

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### County Announces Plans For Use Of Revenue Funds

Briscoe County is to receive \$16,520.00 for the six-month period ending June 30, 1973. The sum of \$8,260.00 was received April 9, 1973 and the balance is to be received June 30 or soon thereafter. Plans for use of the above funds are listed below.

Public Safety (Law Enforcement, Salaries, Travel Expense, etc.), \$6,850.00; Health (County Health Officer and other), \$500.00; Libraries, \$300.00; Financial Adm. (Salaries of Tax Office and County Treasurer), \$5,500.00; Repairs (Replace windows in part of Courthouse), \$3,370.00; Total, \$16,520.00. Repairs were made on the Courthouse last year that cost the County \$5,610.85 and are paid for. The Commissioners expect to replace all windows in the Courthouse as soon as money is available. The Courthouse was built in 1922, and the present windows are now 50

years old. The Courthouse is a sound building in other respects. Briscoe County is not in debt and the Commissioners expect to stay out of debt.

The Federal Revenue Sharing Funds will enable the County to make needed repairs without a tax increase in spite of inflation.

### Tule Fish Kill Is Given Board Okay

The Texas Water Quality Board has approved use of a fish toxicant to insure a desirable fish population in the Tule Creek Reservoir. The staff of the Board said there would be no environmental problem and the State Health Department has concurred with the re-

commendations of the staff. The area to be treated by a five per cent rotenone solution, a fish toxicant, is approximately 14 miles of Tule Creek stream bed and three plays lakes—a total of 50 surface acres.

The Board said the importance of the project was tied to a new reservoir being constructed by the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority about 14 miles downstream from Tule Lake (presently dry). The new reservoir is scheduled to begin impounding water in September.

Tule Creek between Tule Lake and the new impoundment is spring fed and an undesirable fish population consisting of carp, bullhead catfish and stunted white crapple now exists. The project is to renovate Tule Creek to insure a desirable fish population

## Pointers Offered On Buying Fertilizer

When buying lawn fertilizer, beware of elaborate wording, labeling and packaging. Instead, check for the actual nutrient content of the fertilizer, advises County Extension Agent Jimmy Vanstorty.

Fancy packaging and elaborate wording can lead the homeowner to spend extra for a lawn fertilizer. The sequence of three figures on the label indicates the percent content of the three primary fertilizer ingredients —nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium, in that order. Thus, a 12-12-12 fertilizer contains 12 percent nitrogen, 12 percent phosphate and 12 percent potassium. It is important to use a complete fertilizer at least once a year, usually in the early spring. After that, a nitrogen fertilizer such as ammonium nitrate, ammonium sulfate or urea will give good results.

When buying a nitrogen fertilizer, determine the cost per pound of nitrogen. A 50-pound bag of fertilizer that has 20 percent nitrogen contains 10 pounds of actual nitrogen (50x.20). Divide this figure (10) into the total cost of the 50 pounds of fertilizer to obtain the cost per pound of nitrogen.

Lawn grasses need nitrogen at about six - week intervals during the growing season. Usually applying enough fertilizer to supply two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1000 square feet per application will give good results. This would be six pounds of ammonium nitrate, ten pounds of ammonium sulfate or five pounds of urea. If urea is used, it should be watered immediately after fertilization, cautions Vanstorty.

The agent notes that a major cause for poor lawns is inadequate nitrogen—either too little per application or a lack of repeating applications during the growing season.

## Check For Mosquito Breeding Sites

With recent rains, water may be standing in some locations on your premises. Such standing water makes an excellent place for raising mosquitoes, points out County Extension Agent Jimmy Vanstorty.

Mosquitoes lay eggs wherever water will collect and stand for a week or longer. Young mosquitoes develop only in water and prefer polluted water for breeding.

If standing water on your premises cannot be eliminated, check it weekly for mosquito larvae. If any are found, apply an insecticide spray, advises Vanstorty. A spray containing 0.5 percent lindane or 0.2 percent malathion may be used as well as kerosene or fuel oil.

To prepare your own spray, mix 3½ teaspoons of a 50 to 57 percent malathion emulsifiable concentrate to enough water, kerosene or fuel oil to make one pint of spray. Or mix 2¼ teaspoons of 20 percent lindane emulsifiable concentrate to make one pint of spray.

Spray one ounce (2 tablespoons) of one of these mixtures to each 100 square feet of water surface, recommends Vanstorty.

For kerosene or fuel oil at full strength, use two to four ounces to each 100 square feet of surface. Do not use kerosene or fuel oil on water containing emergent vegetation.

To keep annoyances from mosquitoes at a minimum this spring and summer, take measures now to destroy breeding places, suggests Vanstorty.
