Gala Fourth Of July Planned In Briscoe County

Briscoe County residents are invited to wear pioneer costumes when they gather at the courthouse in Silverton for the Bicentennial Birthday Celebration Sunday, July 4. A large tent will provide shade, and there will be fun, fellowship, music, games, etc. for those of all ages.

The occasion has been planned to observe the 200th birthday of the United States of America and the 100th anniversary of the designation by the State of Texas of Briscoe as a county.

Briscoe County Home Demonstration Club women are kicking off the activities with an old-fashioned barbecue lunch beginning at 12:00 noon in the Silverton School Cafeteria.

The menu will be barbecue, cole slaw, pinto beans, potato salad, onions, pickles, peppers, cornbread, rolls, fruit cobbler, iced tea and coffee. Advance tickets for adults are \$3.00 each, and the price for children under 12 is \$2.00.

At 1:00 p.m. there will be a nationwide bell ringing ceremony in conjunction with the ringing of the liberty bell. All bells are to be rung in unison for five minutes, heralding the arrival of the Nation's Bicentennial.

The activities on the courthouse square will get underway at 4:00 p.m. with the presentation of the colors by Silverton Boy Scouts.

The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag will be led by Briscoe County Judge M. G. Moreland. The invocation will be given by Earl Cantwell, minister of the Rock Creek Church of Christ, followed by the welcome by O. R. Stark, jr., President of the First National Bank in Quitaque.

The patriotic musical, "I Love America," will follow by the Briscoe County Bicentennial Choir under the direction of Elgin Conner, minister of the Quitaque Church of Christ. The choir is composed of approximately fifty adult and youth singers from Silverton and Quitaque.

Several exhibits will open inside the courthouse, including a Quilt Show, Arts and Crafts Show, Antiques Show and Photography Booth. Classic and antique cars are to be parked on the courthouse square.

QUILT SHOW
Quilts will be accepted from 2:00 until 3:00 p.m. at the court-

house. The committee is asking each exhibitor to furnish a card including the owner of the quilt, the age of the quilt, its history and other interesting facts about the quilt. Everyone is asked to show their new and old quilts. The committee will not be responsible for loss or damage to the quilts, but there will be someone there with the display all the time. The quilts are to be picked up between 6:30 and 7:00 p.m., before the county-wide church service.

Members of this committee include Joni Mayfield, Delene Tyler and Lillian White.

ARTS AND CRAFTS SHOW
Work for the arts and crafts show will be accepted from 2:00 until 3:00 p.m. Sunday at the courthouse. Each exhibitor will set up his own exhibit using display materials, tables, chairs, easels, pegboard, etc. that he brought and space will be assigned on a first-come, first-served basis.

The arts and crafts will be on display until 6:30 p.m. and should be removed from the courthouse before the county-wide church service. A card must accompany each art entry, giving title, med-

ium, price and the artist's name. A description should also accompany the crafts. Prospective buyers are asked to contact the individual artist directly. There will be no commission charged on sales.

The committee will not be responsible for any loss or damage to entries while on display.

ANTIQUITY SHOW
The Briscoe County Museum in the basement of the courthouse will be open during the celebration, and residents are also invited to bring in family heirlooms and antiques for a one-day show. These antique items may be brought to the courthouse beginning at 2:00 p.m. The committee asks that you attach a card giving the owner's name and historical data regarding the item.

The antiques are to be picked up between 6:30 and 7:00 p.m., before the community-wide church service.

PHOTOGRAPHY BOOTH
This will be a "for fun" thing under the direction of two Silverton photographers, Jack Robertson, jr., and Bill Willis. They will be making family and individual photographs for those who desire them and offering them in "prom packets" for sale.

They believe folks will think it fun to be photographed in an old-fashioned setting, perhaps in pioneer costume.

BEARD CONTEST
At 5:00 p.m. the judging will be held in the Beard Contest. A couple of pioneer ladies, one from Quitaque and one from Silverton, will keep this contest in the "for fun" vein that it's always been in, by trying to recall just how the men looked in the early days.

Trophies will be given for the groutiest beard, best beard and best character portrayal beard.

