## Boys And Girls Win Track Team Takes Honors

The Valley girls and boys attended their first track meet Saturday at Jayton, Texas. The boys came home with the team trophy by accumulating 101 points. Jayton boys were 2nd with 92 points. The girls were able to gather 22 points-good enough for 6th place.

For the boys, Warren Merrell started things off by turning in a 10:11.81 in the 3200 and out distancing Cody Stanaland by

more than 300 yds. Stanaland placed 2nd in the state in 1989; Merrell came in 4th in 1989. In a rematch later in the day the results were the same. Merrell came through in the mile with a first place time 4:30.81. This broke the meet record which had stood since 1968. The record was held by Morales of Post, Texas. The boys 400 relay proved to be no contest as the team of Kirk Garner, Bubba Clardy, Jason Smith and Clay

Edwards turned in a time of 44.74. Jayton boys came in at 45.33 good enough for second. Bubba Clardy proved he was the man to beat in the 100 meter dash as he held off Otis Dixon of Gorse to win the event with a personal best of 11.03. Clay Edwards repeated the outcome as he won the 200 meter dash with another personal best of 22.8. Dixon again had to settle for second. Edwards turned in a 22.62 in the prelims. Kirk Garner did not change the results when the 300H came around. Garner had no trouble beating Silverton's Bradley Brunson to earn the gold with a time of 41.45.

Stevie Moore proved that he would be around for awhile as the freshman came in 6th in the 400 meter dash with a time of 56.75. Other freshman that came through with great efforts were Clay Merrell with a 4th place finish in the 3200. Clay's time was 11:38.19. Clay also had an outstanding effort in the 1600 with a time of 5:24.48 good enough for 5th.

Nathan Davis, Bradley Price and Bobby Silva each turned in great efforts in the 800 meters. Davis came across the finish line in 4th place with a time of 2:18.26. Price just missed placing in the event with a 7th place

finish and a time of 2:24.52. Silva came in with a personal best of 2:38.21. Manual Silva running in the hurdle events for the first time came through with good times in both events. In the field events the showing was not as impressive as the running events. Clay Edwards came through with a 4th place finish in the high jump. Clay had a jump of 5'8.

Manual Silva and Stevie Moore each had good throws in the shot put but did not place. Silva also had a good effort in the discus but again did not place. The day ended with a great effort by the 1600 relay team. Clay Edwards started the race and came around the first quarter in a blistering time of 51.43. Moore took the baton and a big lead and turned in a time of 57.3. Clardy took his time and came through with a 54.7. Kirk Garner finished the race with a 54.8. The time of 3:38.21 easily beat out Jayton who came in with a second place time of 3:48.68.

The girls turned a great effort in the meet Celeste Sperry finished with a time of 15:02.19 to

## Quitaque Catholics Busy Building Center

The Quitaque Catholic Center has been a dream for residents since before 1982, when someone suggested they build one. The dream died for lack of money and interest but re-surfaced in 1985 and again in 1987; that's when a hand full of citizens decided it was time for action.

The 3200 sq. ft. building located on North Tunnell Street in Quitaque is much bigger and (soon to be) nicer than anyone could have ever imagined.

The Center when completed will contain a 60x40 feet meeting and dining room, a large kitchen, two restrooms, and a utility room for numerous community functions. It's primary use will be for meetings, Sunday School and community gatherings for the Catholic community, but according to Manuel Cruz, it will be made available to rent for other functions.

The building was designed by Cruz and built by Sam Audrain, Paul Leal and Clemente Leal. Most of the building materials were donated by an anonymous donor, and the Catholics were forced to make a small loan to

pay the carpenter's labor. At last a grant in the amount of \$20,000 to finish the inside work was granted by the Catholic Extension. The check was to be presented to Cruz in a Tuesday night meeting. "Other funds have come from donations, dinners, fund raisers and tamales, tamales, tamales. Man, those ladies of the church have really sold the tamales. Don't you need some?" Cruz said.

It is estimated the Center will be completed in three or four months, and plans for landscaping the yard and parking area are underway.

The Quitaque Catholic Center will certainly be an added asset to the City of Quitaque, as well the neighborhood and community as a whole.

Needless to say, the Quitaque Catholics are feeling pretty good about themselves and what they have accomplished.

**NUEVO STUDY CLUB**

Mrs. Kathleen Green read the minutes which were approved as read. A short discussion of the flower planting project was made by Mrs. Ella Colvin and will be discussed again at the next meeting.

