"The problem of having no jail in Hall County seems to be growing on us by the day," County Judge Lester Campbell said With this big load, the holding facility of the City of Memphis is very inadequate, and we have to find out-of-town housing for this week.

week of our Phase I completion," the judge said, "Sheriff Elmer Neel informed me that he has been told by the Swisher County sheriff that that county can no longer take any Hall County prisoners." Neel explained that the Swisher County jailer had quit, causing the jail to become de-certified; in addition, Neel was told that the Swisher County jail was over-populated, and able to care only for that county's pri-

Sheriff Neel said that he contacted the Childress sheriff asking for jail space; he was told that Childress County would accomodate Hall County prisoners only as an emergency measure, since that jail, too, is overcrowded at times

We have turned to about all the sources we can turn to," Neel except those who have already taken steps to correct their faciliites, are in the same shape we

Neel went on to explain that at times he has had to defer ma-king arrests for some minor offenses, simply because he had no place to house the detainees.

For example, the sheriff said, this past week we had one man awaiting transfer to a state hospital, one being held for burglary, one held for assault with intent to murder, and four being held on drug charges. "We also have," the sheriff pointed out, "eight who are awaiting action by the grand jury since our grand jury met last month."

Judge Campbell stated that he had conferred this week with Kenneth Smith, representative of the financial advisory company which the county plans to use in the event bonds are necessary. Smith informed him that counties may now issue certifi-cates of obligation, in lieu of bonds, to finance new jail con-struction. The certificates, he explained, are similar to bonds, but do not require a vote of the taxpayers. If a county chooses to go this route, the county must advertise that such action is contemplated; then if taxpayers do not wish the action, they may present a petition and possibly obtain an injunction to stop the

"I watn to emphasize that the Hall County commissioners have taken no action on either the bond route or the certificate of obligation route," Campbell said. "According to what the financial advisor said, the certificate route would be much aster, and could save a considerable amount of money if building costs continue to rise rapidly. Then, if we take the bond route, and the bonds fail to receive the majority vote with any proposed jail."

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NEW COUNTY-WIDE TAX BOARD TO BE ELECTED

Hall Cunty Commissioners have voted to join with other taxing entities in the county in implementing the new state Property Tax Code, County Judge Lester Campbell has reported. The new tax code was made into law through Senate Bill 621, passed at the last session of the

Texas Legislature.
Under the new law, Campbell explained, all taxing bodies in each county, except the county itself, were mandated to join to-gether. A county had the option to remain out for two years, and then would be required to join the other entities. Local commissioners felt that the county should proceed with the other units of government now, and thereby be able to participate in the organization of the new tax-

The new law requires each county to have a district board of directors, made up of five members, the judge explained. This board of directors is to be elected by the governing boards of the taxing units involved. In Hall County those boards will be the commissioners court, the Memphis Independent School Memphis Independent School District board, the Estelline Independent School District board, the Lakeview Independent School District board, the Valley Independent School District board, the Memphis City Counthe Estelline City Council, Lakeview City Council and the Turkey City Council.

Under the new Property Tax Code, these nine boards each nominate up to five candidates for the District Board of Directors. These candidates are then placed on a ballot by the Hall County Clerk. The ballot is submitted to the nine units and five directors are elected to the Dis-trict Board of Directors by a formula set up in the Property Tax

Governing bodies must submit their nominees, if they choose to nominate any, to the Hall County Clerk before October 15; the governing bodies then have until November 15 to cast their votes for the five directors.

Campbell stated that the five directors elected will serve twoyear terms, and no director will receive pay for his services; they are entitled to reimbursement for actual and necessary expen-ses incurred in the performance

of their duties, however.

The board of directors, it was explained, will then be in charge of the appraisal of property with-in the county. The board may contract with a professional appraiser, if desired, to handle these duties. In Hall County, property has not been totally re-appraised for many years. Since the new law calls for agricultur-al land to be appraised on pro-ductivity, instead of market val-ue, it is believed that the re-appraisal will constitute a major

The board is charged with the

approval of any appraisals.

The board also appoints an "appraisal review board" of three members. This three-member team also have two-year

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
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


