Sudan's big, strong fullback Danny Williams was the difference here last Friday night as the Hornets turned back the bid of the Patriots 10-0. Williams was listed on the program to weigh 185 but just about everyone believes that figure is probably 15 pounds less than his actual weight and he was a tough, strong one here last Friday night, probably the best one the Patriots have ever faced. Friday night's game also marked the first game the Patriots had been shut out on the scoreboard since they played to a scoreless tie against Farwell in the third game of the season last year. The Sudan coaches stated after the game that it was by far their team's best performance of the season.

The Patriots won the opening-game toss and chose to receive the kickoff. Scotty Setliff took the kickoff on his own 15 yard line and returned it to the 30. The Patriots went right to work with Brian Wheeler picking up ten yards and a first down on the first play. The Patriots picked up another first down and drove to the Sudan 44 before stalling.

The Hornets then started a march of their own, picking up two first downs in the process and then fumbling it away to the scrapping Patriots on the Valley 24 yard line.

Valley then moved out to the 35 yard line and a first down and then were held by the Hornets and Ernie Lucero kicked to Sudan on

their 24. The Hornets started the march then that led to their only touchdown, aided by two penalties against the Patriots that cost them 20 yards. Williams bulled over for the TD from about 4 yards out and then the Hornets kicked the PAT and led 7-0 with five seconds left in the first quarter.

Darrell Dowd, a very fine freshman prospect, took the kickoff on his own 25 yard line and returned it to the 50 yard line, almost breaking it all the way. There was no scoring in the second quarter. Valley recovered a Sudan fumble late in the second period at the Sudan 32 then was intercepted at the 17 to kill their scoring chance. Valley receivers dropped three passes in the first half that were right on target and might have changed the complexion of the game but then again it might not have and the first half ended with Sudan in possession of the ball at the Valley 45-yard line.

Sudan returned the second half kickoff to the 30. The Hornets moved to a first down on the Valley 7 yard line, then were caught holding and were penalized 15 yards and the Patriots forced them to cough it up at the 18.

On the first play Brian Wheeler broke it out to the 45 yard line for a first down. Two plays later the Patriots were intercepted again on the Sudan 44. Mr. Williams took over and once again moved for a first down at the Valley 32. On first down Sudan picked up one yard. On the next two plays the Patriot defenders caught the quarterback and sacked him for losses of 10 and 7 yards. On the fourth down try Pepper Jones blocked the punt try and the Patriots set up for business on the Sudan 49. Two plays later Brian Wheeler picked up a first on the 38 yard line and on the next play broke for 20 yards and a first on the 18. Ron Eudy moved for a first down on the keeper play on the one yard line and it looked that the Patriots were going to get their TD. The Hornets had other ideas however, and stopped the drive at the 5 yard line.

The Hornets' big fullback then started an amazing performance and carrying on almost every play moved the team to a first down on the Valley 8 yard line. The Hor-

net than picked up 2 yards, were penalized 5 back to the 9, picked up two more yards to the 7 and then kicked a field goal with less than 4 minutes left to play, and led 10-0.

The Patriots came right back with a good return of the kickoff to the Sudan 46. However an interception once again killed the Valley threat. The Hornets moved downfield once again and were stopped finally at the 10 yard line. Scotty Setliff picked up 20 yards on the first down try and on the next play Sudan once again killed the Patriots movement with an interception and the game ended two plays later.

It was a good ball game, although a hard one to lose. The Hornets were just too big up the middle, especially Williams, for none of the other Hornets particularly hurt the Patriots. And, Valley quarterback Ron Eudy was pretty badly shook up in the first game and according to reports probably suffered a mild concussion, thus causing his passing to be a bit off in the second half.

Players and coaches need make no apologies for the game was hard fought and the Hornets were really up for that one, much like the Patriots were for Motley County. If the two teams could meet again the Patriots just might take them. However, now the Patriots can only hope for someone else in the district to do it. Amherst could be the one for they are making some winning noises and are currently at the top in district play with two wins and no losses. Sudan has only played one district game. Amherst has scored more points over the full season with 106 points. Valley is still in first place over the season with one loss and four wins. They are second in scoring over the full season and still the stingiest team on defense, having scored 102 points and have given up only 16 points.

Coach Hulsey once again picked Brian Wheeler as outstanding on offense. Brian picked up 105 yards rushing against Sudan and is averaging well over 100 yards per game rushing. He has run for more than 100 yards in every game played this year.

The coach selected Randy Woods as the defensive player of the week, stating that although two or three other players were in on more tackles than Randy, who plays defensive back, but that Randy did not miss an assignment. He stopped everything that was run his way.

The Patriots and the Junior High teams will play at Childress Thursday night of this week. The Varsity will play the Childress B team and the Junior High teams will play first, at 5:30, and the varsity game will start at 7:30.

Next week Valley will go to Happy for a district contest. The Cowboys knocked off Motley County last week, so they are coming and the Patriots will need to be ready for that crew. Next home game will be October 24 when Lazbuddie comes to Patriot Land.

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Coach Hulsey reports that what just might have been the best game to be seen here this year was played last Thursday night when the fifth and sixth grades were divided up (not by grades) and battled to a 0-0 tie game.

Coach Hulsey said that the teams were called the Whites and Blues, and that the Blues moved the ball pretty well but the White Tornadoes, in true Patriot tradition, stopped them short of pay dirt each time they threatened.

Fire Marshall Don Warren indicated the fire probably was caused when Mrs. Crenshaw was smoking in bed.

The fire was discovered around 6:15 a.m. by her husband Fred Crenshaw who was returning home from night duty as a deputy sheriff. No one else was in the house at the time of the fire.