Mrs. Nadine Baisden, as program leader, called on each member present to answer roll call with interesting short topics. She then presented the program which featured the Celebration of the 200th Anniversary of the United States Judiciary, the Bicentennial of the United States Judiciary, the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution.  
 This February 1990 is the Anniversary of the first meeting of the United States Supreme Court and the beginning of 200 years of partnership between our Federal and State Judicial systems.

President George Washington named our first six justice members who were: John Rutledge of South Carolina; James Wilson of Pennsylvania; John Blair of Virginia; William Cushing of Massachusetts and James Iredell of North Carolina. For the first three years, meeting in New York and then in Philadelphia, the Supreme Court did not hear any cases. But the six members were kept busy, traveling the roads of America as they presided over both trial cases and appeals in the circuits. Today, the Federal Circuit Courts have their own appointed judges.

This judiciary presided over the 1st Census Act March 1, 1790 and the April 10, 1790 First Patent Act. On May 29, 1790, Rhode Island became the 13th state to ratify the Constitution followed on May 31, 1790 by the first Copyright act. On July 16, 1790 the Legislature selected the District of Columbia as the permanent seat of government, stipulating that 1800 is the year set for the occupation of the New Capitol. Philadelphia was selected as the temporary seat of government for the next 10 years. Then on December 6, 1790 the three branches of government assembled in Philadelphia for the final date to commemorate this 200th Anniversary year.

## Triumphs Of Technology

How do you input a pile of documents into a computer? You can:

1. Keyboard them in one letter at a time.
2. Use a scanner.

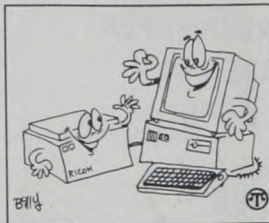


Image scanners turn words and pictures into information a computer can understand.

With a scanner, you place the document face down on a glass platform, press a button, and the words on the paper are automatically transferred into the computer. No need to keyboard in the words!

A scanner takes a picture of a document, diagram or anything placed on it and turns it into electrical signals a computer can understand. These signals are then stored in the computer or retrieved on a computer screen to be edited using specialized software programs.

Ricoh Corporation, a pioneer in image scanning technology, manufactures scanners which use sophisticated "optical character recognition" software to accurately read electrical signals that correspond to letters, numbers and punctuation marks in a document. These characters can then be edited right on the screen, printed out on paper or stored in the computer. With image-editing software, drawings and other graphics that are scanned can be manipulated right on the screen to create a totally new version of the original.

The versatile scanner is a valuable piece of office equipment for any business that needs to store information or to change it, be it text or pictures.

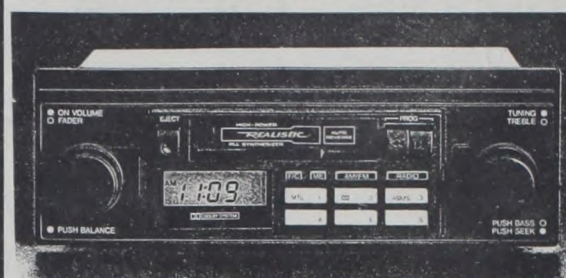


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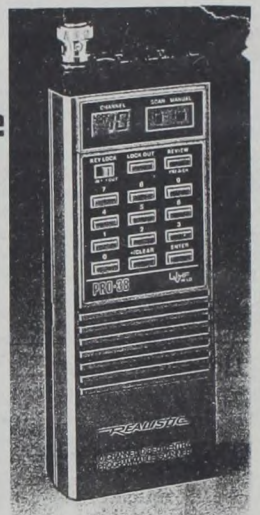
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## Briscoe County Extension News

National Nutrition Month promotion will be sponsored by the county Extension Home Economics Committee and county Extension Service with educational exhibits in Merrell Food during the week of March 26-31.

Grocery shoppers will find informational posters at the meat, produce, dairy foods, and breads sections of the grocery store during the week.

Free publications on cholesterol, fat, and sodium and hints for reducing these in food preparation will be available on Wednesday, March 28, along with a video presentation and tasting of a "healthy" food.

All county residents are invited to drop by and take advantage of this educational information to promote March as National Nutrition Month. This is a free service.

The Extension Home Economics Committee is sponsoring programs to reduce heart disease risk during 1990.

Community leaders from all parts of Briscoe County are again being asked to identify critical local issues and help determine possible solutions as the Texas Agricultural Extension Service begins planning long range programs to help meet these local concerns.

Briscoe County Judge Jimmy Burson and the county Extension Program Council have asked 60 citizens from throughout the county to meet April 3 in the school cafeteria in Silverton as a study group to help identify these critical issues—matters of wide public concern.

A panel of local resource persons will report to the study group the status of economic, social, and environmental conditions in the county.

