Hunter Orange Required On Pat Mayse Area

"Hunter orange" clothing will be required of everyone who hunts deer this season on the Parks and Wildlife Department's Pat Mayse Wildlife Management Area in Lamar County.

At their November 8 meeting, Parks and Wildlife Commissioners instructed executive director Clayton Garrison to establish rules concerning the use of "protective coloration clothing" on the area.

According to Garrison, the department will require each hunter on the Mayse Area to have at least 144-square inches of clothing in either orange, red or yellow.

"Such clothing," said Garrison, "may consist of either a hat or an outer garment worn above the waistline in any of the three required colors."

Bucks-only deer hunting on the Mayse Area is November 17-30, 1973, with a \$3 fee charged of each hunter for a single day's hunting.

The bag limit is one buck, and 75 hunters will be allowed on the area with no repeat hunting after the first day unless the daily quota is unfilled.

Shirttail Sermon

Exodus 3:5: "And he said, Draw not nigh hither, put off thy shoes from off thy feet, for the place whereon thou standest is holy ground."

At this point in time, Moses was keeping the flock of Jethro, his father-in-law. He led the flock to the ackside of the desert to the mountain of God, called Horeb. Here Moses saw the angel of the Lord appear in a flame of fire in the midst of a burning bush.

The main point we want to look for is that Moses was told to take off his shoes because he stood on holy ground. In other words, God did not want his place defiled. Later, when God was to speak to the children of Israel out of his mount, he sent Moses to tell his children to prepare themselves for three days so that God could talk to them. They had to cleanse themselves and abstain from wrongdoing to come into the presence of God.

I am not saying that you need to take your shoes off or something like this before going into the presence of the Lord. The thing that you and I do need to get rid of, or take off, is the sin that keeps us from being close to the

Lord. Look at a shoe this way. It covers the foot completely. Sin in a Christian person's life is the same way. Our soul is inside us. It is safe and secure, but sin can begin to cover us up, hiding our Christian life. No, not being lost again, but dimming our light of the love of God. When a person takes off a shoe, the foot becomes visible. Likewise, when a man goes to God to obtain forgiveness for his sins, his Christian life becomes visible. We can come close to the Lord and show people of the world we are Christians.

I believe that not only our church life, but our whole life, should be as good as it can be lived. We need to be close to the Lord when we go to church, and in our everyday life. This can only be done by getting our sin out of the way, or taking off the shoe.
