The Sanatarium Question.

[Continued from yesterday.]

The word, sanitarium, should imply an institution for sanitary conditions, making healthful, healing, sanative. It is its purpose to afford a retreat for the afflicted, thus removing from out the midst of a healthy portion those, especially, who may be afflicted with complaints transmissible to others. The invalids visiting Amarillo are almost exclusively those with lung troubles, commonly called consumption. This complaint is now conceded to be transmissible; and persons coming here now must be taken care of at the hotels and with private families, thus exposing the traveling public, and families to the loathsome disease. One may occupy a room, for ever so short a while, and infect it with the poisonous germ. And it is horrible to think that the room will next be occupied by any one with the least regard for health, or decency even, and verges on criminality to turn it over to one predisposed to the disease. Yet this thing is done constantly in Amarillo, and all because we have no other place to care for the afflicted. The very year that it is known that Amarillo has a sanatarium, and the hotels and private boarding houses are safe from infection, and are healthy, clean, and sweet—that very year our visitors, for recreation and rest, will double in number. Besides the afflicted will have the assurance of a hospital especially fitted and equipped for them with a maximum of comfort at a minimum of cost, that will insure a large attendance. Of course the Sanatarium would be located out-side of thick settlements and the buzz of business, in order to be restful for the sick and immunity for the well.

The importance of a sanatarium must be weighed with that of other enterprises. A bridge across the Canadian has been suggested as the more important, but THE NEWS does not think so. It would be a great convenience, it is true, if it could be kept from washing away, as was a bridge built by Quanah across Red River, that cost thousands of dollars and was flooded away in a few months. Besides Amarillo has no important competitor for the trade beyond the river. It will come here anyway, bridge or no bridge. We know of nothing worth more to Amarillo, at present, than would be a sanatarium, for the amount of money it would require.

Bryan-Goebel Party.

Louisville, Ky., Oct. 16.—The first day's trip of the Bryan-Goebel party through Kentucky commenced at Cairo, Ill., the first speech of the day being made at Bardwell, Ky., in the presence of a good-natured and good-sized crowd. Mr. Bryan demonstrated his purpose to support the democratic ticket headed by William Goebel for governor. He held that the question of whether the next president of the United States was a democrat depended largely upon whether Kentucky was democratic this fall.

He held that it was not a matter of moment what man headed the ticket, claiming that any democrat who stands for the Chicago platform is better than a republican.

In the presence of the demy it was not a time to air personal grievances. The real question was one as to principles between the parties.

In national matters he assailed the attitude of President McKinley as related to the Philippine islands, asserting that the president's declaration that congress would declare for the islands was a subversion of the declaration of independence, at the first to be openly made by a president of the United States. The declaration of the president argued the use of the word parliament instead of congress, and called the colonial days and policy of King George. The islands did not and could not belong to us simply because we had paid a decaying monarchy for them.

The silver question and the Chicago platform as a whole form the vital questions to be solved in the coming political contest of 1900.

PENSIONED VETERANS,

Austin, Tex., Oct. 16.—Comptroller Finley issued the following statement this afternoon:

Austin, Tex., Oct. 16.—1,584 applications have been passed on by this department. Of this number 3,667 have been approved. The appropriation made by the legislature for pensioning the ex-confederate soldiers is

\$100,000 for the year beging Oct 99, and ending Sept. 30, 1900, to be paid quarterly. The amount appropriated for this quarter is \$25,000 or \$1 per capita. Nine hundred seven applications which have been filed in this department have been rejected. In a great many instances the facts show that the applicants own party of such an amount that it is not levied that they are indigent with the meaning of the law. In many other instances applicants fail to meet their disability with their service in the army. The law provides that where an applicant is under 6 years of age that it must be shown that the disability is the approximate result of three months' service in the navy.

Others failed to establish proof of service and indigency by two credible witnesses.