The study group will divide into four task forces: agriculture and natural resources, home economics, youth, and community development. Each entire study group will then discuss how these affect county conditions.

"Identifying these key issues and incorporating them into a statewide plan will enable the Extension Service to better meet the public's needs," county Extension agent Lynda Fogerson said.

Similar study groups will meet in each county in Texas during March and April. More than 12,000 Texans took part in the first series of long range planning meetings in 1986, and identified almost 5,000 issues facing citizens. These were grouped into 12 broad statewide issues which have directed Extension Service planning through 1990.

"We had excellent participation in this process in 1986, and have had great support for the educational activities we have conducted to address the concerns they identified," Fogerson said.

Family health and nutrition was identified as a critical concern in 1986, due to the lack of health facilities and services in the county. Since that time, the home economics committee and Extension agent have conducted a Wellness at the Worksite study services for 126 participants in four county locations—Silverton and Valley schools, Briscoe Implement, and First National Bank of Quitaque.

A cholesterol screening reached 197 residents, and Fit for Life programs were conducted for 42 elementary students and adults. A Shape-Up leader training, computerized health risk appraisal and programs on Doctor/Patient Partnership and Light and Healthy Eating reached another 98 people.

Home economics newsletters to 255 families and news columns were additional health education methods. Programs to reduce heart disease risk factors are planned during 1990.

Economic development in the county was another concern addressed during the past three years. Through the cooperative efforts of many county organizations and leaders, the following economic development programs have been conducted or organized: job preparation seminar, bed and breakfast homes, home based business seminar, tourism promotion through Media Day and hunting guide, summer bazaar, Caprock Jamboree, sidewalk museum, and economic development task force.

## NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO CENTRANET SERVICE

GTE Southwest Incorporated gives notice of its proposed tariff changes to CentraNet service, which is a Central Office-based service that provides PBX-type features to multi-line business customers and is currently being offered in all company wire centers where such facilities exist to provide the service.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet 1000, CentraNet 2000, and CentraNet 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. The deadline to intervene in this docket is 3:00 p.m., April 9, 1990.

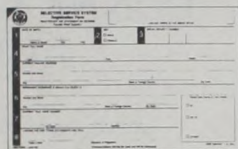

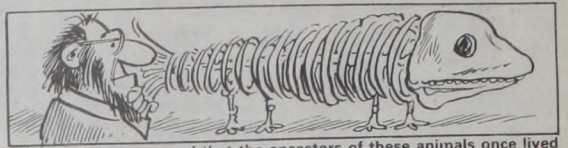

Parents will also be asked to fill out a slip with their name and address so that they will be

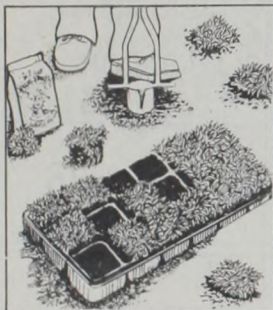
eligible for a drawing for a prize to be given away later in the month.

### Plug Into a Better Lawn



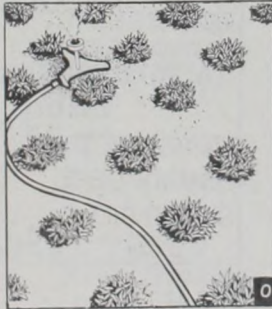
Step 1: After watering area thoroughly, make holes in a checkerboard pattern, about 18 inches apart.



Step 2: Put one teaspoon of 18-18-6 fertilizer in hole.



Step 3: Plant grass plugs securely, tapping soil around roots to eliminate air pockets.



Step 4: Water regularly until plugs are firmly rooted, about 7-10 days.

Plugging is one of the simplest and most economical ways for homeowners to repair damaged portions of lawns or establish new lawns for only pennies per square foot.

The key to successful plugging is to use pre-rooted plugs, available in garden centers throughout the southeastern states.

Pursley, Inc. has revolutionized lawn plugging by developing pre-rooted plugs with fully developed root systems. This reduces the incidence of transplant shock, common in homemade plugs.

Southern grasses are available in plugs and the cost is about 50 percent less than professionally installed sod. Each carry-home tray contains 18 large grass plugs which, when spaced 18 inches apart, will cover an area of

50 square feet.

The plugging process is quite simple and can be done a little at a time nearly any time of the year. Using a plugger or auger - available at most garden centers - dig holes in a checkerboard pattern about 18 inches apart. Water the plugs immediately after installation and continue to water regularly for up to two weeks.

The maintenance routine for lawns vary from area to area. Local nurseries or county extension agents can give advice on proper mowing height, food and water frequency and pest control techniques.