Postal Improvement Program Slated To Begin Here Saturday

The U. S. Postal Service first-class mail service improvement program will go into effect at the Turkey Post Office on October 11. Postmaster Jim Majors said today.

Under the program, first-class mail will receive service that is equal to or better than airmail.

The major, new service step will extend to all first-class mail weighing 13 ounces or less. "In practical terms, what this service improvement means is that domestic first-class postage now will purchase the level of service that previously only airmail could buy," said Postmaster Majors.

"Under the new program, there will no longer be an advantage in purchasing airmail postage for domestic delivery," he said.

Priority mail (now starting at weight in excess of 13 ounces), which includes air parcel service, and international airmail are unaffected by the improvement program and continue in their present form, the postmaster said.

"Airmail stamps will be sold for use on priority and international airmail. They can also be used in various combinations with other stamps for first-class mail," he said.

American farmers have long been making things better for fellow countrymen. As the bicentennial fever starts to build, it is appropriate to take a look at the contributions of our farmers. For instance, thirty-two of the fifty-six men signing the Declaration of Independence were farmers. Some of those same men later worked to frame the Constitution. As for the American Revolution, some historians are now giving a major share of the credit for American victory to the farmer. Not only as a fighter, but also a critical food supplier. American fighting strategy never needed to be changed because of short food supplies. Conversely, the British were constantly having to make major changes in planning because of food shortages. Strategically, the food supply advantage created by the patriotic American farmer, was probably as important as any other single factor in the British defeat.

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PETER - THE MAN CHRIST MADE

Peter had several especially hard lessons to learn as Jesus "made" him. He needed restraint, as we all do. He was impetuous and forceful, constantly talking, asking questions, and cutting off ears. He was frank and outspoken and followed the rule, "when in doubt speak."

Peter also needed, as we do, to learn humility. He made frequent use of the pronoun "I". In a survey several years ago in New York City as operators listened in on conversations, the one word used most often was "I". Peter often was just too sure of himself, making great boast about what he would do for Jesus in Jerusalem. He needed to realize his capability of falling. He later found his weakness the hard way — when he denied Jesus.

Peter's failures of courage come home to most of us. His fear of sinking as the waves whipped up around him causes us to recall our "sinking spells."

But Jesus took Peter, as he was, and "made him". The same Jesus can do the same for me. One has written "Take my life, O Father, mold it

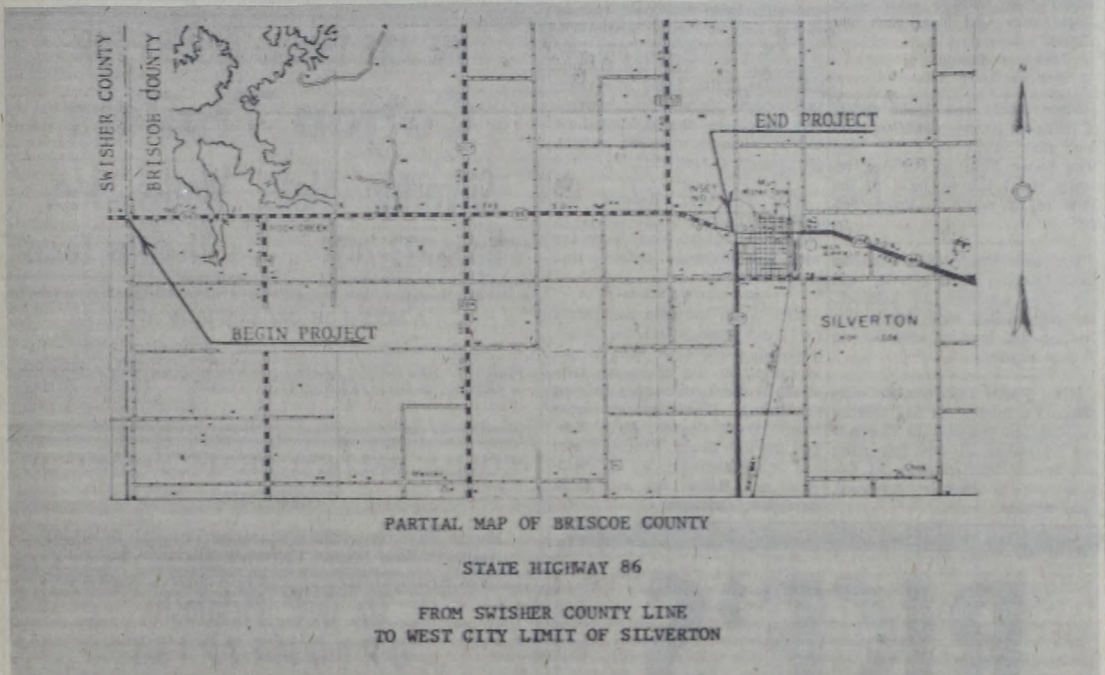

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NOTICE AFFORDING OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC HEARING CORRIDOR (LOCATION) AND DESIGN (COMBINED HEARING)
The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is planning the improvement of a 9.1-mile section of State Highway 86, extending from the Swisher County Line to the West City Limit of Silverton, in Briscoe County.

The proposed project consists of widening, reconditioning, and resurfacing the existing 22-foot pavement to provide two 12-foot travel lanes, with 10-foot paved shoulders.

The proposed improvements will

follow the same alignment as the existing highway, except that the centerline of the pavement will be moved 12 feet north. A minimum of 100 feet of right of way will be required from the West City Limit of Silverton, West 1,174 feet; and a minimum of 137 feet will be required for the remainder of the project. The additional right of way will not involve any displacements, or relocations.
