Fans See Fine Basketball Games

The Quitaque High School gym was the scene of some torrid basketball action Friday night of last week and Tuesday night of this week.

Last Friday night Quitaque was host to Flomot, and for the Panthers it was showdown time for the Longhorns were undefeated in district play and winners in the first round of play. Another loss by the Panthers would just about eliminate them from any chance at defending their district title.

Fans from Flomot, Quitaque, Turkey and some from Matador came to witness the battle and a battle they saw for when the final buzzer sounded the Panthers had a one-point margin on the scoreboard. A Flomot player committed a foul just as the buzzer sounded and Perry Brunson added two more points after the game had ended to make the final score 57-54.

In the first game of the evening the Pantherettes won 59-36 over the Flomot girls.

Tuesday night of this week fans saw another classic affair, this one between the Pantherettes of OHS and the Turkettes of THS, and when the firing was over the Pantherettes squeaked by the Turkettes 52-50.

The Panther - Longhorn game was a dandy. The score was tied nine times in the first two quarters of play. At the end of the first quarter the scoreboard read 10-10. At half-time it was 25-25.

The third period belonged to the Panthers as they began to pull away from the Longhorns, one time opening up a 12-point, 42-30 edge and at the end of the

quarter still owned a 9-point, 44-35 bulge.

However the Longhorns came to play and that crew started picking away at the Quitaque lead and with about three minutes left to play the Longhorns still trailed 47-55 and there they shut the Panthers out the rest of the way and pulled to within a single point, 54-55 as time ran out. Then Perry Brunson tossed in the two free shots after time had run out.

Billy Green of the Longhorns scored 21 points to lead all shooters in the contest, hitting 14 of them in the first half of play.

Stanley Price and Perry Brunson shared scoring honors for the winners with 18 points each.

Danny Jones hit 10 points for the Panthers, Gary Chandler 7, Merrell 2, and Hutcheson 2.

Alvia Calvert was the leader in the fourth quarter drive and he wound up the night with 12 points. Johnny Turner hit for 11, David Hunter 8, Winston 3 and Crowell 1 point.

The Pantherettes were pretty well in control in their game all the way, leading 13-7, 28-14, and 45-22 at the end of quarters.

For the winners, Jackie Cheatham racked up 33 points; Glenna Ramsey scored 13 points; Wanda Ramsey 8; Stephanie Chadwick scored 4 points and Vanessa Robison added one point.

Susie Gilbert scored 24 points to spark the Longhorns. Jane Pitt hit for 6 and Wells 4.

Quitaque and Turkey squared off in a pair of very important contests Tuesday night. The Turkey teams were both fighting to stay alive in the race for

district honors. The Turkettes made a great bid and almost pulled out a come-from-behind win but fell 52-50 to the district leading Pantherettes.

The Panthers won 82-60 in a game that was hotly contested despite the score.

The Pantherettes took a 14-10 lead over the Turkettes in the first quarter of play. The Turkettes came right back to outscore the Pantherettes in the second quarter and went to the dressing room with a 23-22 point lead. The Pantherettes regained the lead in the third period, one time owning a 33-26 margin but Turkey narrowed it to 3 points at the end of the third quarter.

Quitaque pushed the lead to 7 points in the early minutes of the final quarter, then pulled even at 40-40. The winners led by 59-44 with a little over two minutes to go and the Turks made a great try to win but time ran out on them.

Jackie Cheatham pumped in 36 points for the winners to take scoring honors. Glenna Ramsey hit for 10 points for Quitaque; Wanda Ramsey scored 4 and Neva Morrison 2.

Sally Case led the Turkettes with 20 points; Debbie Lane hit for 18 points; Lindy Ham 6 and Lonita Farley 4.

The Turks and Panthers matched each other shot for shot in the first period of action, with the Turks leading 22-19 at the quarters end. The Panthers found the range in the second period and led 40-30 at half-time. The third period found the Pantherettes finally put it all together and had their biggest quarter of the

season, scoring 24 points to lead 64-42 at the end of three quarters. The Turks, however, refused to quit and battled the Panthers on even terms the fourth quarter, gaining some ground up to the middle of the final period when the winners scored seven straight points to ice it away.

Stanley Price and Rod Setliff put on quite a showing exhibition for the fans, Price getting 24 for the winners and Setliff getting 21 for the Turks.

Chandler scored 19 points for the winners, Brunson 15, Merrell and Hutcheson 7 each, Jones 4, Johnston and King 2 each and Scotty Stark 1 point.

Rod Adamson hit for 19 points for the Turks, Dennis King 9, Mike King 7 and Polly 3.

Flomot drove to Estelline Tuesday for a pair of district games with EHS, winning the boys game 51-56, with Estelline winning the girls game 34-24.

Susie Gilbert scored 16 points against the Bearettes, and Jan Rapp hit for 17 for the winners.

In the boys game Alvia Calvert led all scorers with 34 points. Trevino had 15 for the Bears.

Turkey plays Matador at Turkey Friday night and will go to Estelline Tuesday night.

Flomot has an open date Friday night and will play Matador at Matador Tuesday night and will wind up regular season play Friday night of next week when they play Turkey at Flomot.

Quitaque plays Estelline Friday at Quitaque Friday night and will have a non-district contest with Paducah at Quitaque next Tuesday night.

She also has 13 grandchildren, 19 great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild, Stephanie Prichard who was present with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gary Prichard of Abilene.

Mrs. Washington was born Alcy Kizzah Jasper, on a farm near Desdemona, Texas. Her family later moved to Briscoe County, and she was married to Marvin C. Shirttail Sermon

Paul the Apostle in II Corinthians 3:3 said that each Christian is "the epistle of Christ . . . written not with ink, but with the Spirit of the living God; not in tables of stone, but in fleshy tables of the heart." This epistle which Paul is speaking of in these verses is a very special concept. Contrary to what one man wrongly thought, an epistle is not the wife of an apostle. Rather it is a letter much like one Americans might mail in the post office in 1970.

In this cast, Paul imagines in the back of his mind a new concept which likens every Christian to an epistle, of sorts. Some people in Paul's day would carry an epistle (letter) of recommendation with them as they went from one church to another. This letter from their "folks back home" would inform the new church to which they journeyed that they were good, hard working Christians. Paul said that he did not need such letters of recommendation, for his ministry was marked by God's Holy Spirit, and not man's praise.

Each place the Apostle journeyed he left his calling card: the lives of men born again by saving faith in Jesus Christ. These were lives resembling epistles, gladly laid open for all men to read, written on men's hearts, and signed with the spilled blood of Jesus Christ. Christ would have each Christian display an open life which all

men could read and follow safely into the fold.