The men can compete in all three of the beard categories, if they wish, but after a beard wins a trophy, it will become ineligible for another trophy.

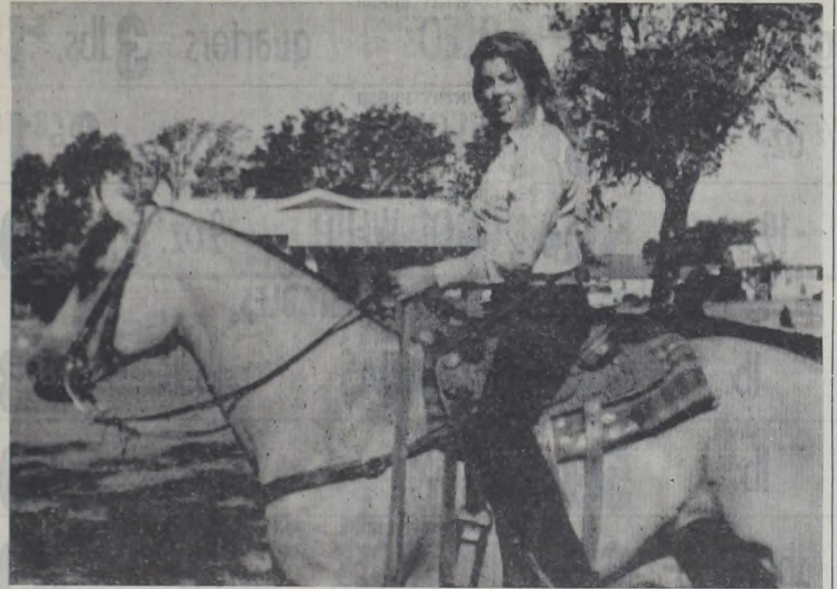
Old-fashioned games will be directed by the Briscoe County 4-H.

Contests will be held to determine the championship youth and adult fiddlers in Briscoe County (please no entries from outside the county). A trophy will be given to the best boy or girl fiddler under age 21. A trophy will also be given to the best man or woman fiddler over 21. This is planned to be a fun event, too, so if you play the fiddle, plan to come and add color to the celebration.

Six o'clock has been designated as the time for the picnic. Every family is asked to bring their own favorite picnic supper. Plates, silverware, cups and drinks will be furnished by the Bicentennial Committee.

The county-wide church service is scheduled to begin at 7:00 p.m. The welcome will be by Freddie Stice, pastor of First Assembly of God in Silverton. The invocation will be by Sid Parsley, pastor of First United Methodist Church in Quitaque.

There will be a hymn time next, with old-fashioned gospel singing. The scripture will be read by Frank Roberson, pastor of First Baptist Church, Quitaque. Larry Wilson, pastor of First Baptist Church in Silverton, will deliver the sermon, and the benediction

Additional Tornado Damage is Reported

A lot of damage from last week's twister has been reported since last week's issue of The Tribune.

Jim Saul had several horses injured at the Saul home northwest of Quitaque, including two young colts about six weeks old. The colts were either scared and ran into the fence or were blown into the fence and were cut severely. One of them received a very deep cut on the neck and bled to death. The other colt had to have quite a number of stitches to close his wounds and Jim reports that he is not doing very well. Jim said that all of his horses were scratched and cut during the storm.

A redwood fence at the Charles Barrett home was blown down. A trailer home belonging to Johnny Butler and located beside the home of Mrs. George Hulsey received considerable damage, and another small building at the Hulsey home was damaged. There was damage to buildings at the airstrip east of Quitaque. Several irrigation systems over the area, at Quitaque, Gasoline, Flomot and Turkey were severely damaged.

Two stores in Quitaque lost plate glass windows during the storm. Valley Farm Store lost a plate glass and Bedwell Hardware also lost a window. At Bedwell's it was reported that the glass popped outward and not a bit of glass was inside the store. Dan True, TV weatherman from Amarillo (he says that he will be back on the air about October 1) was in the area Tuesday and stopped at the Tribune office. He said that the glass popping out was the real give-away that a twister passed over.

Miss Lee Ann McMurry, pianist, played the traditional wedding march and several other selections.