I deem it necessary to go further into details in giving reason for rejecting the number of applicants above stated. Each individual applicant will be advised of the reason for rejecting his application. Respectfully,

America Won.

The Columbia won and a half miles ahead in the first race of the series.

New York, Oct. 16.—The cup which the old schooner America won so commandingly against all comers over the course around the Isle of Wight in 1851 and brought back across the seas will probably remain here another year, in defiance to the world.

In a glorious breeze, over a windward and leeward course of thirty miles Columbia scored against Shamrock to-day in the first race of the 1899 series for the cup. She was a mile and a half ahead of the challenger, defeating her by ten minutes and eight seconds, corrected time, after allowing the six seconds handicap which Columbia must concede to the challenger on account of her longer water line.

It was a decisive contest, a magnificent race, magnificently sailed and magnificently won. Opinion as to the merits of the two boats had been somewhat divided as a result of the flukes during the past two weeks. Although the preponderance of expert opinion never wavered in its loyalty to the wonderful speed and ability of the white flyer no nautical sharp expected that the Shamrock would be so overwhelmingly vanquished as she was in to-day's royal struggle. The Yankee beat outgeneraled her at the start, but her hopelessly in windward work on the outward mark and gained twenty-two seconds on the run home before the wind.

DIRECT LEGISLATION MOVE
ACTION TAKEN FOR PROPORTIONAL REPRESENTATION.

A large number of citizen voters of Erath county, Texas, regardless of past and present party alignment, met at Stephenville and organized a direct legislative movement and call upon all citizens of Texas who believe in such a government as that herein indicated to form similar organizations in their respective counties.

This organization shall consist:

"1. Of neighborhood direct legislative clubs to be organized in every public district school house and in every town and city, where even two or three can be gathered together.

"2. Of one central county club to be composed of one member from each of the neighborhood clubs, which central club shall be in the nature of a county executive committee and all actions of this central club shall be subject to the approval or disapproval of the local clubs.

"3. From time to time there shall be mass meetings, to which all voters shall be invited to participate who favor, that the people be given a chance to ultimate their will into law by giving the people some simple and easily accessible way of expressing their will at the ballot box, such as will be insured by direct legislation.

"4. That the only test for membership that shall ever be required in these clubs is that those seeking membership believe that the people should in some greater degree than at present be intrusted into the direct use of their 'all political power,' and that as members they will investigate and reason together about some orderly and constitutional way of wresting power from a few middlemen, kings and czar and jeffries, and restoring this power to the people to whom all the magna chartas of

liberty declare it belongs.

"And that no circumstances shall there ever be required and brass collar test of membership and that the use of all party branding irons which would put party boss be utterly discontented. And that all members be left in absolute freedom to act in all matters as their judgment and conscience shall dictate."

The object of these clubs shall be:

1. To educate ourselves and our neighbors as to the beneficence of a government of, by and for the people, and the best ways and means of attaining and preserving such government, and to this end there shall be regular club meetings at least once each month in every public school house where two or more can be gathered together.

2. These clubs shall circulate direct legislation literature, endeavor to get a column in their local press for advocacy of direct legislation and at proper time shall circulate in their neighborhoods petitions to the legislative body for the submission of direct legislation constitutional amendments to a direct vote of the people, and where these amendments are submitted to see that a full and intelligent vote is polled in favor of same.

4. And in order to break down as far as possible a government of party, by partisans of party pie-eaters and encourage a government of patriots for the people, we suggest that these clubs take into consideration the wisdom of applying the principles of proportional representation in the selection of all public officers.

In the meeting were found democrats, republicans and populist. One speaker thought that this move would be favored by at least 3200 out of the 5200 voters in Erath county.

Another speaker pointed out that there was a direct legislative plank in over sixty different state platforms, including twelve democratic state platforms, and that nearly all of the leading great dailies and magazines who belonged to the independent press, as are distinguished from the party organ press, favored direct legislation.
