For trees and shrubs, use two level tablespoons of copperas, two level tablespoons of water and include about one and one half detergent to insure even coverage. For grasses, increase the amount of copperas to three level tablespoons in the same mixture. Three or four applications at weekly intervals may be required for effective control.

In addition to foliar spray, applications of copparas are recommended. One pound of copperas per 100 square feet of area broadcast and watered is adequate.

Chelated iron compounls are also effective for controlling chlorosis when applied as directed by the manufacturer.

Copperas will stain masonary and other material or equipment it left in contact. Remove solutions by rinsing and sweep walks clean of material immediately after application.