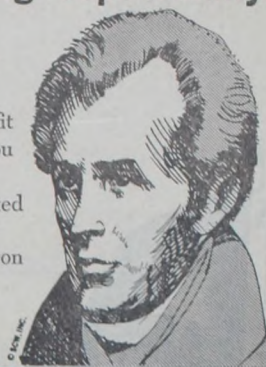

and the bridegroom is a 1974 graduate of Silverton High School. The couple will be at home in Lockney, where the bridegroom is employed by the Tye Company.

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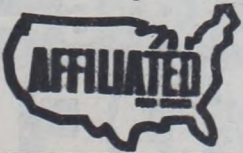
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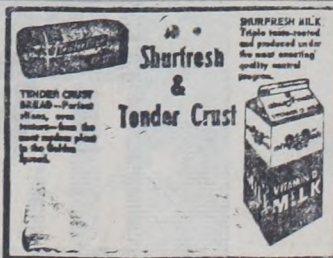

WASHINGTON HIGHLIGHTS

The U. S. Senate soon will consider a divestiture bill that would continue this Congress' foolishly consistent record of making the petroleum industry the scapegoat for many of the nation's economic problems if enacted. The bill, S. 2387, is the so-called Petroleum Industry Competition Act, better known as the divestiture act or the bill "to bust up big oil."

The measure would force the 18 largest oil companies to limit their activities to only one function of the petroleum industry, producing crude oil, transporting it, or refining and marketing. It could not do all three. Its alleged intent is to create greater competition in an industry that is already one of the more competitive in the world. Supposedly it is in response to the public's irritation with higher fuel prices. I believe it is an irrational response.

The culprit directly responsible for jacking up oil prices is the international cartel whose successful oil embargo in 1973 created economic panic in the United States, the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC). The U. S. now depends upon OPEC for more than 40 percent of its crude oil supplies, literally placing us at their mercy.

On likely result of the divestiture bill would be to strengthen OPEC's hand. A fragmented industry would be weakened against the proven strength of a unified OPEC. Forced divestiture would force the industry into an uproar of reorganization and restructuring that would demand its attention for at least the next several years, perhaps the next few decades. The New Deal's Holding Company Act, the last divestiture act of similar scope, took some 40 years to consummate.

The industry should be launching an all-out effort to increase exploration, production and development of our energy resources. The Congress should recognize reality and do everything possible to create an economic environment in which the industry could pursue these objectives. It is the best guessing, not only of the industry itself, but also of the Departments of Commerce and Treasury, that legislative divestiture would critically diminish access to capital necessary for such an effort.

There is some doubt the bill will pass the Senate. The Senate Judiciary Committee passed the bill June 16 by a margin of 8 to 7. In the event it survives a Senate test, I will continue my efforts to do whatever I can to help kill it in the House.

Shocking headlines concerning the sexual dalliances of a few members of Congress thankfully have moderated, but their impact has not. This is as it should be because I believe the result can be a stronger Congress. I earnestly hope so.

In my opinion, the situation which apparently existed prior to the disclosure was an inexcusable breach of legal and moral codes, an outrage to the taxpayers of this nation and an insult to a vast majority of the members of Congress who are honest, hardworking and dedicated to the interests of their constituents. I believe an elected official should try to be above reproach, both in public and private life, and I believe the news media has the responsibility of reporting any deviation from that standard. I also believe anyone not aspiring to such a standard has no place in public office.

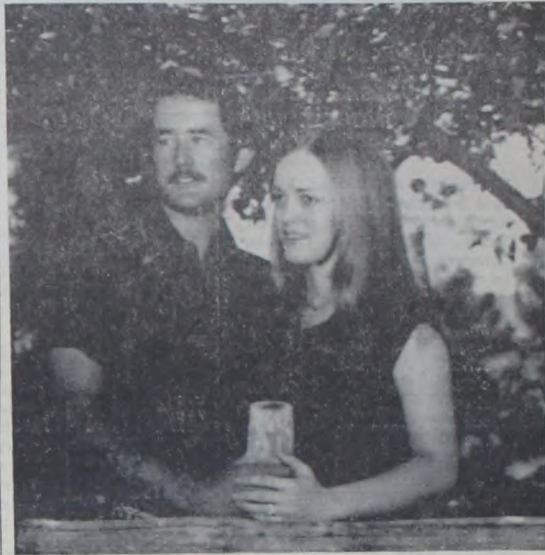
The House Committee on Standards of Official Conduct has my wholehearted support in its investigation of individual members, and I favor legislation that will reform House procedures to mandate accountability of how taxpayers' money is spent to enable a member of Congress to fulfill his or her responsibilities.

