## Storage and Drying Equipment Loan Program Liberalized

Drying and storage facilities for grains, soybeans, and other storable crops are as necessary for many modern farms as specialized planting and harvesting equipment, according to county farm program official Louie Kitchens, who announced recent changes in the loan program for farm storage and drying equipment.

A lower loan interest rate and an increase in the maximum loan amount are among the changes, as well as liberalization of other provisions.

Kitchens said many farmers will be using the new set-aside farm programs to tailor crop production to meet market demand. "Producers are changing their crop planning from the patterns they have been locked into for so many years under restrictive farm programs. The new set-aside program lets them concentrate their production, if they choose, on crops they can grow most efficiently.

"Modern on-farm and commercial storage and handling facilities are needed which will promote efficient marketing and provide for an orderly flow of goods from producer to consumer," he said.

Through use of both on-farm and commercial storage, farmers are better able to avoid a harvest-time glut, make more effective use of transportation facilities, and spread their marketing over a longer period, Kitchens said.

Under the farm storage and drying equipment loan program, eligible farmers can obtain Commodity Credit Corporation loans through their local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Office to buy or to build on-farm storage and drying facilities and to buy essential operating equipment.

Loans can be made for storage needs based on two-year production of a producer's crops which are eligible for price-support. In Briscoe County these may include barley, oats, grain sorghum, corn, rye, soybeans, wheat, dry edible beans, and peanuts.

Changes in the program include: "Lowering the interest rate on loans to 50 cents per \$100 per month, which is a 6% annual rate. The loan rate had been 7½%. It was possible to lower the interest rate at this time because of recent lowering of the borrowing cost of money to the CCC.

"Increasing the maximum loan or outstanding aggregate balance from \$25,000 to \$35,000.

"Removing the \$5,000 loan limit on drying equipment and permitting such loans for 85% of the net cost up to \$35,000.

"Removing restrictions on various items of equipment essential to the practical operation of the storage or drying unit.

These program changes will not only help farmers install needed on-farm storage but will help them modernize facilities to keep up with new harvesting, conditioning and storage techniques, the ASCS committee chairman said.

"Almost every sector of agriculture is participating in a technological and marketing revolution. Crop storage and conditioning is included in this tremendous change which has given this country the most efficient food production system the world has ever known," Kitchens said.

## Panthers Win Bi-District; Regional Begins Friday

The Quitaque Panthers, District 4-B champions, won their tenth consecutive bi-district championship Tuesday night at Childress with an 81-67 victory over the Quail Quails.

The Panthers thus advanced to the Regional Tournament to be held in the Texan Dome at Levelland Friday and Saturday of this week. The Panthers face Higgins, upset winner over Adrian in another Tuesday night bi-district game, at 3 p.m. Friday in the tournament's first game.

Tuesday night's win over Quail was a costly one, however, for Danny Jones, one of the Panthers' starters, was lost for the tournament when he suffered a knee injury with about five minutes left in the game. He was carried to Lubbock Wednesday morning and the doctors there placed his leg in a cast. The injury was to ligaments or tendons and the extent of the injury will not be known until further tests next week according to reports.

Quail had a very fine team and battled the Panthers all the way. The Quails got on the score board first with a free toss to lead 1-0 but that was the only lead the losers enjoyed all night as the Panthers came right back to score a fielder by Danny Jones from the right corner and the winners were never behind in the game from that point.

The Panthers were hitting well shot themselves into a 7 point 21-14 margin at the end of the first period. The winners hit for another 20 points in the second quarter to increase their margin to 11 points and led 41-30 at half-time.

The Quails came to play, however, and with some great shooting by Derrell Feemster, the Quails started to peek away at the Panther lead and pulled to within 6, 51-57 at the end of three quarters. Quitaque widened the margin to 10 points again, only to see the Quails narrow it to five, 60-65 midway of the quarter.

At this point the Panthers proved their mettle and out-fired their opponents 16-7 to wrap it up in fine style.

