Gospel Music-Nashville Style Comes To Clyde

Mr. Mason has been called, the World's Smallest Gospel Singer, because of his unique height of only 46 inches. His voice however, has no comparison to his size. When he sings, his booming, bass voice brings a thrill to everyone that listens.

During the program you will hear a variety of songs. The mood can change quickly from a deep spiritual moving hymn to like "Hallelujah" to a rousing hand-clapping gospel favorite like "Daddy Sang Bass." The experience of many years of performing before audiences around the world, accredits this very talented young man with being truly a professional in his chosen field of Gospel Music.

Lowell Mason began his career at the very early age of only 9 years. At that time he joined the staff of the "Children's Bible Hour" radio broadcast out of Grand Rapids, Michigan. For seven years, the was a regular feature on that weekly radio program which was heard from coast to coast. During his teenage years, Lowell worked with the organization called Youth for Christ in the United States, and with Victorious Christian Youth in Canada. During his Junior High and High School years, Lowell was constantly in

demand for weekend, and summer personal appearances.

After completion of high school in 1955, Lowell Mason joined the Cecil Todd Evangelistic Team of Joplin, Missouri. In 1965 the Todd Team established the Christian Evangelizers Association.

The Christian Evangelizers Association produces a weekly television series called "Revival Fires." The Revival Fires TV program is seen on more than 150 television stations throughout the United States. Lowell Mason was featured regularly on this program from 1964 till 1974.

Little Lowell and the Masons travel nearly 100,000 miles each year taking the Gospel in song to people of all faiths.

This special program is designed to appeal to all people, ages 1-100, and is open to the general public. There is no admission charge. A free-will offering will be received.

Towns Recieve Tax Share Checks

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent \$96.2 million to 967 Texas cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for November.

The 1982 statewide total so far this year is up 9.3 percent over the 1981 total up through the same date of last year. This payment reflects taxable sales made in September and reported to the state by the end

of October.

Callahan County towns receiving checks were Baird-\$5,533.45, Clyde-\$10,309.33, Cross Plains-\$7,768.02, and Putnam with \$2,455.54.

The city and MTA sales tax are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

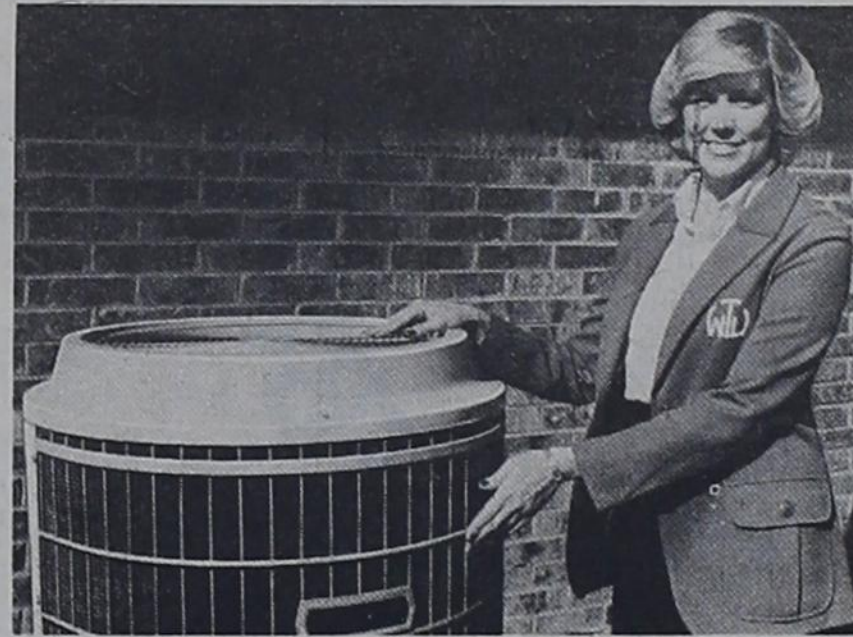

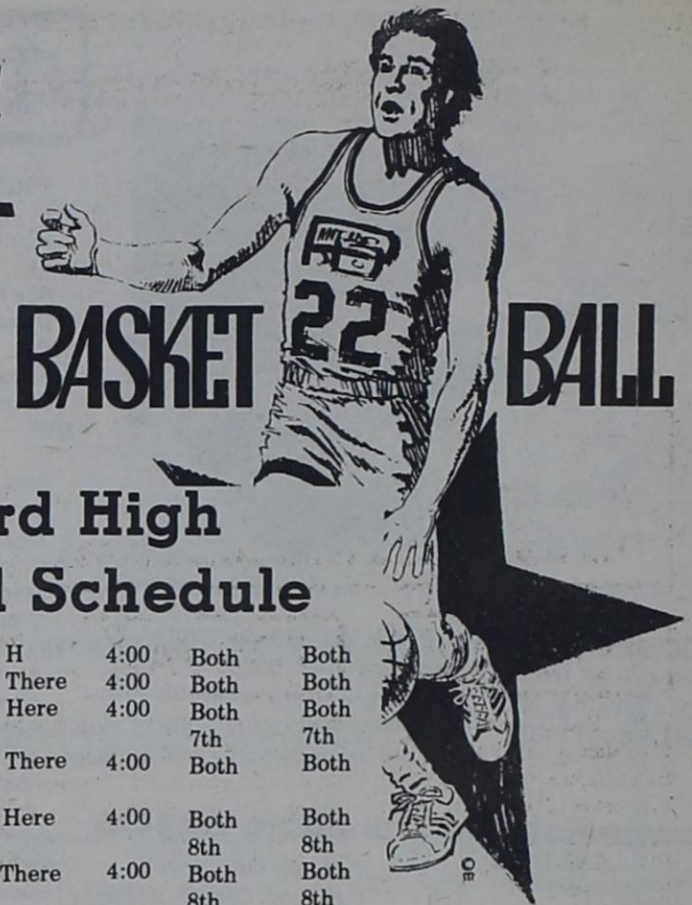

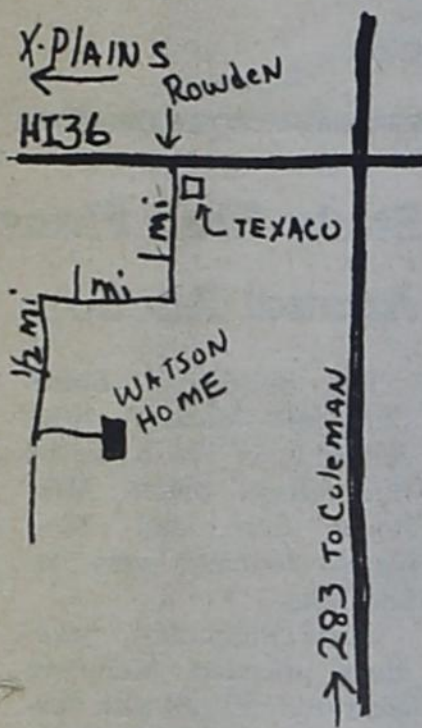