The bride presented both her mother and the groom's mother a long-stemmed white rose and a kiss.

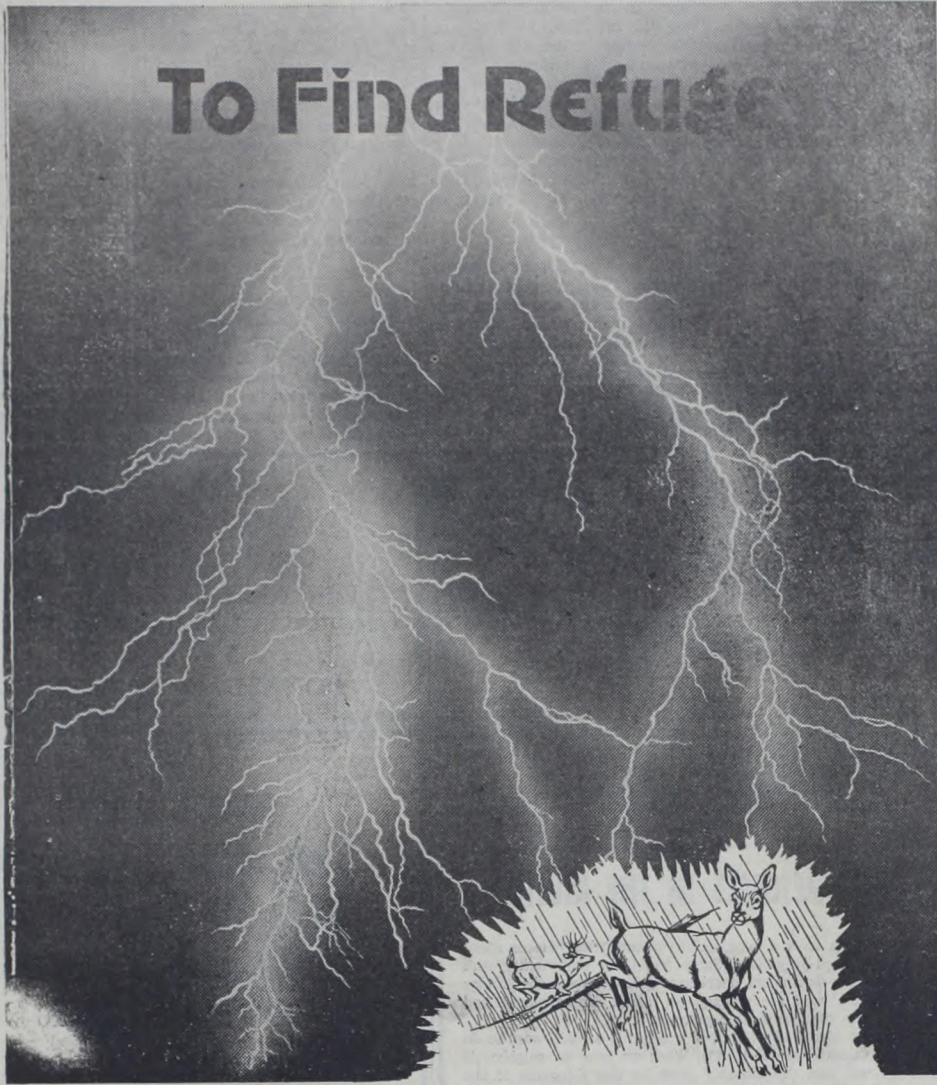

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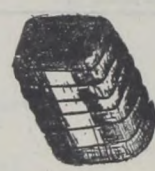
