Hall County Passes Hospital Resolution

The Hall County Commissioners Court met Monday of last week. The Commissioners Court voted to amend the Child Welfare Budget of \$3,600 by transferring the funds from the General Fund. The Court approved the 1986-87 Juvenile

Probation Budget of \$300.00 monthly and ordered that it be paid retro-active of September 1986.

The Commissioners Court voted to post signs on bridges in Hall County to meet Federal regulations.

The Commissioners Court also passed the following Resolution:

WHEREAS, The Texas Medical Foundation, acting as an intermediary for HIC, is systematically closing small town hospitals and imposing sanctions on small town physicians by the use of a "Bureaucratic Cookbook" of requirements, refusing to believe that good medical practice does not always require the ultra-latest technology; and

WHEREAS, Many thousands of Medicare patients in the rural areas

will be denied access to local medical care because of the actions of the Texas Medical Foundation; and

WHEREAS, Sanctions are being imposed of rural physicians without due process and often without prior notification; be it therefore

RESOLVED, That the local entities inform the legislative bodies of the State of Texas of their opposition to any legislative action which would relieve the Texas Medical Foundation or any of its members of liability for their actions; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the local undersigned entities, inform their legislative representation that the total destruction of small town medicine is not beneficial for the elderly patients or for Texas Medicine.

Hall County Deputy Dies In Wreck

Memorial services were held Wednesday at 3 p.m. in the First Baptist Church of Turkey for Hall County Deputy Sheriff Harold Dougherty, 53, who died Tuesday afternoon about 4:45 in a one-vehicle accident seven miles east of Turkey on State Hwy. 86.

Deputy Dougherty, who has served the past 13 months with the Hall County Sheriff's Department, was returning to his ranch home near Tampico when the accident occurred and his 1983 Ford Club Cab pickup overturned and rolled over several times. Dougherty was thrown from the vehicle.

Conducting the Memorial Service at First Baptist Church in Turkey were Rev. Melvin Clinton, pastor, and Rev. Tim Tidenburg of

Loving Baptist Church (near Graham). Mr. Dougherty has been a rancher since moving to Hall County.

ECA Classes to Begin In Turkey March 24

The City of Turkey has agreed to pay the total cost for any Turkey resident taking the course. Registration will begin at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, March 24th. To pre-register call 423-1017, 423-1495, or 423-1356. The Turkey Volunteer Fire Department is urging anyone in the area to take part in this course.

Loco Weed Ain't Good to Eat

The loco weed is a beautiful little bushy plant gray in color and has pretty blossoms, it grows on the flats and along the creek banks below the caprock. If the cowboy or farmer wanted to say something bad about his horse, he would say he is just an old loco nag. But sometimes he could be telling the truth for if a horse or cow eat enough of the weeds to feel the effects it would cause them to eat less regular feed and more of the loco weed. It was bad to have a loco horse in the team you worked in the field. When you drove up to a gate and opened it to pull through, the loco horse would raise his head high and refuse to go through and sometimes would rear up and paw with his front feet thinking the gate was still closed. When you drove the team up to the watering trough for a drink the loco horse would reach out and try to drink before he got within ten or twelve feet of the trough. Then after he did finally get up to the trough he would put his head down in the water sometimes covering his eyes. The loco horse finally got hooked so bad it got poorer and would walk miles and miles just looking for and eating the weed. In the last stages it would walk into a fence and get tangled in the wire or walk over a bluff and be killed.

Mules would not get hooked on the loco weed, but once in a while a cow would get loosed and you could not drive it on foot or even on horse back, she would circle around and around cedar trees and refuse to go in any certain direction. Sometimes they would run into the board fence of the corral and knock herself down.

The loco weed is bad for the farm and ranch stock, but very few will eat it.

Quitaque Youth Places in Houston Livestock Show

Warren Merrell, a 4-H member from Quitaque walked proudly to podium at the 1987 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Scramble Banquet as he was awarded 3rd Place, Dairy Monthly reports and pictures sponsored by Betty and Jim Voreis.

The banquet and the award were the culmination of a year of hard work that started in 1986 when Warren earned a calf purchase certificate in one of three events: the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Calf Scramble, the 4-H/FFA Junior Livestock Judging Contest of the 4-H/FFA Dairy Judging Contest.

The banquet, sponsored this year by Levi Strauss, is held annually to honor each of the previous year's calf scramble certificate winners and to award those who have performed truly outstanding work. Throughout the year, the banquet has become a high point in the Houston scramble program. Keynote speakers have included such dignitaries as Vice President George Bush, former Texas governors and astronauts.

