#### HOLLOWAY TO PRESENT DEDICATION RECITAL

PLAINVIEW, TEXAS, Special-Clyde Holloway, concert organist, will be featured in concert at the dedication recital for the new three manual, 58 rank Wicks Pipe Organ in Harral Memorial Auditorium at Wayland Baptist Col-

lege on February 19.

The concert will be the featured portion of the dedication scheduled for 8 p.m. to which the public is invited without charge.

MOST ATHLETIC BOY & GIRL The organ, the \$80 000 gift of an anonymous donor, is reported to be the largest in the Panhandle-Plains area. The custom-made pipe organ, designed to fit the decor Most Likely to Succeed Boy and organ, designed to fit the decor of two-year-old Harral Memorial Auditorium, consists of a console with three manuals and pedal. The organ itself consists of five divisions: Swell, Great, Choir, Pos-Prince and Princess of Friendship — Charmaine Fuston and Gus tiv, and Pedal.

> The instrument consists of 3,267 pipes individually constructed by master craftsmen. Wicks Company recognizes that the organ, being a musical instrument, is intended to be heard and works to insure to be heard and works to insure that nothing obstructs the sound coming from the pipes. The pipes have been installed in specially-designed chambers which were built into Harral Auditorium when the building was construct-ed. The chambers are located on each side of the building with the Great and Positiv division pipes

Holloway, a native Texan began studying the piano at an early age. Later he began study of the organ with Ruth Turner and continued this study as a pupil of Mildred Andrews at the University of Oklahoma where he appeared as soloist with the University Symphony Orchestra.

At this time he received the American Guild of Musical Artists' Award for outstanding performance, and was granted a Fullbright Scholarship to attend the Ameterdam Conservatory.

While attending Amsterdam Conservatory, Holloway studied organ, harpsichord, and chamber music with Gustav Leonhardt.

During his time at the Conservatory he travelled widely to play new and historic instruments in various countries. While in Europe he gave both organ and harpichord recitals which were spon sored by the United States Infornation Service.

While completing residence work for the Doctor of Sacred Music degree at Union Theological Seminary, where he studied with Robert Baker, he was assistant organist at St. Bartholomews Church in New York.

As an accompanist, Holloway has recorded with the Robert Shaw Chorale.
