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**FARMERS HOME ADMINISTRATION AIDS COMMUNITY PROGRESS**  
"Rural community progress in Texas has been spurred by the development of 436 modern water systems, and recreation centers through the Farmers Home Administration," County Supervisor, Donald B. Cruce said today. The County Supervisor reports

on benefits brought to the state under Rural Community Facilities programs that have been enlarged under President Johnson's efforts to improve living conditions in rural areas.

Water supply problems have been solved for more than 180,000 people in rural Texas through 418 water systems make possible FHA loans and grants totaling more than \$54 million. The new systems serve both rural towns and countryside where the people have had to exist on uncertain and, sometimes, unsafe water supplies.

The County Supervisor reported that three rural communities in the state also have new or improved waste disposal systems through FHA loans and grants approved the past two years. At present, there are 48 waste disposal projects underway in Texas from application stage to those under construction.

"We are beginning to make real progress toward the President's goal of clear, constant water for all of rural America," Cruce said.

"Towns benefited by the program are able to improve living standards and accommodate new business and industry when they can offer the same kind of water service as found in the city."

Through insurance of private loan financing, the Agency also has made possible the construction of 15 outdoor recreation centers developed by community association and serving an estimated 13,500 people in rural Texas.

The centers give rural families the same opportunity as city and suburban dwellers to enjoy modern swimming pools, playing fields, golf, boating, and other forms of outdoor recreation. In Swisher County, the Tule Lake Golf Club has made application for a \$65,000.00 loan to build a club house, pro's dwelling and make major improvements. The

club house will offer additional recreation, meeting place for civic groups, rooms for banquets, etc. We feel this will be a great asset, not only to the Golf Club but to the City of Tulia and surrounding areas, Happy Rodeo Association, sponsored by the Happy Jaycee's is also in process of obtaining a loan to build a rodeo arena.

Cruce said the Agency also has made grants to 60 counties of the state for comprehensive plan-

ning of the future development of water and waste disposal services in rural areas. A comprehensive planning grant was approved for Briscoe County in the amount of \$5,000.

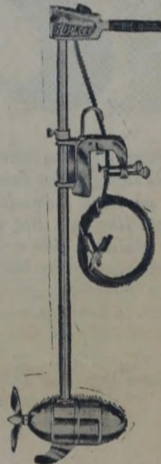

**TREATING THE GARDEN WITH INSECTICIDES**  
Sometimes a small cloud of insecticides decides who will en-

joy the delicious vegetables in your garden - you or those sneaky garden pests. Insecticides, applied at the right time and the right place, are your guarantee that you and your family will be able to enjoy the fruits of your labor.

Garden chemicals are carefully screened by USDA and the Food and Drug Administration before manufacturers are allowed to make them available to producers. The label clearly states the insecticides is effective, its rate of application and the necessary waiting interval between application and eating or processing the vegetables.

The most commonly used insecticides for home gardens are carbaryl (Sevin), chlordane, DDT, diazinon, malathion, methoxychlor, rotenone and sulfur.

Security Act which will affect many Panhandle area residents involves the amount a beneficiary may earn, according to Travis C. Briggs, district manager, Amarillo, Texas.

"Effective this year a person receiving social security checks may earn as much as \$1680 in a year without losing any benefits. If he earns more than that

amount," Briggs explained, "one dollar in benefits will be withheld for each two dollars of earnings between \$1680 and \$2680. But for earnings exceeding \$2880 a dollar in benefits will be deducted for each dollar earned. These rules do not apply to a person who receives disability benefits, or to those who are age 72 or older.

Briggs also pointed out that re-

gardless of how much a beneficiary earns in a year he will receive a social security benefit check for any month in which he does not earn over \$150 nor work to any month which he does not earn over \$140 nor work to any extent as a self-employed person,

The previous yearly limit was \$1500 or \$125 monthly. The only two types of income considered as earnings for this purpose are wages and self-employment income. Income from rents, interest, dividends or retirement payments are not considered.
