PURCELL HAILS NEW RURAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Rep. Graham Purcell (D-Tex) has hailed House passage of a comprehensive new rural development program as "the beginning of a new era for countryside USA." But he sharply criticized a last-ditch attempt joined by his opponent, Bob Price, which "would have destroyed the bill."

While Price voted for the bill

on final passage, he sided earlier with supporters of the Administration's Reorganization Plan on a key rule amendment. Supporters of the amendment sought to strip the U. S. Department of Agriculture of its rural development responsibility.

"Fortunately this attempt supported by Mr. Price was defeated by a substantial margin," Purcell declared, "and we have prevented one more attempt to bring about the dismantling of USDA." Supporters of the reorganization plan want to create a new Department of Community Development with full responsibility for rural development.

Purcell was one of the original authors of the rural development plan, and served on a key Conference Committee that resolved differences between the version passed by the House and the one passed by the Senate. He led in the intensive two and one-half hour debate that took place on the House floor.

"Enactment of this bill is going to mean more jobs, more opportunity and improved local services for Northwest Texas," Purcell said. "For the first time we now have a comprehensive plan of rural economic development—one that marks the beginning of a new era for non-metropolitan USA."

Home Notes

Hunting seasons for dove and quail are open for most parts of Texas. Dove and quail make tasty wild game treats when properly prepared.

Age quail and dove at a temperature just above freezing for 24 to 28 hours to remove some of the gamey flavor which may detract from eating pleasure. Dry-plucking the birds, rather than skinning them, conserves flavor and moisture. After they are plucked, singe them over a flame to remove the down.

Next, make a cut along or across the back to split the bird apart and remove the entrails. Then remove the head, claws and feet. Wipe the body cavity clean with a damp cloth.

Once dressed this way, they are ready for immediate use or for freezing.

Frying is a popular way to prepare quail and dove. First dredge the birds in flour, salt and pepper them and fry in deep fat. Brown each bird on both sides. Then lower the temperature, cover the skillet and cook slowly for about 20 minutes, turning once to brown evenly.

To freeze dressed birds for later use, place in moisture - vapor proof containers. Label these containers with the name and date, and store at zero degrees F. They may be stored at this temperature from six to twelve months.

Besides serving as a taste treat, dove and quail are nutritious. They are excellent sources of protein needed for growth and repair of body tissues.

Wild game birds can offer a refreshing and nutritious change in menu when hunting seasons arrive—and afterwards, during holidays—when cooked or frozen properly.
