## Valley Dropped To Class B in Realignment

Valley High School will be competing in Class B next year, the University Interscholastic League has announced. In addition to Valley, Sudan, Ropesville and Anton will be dropped to B and all four teams will compete in Class II-B which will become a 14-team district.

Officials of the 14 schools got together Monday night to work on the new alignment and set up the district schedules for next fall.

Supt. Loran Denton stated that they spent a great part of Monday night getting the district zoned and schedules worked out. The new district will be as follows:

In the south zone of District 2-B will be New Home, Whiteface, Wil-

son, Meadow, Anton, Ropesville and Sundown.

The north zone will be composed of Valley, Matador, Sudan, Amherst, Nazareth, Lazbuddie and Happy.

District play begins September 27, and a playoff game between the zone winners will be held on November 15 or 16 to determine the district champion.

Valley's district schedule will be as follows:

Sept. 27—Matador, here  
Oct. 4—Sudan, there  
Oct. 11—Open  
Oct. 18—Happy, here  
Oct. 25—Lazbuddie, there  
Nov. 1—Nazareth, here  
Nov. 8—Amherst, there

The above alignment is for football only. In basketball, chances are that Valley will be assigned to schools north of here, but that alignment has not been announced as yet.

Coaches in the schools affected generally are pleased at the new assignments for it gives the school a chance to compete against schools nearer their size.

Valley, for instance, has been on the very lower edge of the A classification and most of the time being below the 120 break point. The alignment enrollment has been changed now and Class A starts at 125.

Present enrollment at the Valley Schools by grades is as follows:

Kindergarten, 35; First Grade, 38; Second, 30; Third, 40; Fourth, 25; Fifth, 47; Sixth, 38; Seventh, 35; Eighth, 39; Ninth, 28; Tenth, 34; Eleventh, 30, and Twelfth, 25.

If the Valley Schools should retain the present students, enrollment at Valley in high school would rise for the next several years. But that does not always happen, of course.

### Harvest Time Is Here

Harvest time is here and it is time to think about restoring the land to its peak production condition, according to Royce Frisbie of the Soil Conservation Service.

Severe damage occurred to terraces and other conservation measures in Hall County during heavy rains in June and July. As it was too late to repair these damages, most of the land users only smoothed out the breaks enough to get their equipment in the fields and get crops planted.

Very few terraced fields escaped some type of damage. Some terraces need to be repaired and some may need replacing. Anyone having any questions about their land should stop by the Soil Conservation Service office and we will be glad to assist in any way possible. The main objective of the Soil Conservation Service is to "protect our soils and other natural resources," quoted Frisbie.

During the remainder of the quarter the Patriots lost the ball on a fumble, intercepted a Wheeler pass, held the visitors and forced them to give up possession on the Valley 28, then moved to a first down at midfield and then lost it on a fumble as the game ended.

Defensively the Patriots once again scrapped their opponents all the way and the Mustangs had to work for their yardage. On offense the Patriots moved the ball at times but fumbled it away or had interceptions kill the drives.

It was a good ball game, and a fine team effort with no single player dominating in either the offense or defense. It is amazing to this reporter how these lightweight youngsters go barreling into their bigger opponents and keep coming back for more. One spectator at Friday night's game who had not seen the Patriots play this year kept repeating "That's the scrappiest bunch of kids I've ever seen."

Friday night the Patriots go to Wellington to take on the Skyrockets. It is hoped that a good crowd will follow the Patriots to the game and help them with your presence.

### Bids Awarded For Construction of Two Watershed Sites

Paul Montgomery, chairman of the Hall-Donley WCID No. 1, announced that bids for construction of two more sites in the Lakeview Watershed had been awarded.

The low bid of \$477,071.20 went to the Wilson Construction Co., Inc., El Reno, Oklahoma.

The two dams, located approximately three and one-half miles north of Brice on the Lawrence Hagy Ranch are named Site No. 3, on the western tributary of Bittercreek, and No. 5 on the eastern tributary of Bittercreek.

Completion is expected in approximately 534 days, Montgomery stated.

There are 24 structures planned in the watershed. Site 4 has been recently completed all except the vegetative part which will be let under a separate contract, Montgomery concluded.

**Six Accidents Investigated In County In Sept.**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of September, according to Sergeant J. R. Smith, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in no one killed and five persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1973 shows a total of 39 accidents resulting in two persons killed and 18 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for September 1973 shows a total of 601 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 364 persons injured as compared to September 1972 with 561 accidents resulting in 21 persons killed and 335 persons injured. This was 40 more accidents, three more fatalities, and 29 more injured in 1973 at the same period of time.

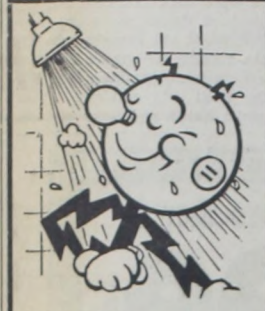