More than 100 awards are

presented at the banquet, most of which are donated by local companies and individuals affiliated with the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

The calf scramble certificates awarded by the Show are used for the purchase of registered beef or dairy heifers. All work with the animal is strictly supervised by the winner's vocational agriculture teacher or county

extension agent.

Each winner agrees to submit a montly report both to the Show and to his or her sponsor, to keep accurate monetary records, to photographically document the progress of the project and to prepare a 500-word essay covering the entire year. In addition, each winner returns the following year to show the heifer in special competition.

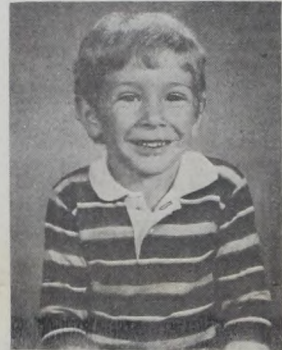
Harold Dougherty

Funeral services for Harold Gene Dougherty, 52, of Turkey, were held Wednesday at 3 p.m. in First Baptist Church, Turkey. Rev. Melvin Clinton, pastor, and Rev. Tim Tindenburg, pastor of Loving Baptist Church, officiated. Additional services were held Thursday, March 12, 1987, in the Loving Baptist Church, Loving, Texas, at 11 a.m. with Rev. Tindenburg officiating. Graveside services followed at 4 p.m. in Dougherty Cemetery near Emory, with Schooler Gordon Funeral Directors handling all services.

Dougherty, a Hall County Deputy Sheriff, was killed Tuesday evening, March 10, in a one-car roll-over six and 1/2 miles east of Turkey on Hwy. 86. Born in Quannah, Texas, March 23, 1934, he was married to Patricia Snow in Loving, Texas, May 23, 1980. They came to the Turkey area in 1985, where he ranched and was employed by the Hall County Sheriff's department.

Recorded in death by his father, J. P. Dougherty, Harold was a member of the Turkey Fire Department, Turkey Lions Club, and the Loving Baptist Church. 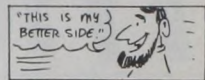
Burial was in Hillside Memorial Gardens under direction of Bell-Cypert-Seale Funeral Home.

Goss, a 1974 graduate of Littlefield High School is presently employed by Nelson's Hardware in Littlefield.

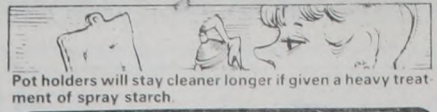

"Helping Children Cope"

"Protecting" wives and children from the stresses the farmer, rancher or businessman is experiencing as a result of the loss of the family farm or business is no favor to the other family members.

You may think you can hide your financial worries from your family, especially the children. However, children base much of their emotional security on their parents. When the parents are tense and upset, the children's sense of security is threatened. They know something is wrong and need to be included in family discussions as much as is appropriate to their age.

The financial distress many families are experiencing can mean an abrupt change in lifestyle. Children need to understand that money once available for recreational activities and "extras" may now have to be reduced or eliminated altogether.

The family may be considering a move to another location for

employment. For children this means leaving their security of home, friends, and school.

Here are some suggestions for helping children handle this stressful time:

*Help your children by helping yourself. Try to gain control over your stress in order to help them.

*Let the children know -- at a level they can understand -- exactly what the family situation is and involve them in the decisions.

*Try to keep major changes to a minimum and allow time for children to adjust.

*Recognize symptoms of stress in your children -- sleeplessness, depression, withdrawal, headaches, or angry outbursts.

*Help your children focus on the positive aspects of the family life, and recognize their strengths and contributions to the family.

*Spend family time together doing low-cost or no-cost activities that all family members enjoy.

This is the third in a series of articles on coping with unemployment or loss of a farm or business. I have some first-hand experience in this area, and know

that the process of adjustment is definitely not easy, but it is critical

to the family's continued strength.

We have a new packet of ten lessons "Surviving Stress on the Farm and Ranch." This is a self-help manual with some very good information if families really want to help themselves through an economic crisis. The lessons are: Understanding Stress: Its Causes and Effects; Assessing Your Family's Situation; Assessing the Financial Situation of Your Farm or Ranch Business; Financial Distress: Some Options; Assessing Your Family Financial Situation; Problem Solving/ Decision Making; Developing an Action

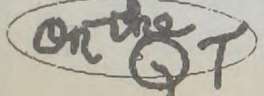
