here, a distant relative of mine was killed recently.

She was driving with her husband, who was recovering from heart surgery, to the doctor's office when she met fate on the highway head-on.

While I wouldn't attempt to judge the man who was jailed after the incident, the epilogue to the tragedy may be sobering to motorists.

Two rows of ten men each with white carnations followed by men with red carnations stood as mourners walked up steep church steps.

Inside, the smell of flowers made the air heavy. The blackboard had been slid aside revealing a mountain wilderness scene behind a pool of water.

"... A time for living, a time for dying..." the preacher recited.

The preacher read the lady's last written thoughts, a letter of thanks for the congregation's thoughtfulness during her husband's hospitalization.

Melvin Cobb Using New Equipment

Melvin Cobb of Amarillo, former resident of Quitaque and son of Mr. and Mrs. Orval (Runt) Cobb of this city, was featured in the Amarillo Globe News Sunday issue with the new equipment recently installed at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo to x-ray blood. Melvin is director of radiology.

He said the new equipment will compliment the brain scanner already in use in the hospital. It will make arteriograms, or x-rays of the brain's blood system. Cancerous growths have a different system of blood vessels from normal tissue and noncancerous growths, Cobb said. This is not for a routine x-ray examination. This system is completely computerized and will simply the physicians records for the patient.

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OSHA Toilet Regulations Pose Some Urgent Problems

(Editor's note: The following letter was written by John A. Matthews, rancher at Albany, Texas, to Ed Wishcamper, editor of the Abilene (Texas) Reporter News, and copies were sent to Rep. Omar Burleson and Sen. John Tower as well as to WTLW and to OSHA headquarters in Washington.)
 Dear Ed:

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration, under the United States Department of Labor, is in the process of writing regulations whereby people working on farms and ranches must have toilet facilities within a five minute walk of where they are working.

I feel an average sized person can walk about 1/2 of a mile in five minutes. He might do better if he was in a hurry. This means that on a 30 section ranch, you would have to build 120 flush toilets complete with septic tank and water storage. They will also require proper toilet paper holders and locks on the doors to insure privacy.

Also, I think it would be necessary, on the ranches covered with brush, to erect a tall flag pole at the toilet site so the worker could zero in on his objective. Otherwise, he might get lost and you could be fined for non-compliance.

Beyond the fact that all of this will cost one big pot of money—no pun intended—I am worried about some other aspects. It seems to me that this is going to discriminate against short-legged people who can't walk a third of a mile in five minutes. Will the foreman have to work the short-legged man one minute closer to the toilet, or will it be necessary to have a walking demonstration before you hire a new worker so you can

gauge just how far from the toilet he can work?

I can see further complications in that sometime some of the crew may drink some gyp water and come up with a case of the "Green Apple Two-Step". Then you would have to work them only a one or two minute walk from the toilet or be in danger of non-compliance if you had them three minutes away and they didn't make it. This is going to take some careful planning before you start a crew to work each morning. You will have to ask each one just what shape his innards are in before assigning jobs for the day, and you may never have a day when they will all be five minute men and can work in a group.

I thought at first that a person might get around the whole idea by designing a "Handy Dandy Quick Relief Portable Toilet" that each man could carry, but that wouldn't work since OSHA's whole idea is to have the men use flush toilets—even the ones that don't know how to use them.

OSHA stands for safety and health. I am unable to see where making it mandatory to have millions of toilets scattered over the range is going to increase safety, so they must be aiming at the health aspect. When they get all these cowboys and farmhands "potty-trained," which will be no small undertaking, I guess they will start on my cows. Did you ever try to train a cow to walk anywhere to go to the bathroom?

Any help you can give us on the above will be appreciated. If we don't get this stopped, I suggest going to the nearest stockbroker and buying a large chunk of toilet stock.

Volunteers Sought For MD Telethon

Hundreds of volunteers are needed to help with the New Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon in the Quitaque-Turkey area.

The spectacular will be seen on a network of over 200 stations, including Hawaii, Alaska, Puerto Rico and Guam.

Last year the Telethon raised over 18-million dollars for the fight against muscular dystrophy and related disorders. Jerry hopes that "this year, maybe we can muster up still more love and support for kids with MD who can't walk. That's why I stand up on a stage every year—so they can stand someday, too."

MDA supports over 200 neuromuscular research projects in laboratories throughout the U. S. and in 15 foreign countries, and is also establishing a network of university-based research centers to accelerate its efforts for finding cures or effective treatments for neuro-muscular disease. In addition, the health agency maintains a total of 135 free diagnostic and treatment clinics, located throughout the U. S., and in Puerto Rico and Guam.


