

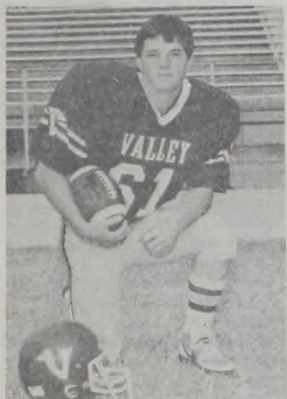

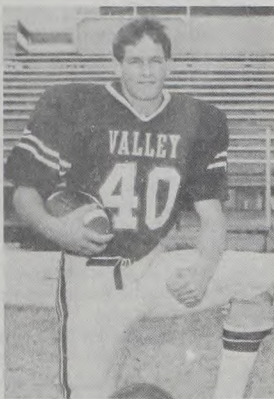

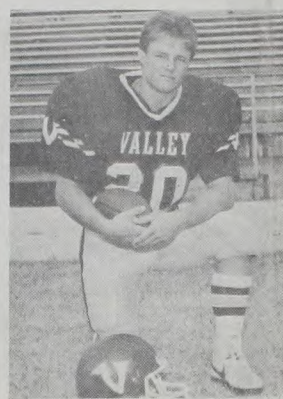

Erosion Problem Conference Jan. 12

A conference to discuss how farmers can use wind strips to reduce erosion on cropland will be held in Lubbock on January 12, 1988.

The meeting will start at 9:30 a.m. at the Holiday Inn Civic Center in Lubbock. Registration will start at 8:00 a.m.

John Crowell, district conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Silverton, said farmers, conservationists, and others interested in the use of wind strips are invited to attend.

"In cooperation with SCS,

Texas Tech University scientists have completed a three-year study to analyze the feasibility of using perennial grass wind strips to reduce erosion," Crowell said. "The study indicates that wind strips are an efficient way to reduce erosion on cropland in West Texas."

Three farmers using the practice will speak during the conference. They are Ronald Thuett, Post; Sonny Lupton,

Processing Plant Discussed For Briscoe Co. And Area

Plans of Archer and Archer, Inc., a research and development firm originally out of Dallas, to locate a \$700,000 peanut and sunflower seed salting and roasting plant to be located in or near Silverton were revealed at a public meeting held in conjunction with a meeting of Briscoe County Commissioners on Tuesday morning of last week.

Work has already begun by Judge Jimmy Ross on an application for a \$500,000 government grant, and other grants are available to provide the rest of the money for the plant. A hearing on this grant application will be held at the regular meeting of the Commissioners' Court at 10 a. m. January 11, in the district courtroom. Interested residents are invited to attend.

The grant money is available for community development to counties like Briscoe, and it would be loaned at a reasonable rate of interest to Archer and Archer, Inc. for the purpose of putting the plant into operation here. The interest paid back to the county

by Archer and Archer would be available to the Commissioners to spend as they see fit for other community development.

Shannon Wilburn, part of the Archer and Archer sales promotion and development, stated that "this project will click."

"The area we want to talk about is peanut processing - because that is what we want to introduce into your county. Let me tell you why it will be successful. One reason is that Mr. McAfee has a salting process for peanuts that is like none other that I know about

He has developed the art, worked it, specialized and got it down to a science and it's paid off for him. Of course, I've told you that Archer and Archer, Inc. has heat transfer systems and what we're going to do with that is take out technology, which we're doing right now, and roast salted sunflower seeds and peanuts.

The third reason I believe this plant will be successful is the farmers in Briscoe County. It's kind of ironic that that the farmer is the only guy that wants the prices to be high. . . everyone else wants it to be

low. Archer and Archer's goal is to bring the farmer the market so that a low price can be picked up on the other end of the processing, so that it won't be you, the farmer, against the other big industries. You take the risks, you pay the money, you sweat the sweat, you cry the tears, and then someone else profits from it. And we want to eliminate that. So to your county we want to bring sunflower seed and peanut processing. And I don't know anywhere else in the world where these two technologies are brought together to form one industry. There's not many places in the United States where they do both salting and roasting; so that's a unique idea in itself," Wilburn continued.

"Let me tell you some other opportunities on past this with Archer and Archer. We are into specialized flour mills, and we're not opposed to putting a flour mill in your county. We take that flour and we have a new art in cookie baking. We gave Judge Ross and Attorney Tom West some of our cookies when they were down to Hereford last week and they saw what we are doing. We are into potato processing. Our heat transfer system not only cooks but it freezes, either add heat or you remove it. And Judge Ross also tells me that your county has the best potatoes anywhere and we believe him. Archer and Archer, Inc. is into manufacturing. We manufacture food processing machinery. We manufacture heat exchangers. We are into air pollution control systems. The reason I tell you this is because I want you to see that Archer and Archer Inc. is a diversified company. We're looking at your county for peanut and sunflower seed processing, but I want you to know the opportunities in other areas are wide open."

When asked how many the

new industry would employ, Shannon Wilburn stated that 30 would be hired. Management personnel would be brought in, he said, but 30 would be hired locally.

The project will be financed with government grants, and according to Judge Ross, PRPC assures him they don't foresee any problem with the first half million dollar grant. Other grants will have to provide the rest of the \$700,000, which then will be used by Archer and Archer, Inc., who will pay a reasonable rate of interest back to the county.

Other options available, along with the salting and roasting plant, would include the making of peanut butter, a flour mill and other industries. The group assured those present that this is not just a one-shot deal, and that when Archer and Archer, Inc. moves into a community, they aren't going to come and sell out to someone else, and leave the community hanging.

