Most of the soil in Hall County is mixed land soil and is subject to wind and water erosion. One of the most effective ways to prevent water erosion is to instal and maintain a system of terraces to hold the water where it falls Hall County has over 10,000 miles of terraces on the ground and there are still quite a few farms not terraced. Several of these unterraced farms have numerous gullies and hundreds of tons of guilles and numerous of tons of topsoil are washed away each ye ar. This soil loss can be greatly reduced with a system of terrac-es, Frisbie stated.