Gary Chandler led the Panthers in scoring with 23 points and he was closely followed by Perry Brunson with 22; Stanley Price hit for 15; Larry Price tallied 13; and Danny Jones and Scooter King each hit for four points.

Feemster, who hit some fantastic jump shots from way outside, won scoring honors for the evening with 28 points. Other Quails in double figures in scoring were Oatman with 15 and Barton with 14.

All the Panthers played a fine ball game Tuesday night. They have been the top-rated Class B team in the Panhandle in the Amarillo Daily News Power Ratings for most of the season and Quail was ranked second. Tuesday's game did not hurt the image of either team.

The loss of Danny Jones will hurt the Panthers as he is a fine defensive man and all-around player. Coach White will have three other seniors on the squad, Scooter King, Johnny Griffin and Scotty Stark, all seasoned players, available.

Local fans feel that Quitaque received a little better break in the first pairings this year, because for the past several years the Panthers have drawn the eventual tournament winners for their first game.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR 21)**  
**Special Election May 18, 1971**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State,

of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said amendments; and if more than one be proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said return, that a majority of the votes cast, have been cast in favor of any amendment, the said amendment so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Legislature may propose an amendment of the Constitution at any session of the Legislature."

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 15)**  
**Special Election May 18, 1971**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. (1) The State Ethics Commission is created as an agency of the State. The commission consists of nine members. Three members shall be appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas with the advice and consent of the Associate Justices serving on the Court, three members shall be appointed by the Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas with the advice and consent of the other Judges serving on the Court, and three members shall be appointed by the Chairman of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission with the advice and consent of the other members of the commission, of each group of three appointees no more than two shall be attorneys engaged in the active practice of law. In addition thereto there shall be two ex officio members, one from the House of Representatives and one from the Senate to be elected on the first day of each Regular Session of the Legislature by a majority of the membership of each House for a term ending on the first day of the next Regular Session.

(2) With the exception of the initial appointees, each member shall hold office for a term of six (6) years and until his successor is appointed and has qualified. In making the initial appointments, each appointing officer shall designate one (1) appointee to serve a term of two (2) years, one (1) appointee to serve a term of four (4) years, and one (1) appointee to serve a term of six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. The membership shall designate one of its members to serve as chairman for a period of two (2) years.

(3) The members of the commission shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.

(4) The commission shall recommend the compensation, per diem, and mileage allowance of members of the Legislature, and may recommend the salary of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Lieutenant Governor

proved before that day by resolution of either House of the Legislature.

(b) All rates of compensation, mileage allowances or per diem rates and all changes and recommendations made by the commission thereof shall not take effect until approved section by section by resolution of both Houses of the Legislature.

"All votes on these resolutions or parts thereof shall show the individual votes in the respective journals of both Houses.

(8) The commission shall investigate any alleged violation of any rule of ethics promulgated by it and report its findings to the appropriate State agency, official, legislative body, grand jury or district attorney.

(9) Until otherwise provided by the commission, each member of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury an annual salary of Four Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and per diem not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first 120 days only of each Regular Session and for 30 days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than 140 days. In addition to the per diem, the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after adjournment of the Regular or Called session.

(10) The commission is further authorized to recommend to each Legislature changes which will update, improve, and effect economy in the legislative process."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 18th day of May, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to create a State Ethics Commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the Legislature, State officers and legislative officers, to investigate violations thereof, and to recommend compensation for members of the Legislature and the Lieutenant Governor and recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process."

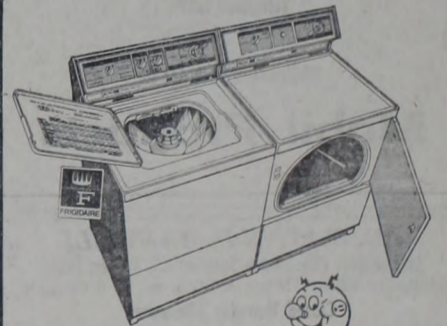
