LOWER ACP FUNDS FOR TEMPORARY CONSERVATION PRACTICES

The Federal Government's share of the cost of temporary conservation practices is being set at 30 percent under the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) for Briscoe County. This is Washington policy and not local.

Even stronger emphasis than before is being placed on enduring conservation practices. This is in conformity with the expressed desire of the Congress that ACP funds should be used for conservation practices with the most lasting value for agriculture and for the general public. Considered as temporary measures are such practices as wind erosion control (chiseling, listing, deep plowing, and cotton bur application).

The Federal cost - share for these practices has been 50 percent, but will be 30 percent thereafter.

Important School Legislation Passed

At the recent Quitaque P-TA meeting, Supt. Herman Moseley explained to patrons how the state determined how many teachers a school was entitled to each year.

Since that time some changes have been made, Mr. Moseley reports.

The 61st State Legislature has passed many important school laws during the regular session and also during the special session that just ended.

One very important law passed by the 61st Legislature was House Bill 21 that permits schools to have a choice of current Average Daily Attendance for determining how many class room teachers they will have, or use the Average Daily Attendance that has been established during the prior year. This law also provides for a school to apply for additional class room teacher units due to increased enrollment during the school year.

This law will be most helpful for school that have lost pupils during the summer or those who have a more or less static pupil population. Quitaque school is in this class of schools as our school earned nine class room teachers during the school year of 1968-69 on Average Daily Attendance and the new law No. 21 assures the school of having that many teacher units approved on the Minimum Foundation Program for 1969-70. Before this law was passed, we would not know how many teachers we would be entitled to in '69-70 until after school was out next May of 1970. This law makes the budgeting of school funds more practical and based on a sound business basis of operation.

This very important school legislation was submitted by Gov. Preston Smith as emergency legislation and all rules of both houses were suspended so that the bills could be passed more rapidly and provide the school administrators with definite information in regard to budgeting funds for 1969-70. Lt.-Gov. Ben Barnes and Speaker Gus Metzger of the House of Representatives cooperated fully in giving these bills an opportunity to be passed into law. Representative George Henson and Sen. A. M. Aiken were responsible for the bills being put into law so rapidly. An expression of thanks and gratitude is certainly in order from all the people in the Quitaque School District to the men named above for this important school law.

Turks Try Lefors Friday Looking For First Win

The Turkey Turks took on its second Class A team in succession last Friday night, that one being at Turkey against the Silverton Owls, with the Turks being outscored 32-6.

The Turks had to go without the services of starting quarterback Rod Setliff, who broke a thumb in the opening game of the season and will be lost for probably four weeks at least.

The Turks received the opening kickoff on the 20. David Lane lugging it out to the 38 yard line, where it was fumbled away on the first play from scrimmage. The Owls promptly returned the favor on their first play from scrimmage and the Turks were back in business on their own 38 yard line. Three running plays netted the Turks 6 yards and they were forced to punt. A low snap from center delayed the punt, which was blocked and recovered on the Turkey 24 yard line. The Owls

scored from there in three plays with Marvin Self going the last 13 yards for the TD. The try for extra point failed and the Owls were out in front 6-0.

The Turks couldn't stir up much of an offense on their next possession and had to give up the ball and the Owls promptly marched for another score, Bill Strange going over from the 5. The try for extra points was no good and the Owls led 12-0.

The Turks held the Owls scoreless in the second period of play but still weren't able to move the ball much. Billy Vivens broke for 16 yards on one carry to pick up the Turks only first down in the period.

Turkey kicked off to the Owls to start the second half of play and Bill Strange broke loose from the defenders and appeared head for the end zone. Dennis Irby, however, had other ideas, however, and hauled the big (190 lbs.) halfback down on the Owl 10. Silverton scored two plays later, Self, a 200 pounder scored from the 5 yard line. The Owl quarterback carried over for two, making score 20-0.

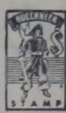
