Electric pencil sharpeners are plugged in and turn on automatically when a pencil is inserted. Shavings are collected in a removable drawer. A familiar maker of household appliances, Sunbeam, is one of the leaders in this new and growing field, offering a smartly-styled automatic unit for less than \$20.

Just remember, you're a business woman, whether or not you have an office job outside - and your office at home should be just as well arranged and equipped including an electric pencil sharpener. It's great for school age children too!

SNORING

Snoring may signify a medical problem - polyps in the nose, forcing the person to sleep with his mouth open; nasal congestion due to a cold, sinus trouble, or hay fever; enlarged adenoids and tonsils - or it may simply result from an improper position for sleeping or poorly ventilated room. If various remedies do not work - such as sleeping on your stomach or side - consult your physician.

Persistent high blood pressure can be dangerous to your entire cardiovascular system. Blood pressure readings are among the simplest and completely painless procedures known to medical science. If your physician discovers high blood pressure in an examination, he will examine you further in an attempt to find the reason, and then prescribe the necessary treatment to combat the elevated blood pressure.

VARICOSE VEINS IN PREGNANCY

The development of varicose veins often occurs in pregnant women. This is mainly due to weight gain and pressure exerted on the pelvic veins. It becomes increasingly difficult for the veins closest to the surface of the legs to support their share of the blood flow to the heart. Shirttail Sermon

"And whosoever shall compel thee to go a mile, go with him two."

These words are quoted from Matthew 5:41. There are those who will not go even one mile. These are the people who, when confronted by a fellow-man in need, pass by on the other side. They cannot be troubled by that which does not directly affect them. They do not always rejoice in the misfortune of others but they certainly do nothing to alleviate the suffering and sorrow.

Second, there are those who will go one mile but no more. These people do what is absolutely necessary. Socially, they adhere to the letter of the law. Spiritually, they begrudge even the smallest inconvenience that is caused by helping someone. They also resent any assistance offered to an "outsider" or "one who is not one of us."

Third, there are those who, for Christ's sake, will go to all limits in order to do the right thing. These people are referred to by fellowmen as "saints." They do not lay claim to such title but it is bestowed in love by their fellow Christians. There are several in every community. They are not hard to find: all worthwhile projects are undertaken and supported actively by such people.

A NEW CHURCH FOR A NEW WORLD

(This is the second part of the "World" prepared for The Valley Tribune by the Rev. Roy Havens, pastor of the Turkey United Methodist Church.)

The charge conference shall be the connecting link between the local church and the general church with oversight of the Administrative Board.

Its primary responsibility shall be to evaluate the program of the charge, to set goals for the ensuing year, and to develop some specific proposals to be put into practice by the Administrative Board.

The charge conference shall elect the lay leader, lay member to Annual Conference, work area chairmen, age-level coordinators, recording secretary, superintendent of the study program, district steward, church treasurer, Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, the Committee on Finance, the Committee on Nominations and Personnel, and the trustees.

It shall recommend candidates for the ministry, as well as lay pastors.

It shall set the salary for the pastor and staff.

It shall determine the amount accepted by the charge for world service and conference benevolences.

In cases of two or more churches on the same charge, it shall: provide for a Charge Administrative Board, if necessary; elect a Charge Treasurer, if deemed necessary; provide for a Charge Committee on Nominations and Personnel composed of at least one representative from each church which shall nominate such officers and committees as are necessary for the Charge Conference to carry on its work.

It shall have such other duties and responsibilities as the General, Jurisdictional, or Annual Conference may duly commit to it.

Next week, we shall turn our attention to the membership and duties of the Administrative Board.

Kiddies in the Kitchen by Betty Crocker

When a gal is 6 and a fellow age 4, or thereabouts — nothing beats cookie baking for rainy day recreation. So for the recreational director — that's you, Mom — here are two simple recipes and a few child-styled tricks. Make the cereal bars directed or shape mixture into popcorn balls and build candy lily hats or snowmen. To doll up the butter cookies, roll 1-inch balls of dough into sugar before pressing flat. Or brush baked cookies with corn syrup and sprinkle with decorator's sugars. And for the Kiddies-in-the-Kitchen motto, everybody memorize: "Leave the kitchen spic and span so Mother will let you bake again."

- BUTTER COOKIES**
 1/2 cup butter
 3/4 cup sugar
 2 cups New Bisquick
 Heat oven to 400°. In large mixer bowl, cream butter and sugar. Mix in New Bisquick thoroughly. Shape dough into 1-inch balls. Place on ungreased baking sheet; flatten with floured fork. Bake about 8 minutes. Cool slightly before removing from baking sheet. Makes about 3 1/2 dozen.

 Butter square pan, 9x9x2-inches. In large saucepan, blend gelatin, syrup and butter. Heat to boiling over medium heat, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; stir in cereal until thoroughly coated. Turn into prepared pan; pat mixture evenly in pan with buttered back of spoon. Cover; chill about 30 minutes. Cut into 1 1/2-inch squares. Store covered at room temperature. Makes 3 dozen.

 Follow recipe for Butter Cookies (above) except—add 1/2 teaspoon almond extract.
- Lemon Butter Cookies:**
 Follow recipe for Butter Cookies (above) except—add grated peel of 1 lemon.
