



> Little Lowell and the Masons travel nearly 100,-000 miles each year taking the Gospel in song to people of all faiths.





of October.

The city and MTA sales tax are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.