A minimum of ten acres will be needed for the basic plant which is 70X200. They aren't "set in concrete" about anything, but ten acres is minimum because a lot of truck parking area is needed. Local truckers were assured that as many local trucks as possible will be used. A local contractor was assured he will have opportunity to bid on the construction.

About a thousand pounds per hour of peanuts or sunflower seeds is optimum for processing. It would not be a seasonal business, but would operate year-around.

They feel that once the plant is in operation, they will be able to beat the government contract price. They want the farmer to benefit from this.

Judge Ross closed with the comment that "These people want to see that our community grows. We want to be able to put the stores back around the

square, the people back in the churches. I would like to tell you that these are good Christian people, and that's an important criteria as far as I am concerned. The reason I wanted to go ahead and let people know what is going on and what we're doing is that anytime in the future you need me and I'm out of the office, you'll understand what I am working on. I am very proud of this and I pledge myself to do what I can to make them a happy home."

Help Prepare Family For Home Fire Emergencies

Each year nearly 5,000 Americans are killed and many more injured because they do not know what to do when a fire erupts in their home. The best way to survive, according to Reader's Digest, is to be prepared for it. Here's how:

- Install smoke alarms. Dependable battery-operated smoke detectors, available for \$10 to \$20, remain the single most important aid in saving lives in case of fire. Install at least one on each floor of your house (including the basement), and periodically make sure they work.

- Make a list of all possible exits from your home. It is important to have several escape routes in case primary exits are blocked.

- Locate two exits from each bedroom. In most cases, this will mean a window that can serve as an emergency exit. Make sure all family members, particularly children, can open it and fit through it easily. If there's even a remote chance that the window could stick, show them how to use a chair or other handy object to break the glass. Finally, if the drop to the ground is hazardous, keep a collapsible fire ladder that hooks over the sill near the window.

Practice using it.

- Draw a floor plan of the house. If possible, use a grid sheet and draw it to scale, indicating all windows and doors. Make sure the plan includes outdoor features and possible obstacles. Know if the roof of a garage or balcony can support the weight of an adult or child.

- Mark all primary and alternate exits on the plan, plus an outside meeting place, with a distinctive "X" or arrow. Counting noses quickly after assembling outside could be crucial for someone still trapped inside.

- Call a family fire drill at least once every six months. Go over the plan and rules of survival with each family member, and walk everyone through the escape routes. Repetition is the key to survival.

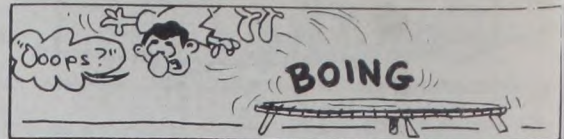

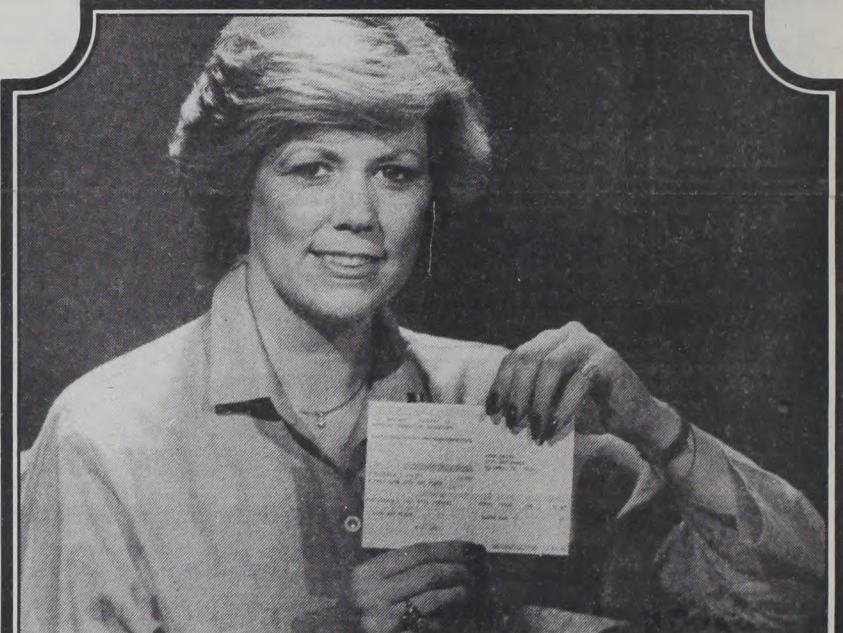

Social Security -Medicare-

The Medicare hospital insurance deductible, the amount a Medicare patient is responsible for when he or she first receives hospital insurance services in a benefit period, will increase to \$540 in 1988. The 1987 deductible is \$520.

Also scheduled to increase are the per-day amounts patients are responsible for after specific lengths of stay in a hospital or skilled nursing facility.

After 60 days of inpatient care in a benefit period in 1988, Medicare will pay for all covered services except \$135 a day. The 1987 figure is \$130.

For each reserve day, Medicare will pay for all covered services except \$270 a day. The 1987 figure is \$260.

After 20 days of care in a skilled nursing facility, Medicare will pay all covered service except \$67.50 a day. The 1987 figure is \$65.

The basic monthly premium for Medicare medical insurance will be \$24.80. The 1987 basic premium is \$17.90. Some people pay more than this rate because there were periods of time they could have had this protection but did not.

The monthly premium for hospital insurance for those people not otherwise eligible for this protection will be \$234 in 1988. The 1987 premium is \$226.

The medical insurance annual deductible will remain \$75, unchanged from 1987.
