#### **Recent Storms Damage Caprock Canyons State Park Road**

Some Campgrounds Closed, But Park Remains Open

Quitaque, Tx. - Recent storms damaged Park Road 79 in Caprock Canyons State Park. Storms on Thursday night, June 17th, and Friday, June 18th, damaged culverts in three of the four canyon crossings. Park staff contacted Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) on Friday and the road was closed at the Egal Point Trail parking area after campers in the back of the park were relocated.

park were relocated.

The road closure temporarily prevents visitor access to two campgrounds, Little Red Tent Camping Area and South Prong Tent Camping Area, as well as miles of hiking, biking, and horseback riding trails. This means two of the park's five campsites are temporarily closed. However, 56 campsites in the three areas remain open, and other park facilities, trails, and the lake are still available for visitors, as well.

The road will remain closed untill repairs can be made. TxDOT engineers are assessing the damage and formulating repair plans at this time, but it could take months.

On a positive note, recent rains have raised Lake Theo approximately six feet.





#### **More Vesicular Stomatitis In** West Texas & New Mexico

Horses on a total of three sites in Texas and four premises in New Mexico are known to be infected with Vesicular Stomatitis (VS), a painful blistering disease of livestock, such as horses, sheep, swine and deer. The viral disease appears spontaneously and sporadically in the southwestern U.S. and is thought to be transmitted by sand flies and black flies. The VS cases this spring are the first to be con-

"The most recent confirmed cases in Texas involve three horses on a ranch near Denver City, in Yoakum County, about 80 miles south-west of Lubbock, and one horse near Del Rio, in Val Verde County about 150 miles west of San Antonio," said Dr. Bob Hillman, Texas' state veterinarian and head of the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's livestock and poultry health regulatory agency.

To prevent animal-to-animal disease transmission, the TAHC re-

quires that the VS-infected animals and the other livestock on the premise remain quarantined until 30 days after all VS blisters or lesions heal, a process that usually takes two or three weeks. Prior to quarantine release, the animals will be re-examined by a state or federal regulatory veterinarian, to prevent the spread of disease to other

"During an active year for VS, it is not unusual for this unpredictable disease to be found scattered across several counties and states, said Dr. Hillman. "We urge owners and private veterinary practitioners to report clinical signs of the disease to their state veterinarians' offices. A disease investigation will be conducted, with laboratory tests run at the National Veterinary Services Laboratory in Ames, Iowa. There is no charge for these services."

Signs of VS-which include blisters, open sores or erosions in an animal's mouth, on the muzzle, teats or hooves—mimic those of footand-mouth disease (FMD), an extremely dangerous and highly contagious foreign animal disease that can affect cattle, sheep, swine and deer, but not horses. Laboratory testing is needed to differentiate between VS and FMD, or to determine if the animals had contact with a

toxic plant or poison.

During a VS outbreak, animal health officials across the country may place additional testing requirements or restrictions on livestock originating from states with infection. The TAHC has directed private veterinary practitioners to carefully inspect animals for VS, and document the exam on certificates of veterinary inspection (health papers) issued for livestock leaving Texas. A similar statement also is required on paperwork for livestock entering Texas from other states with VS infection. Dr. Hillman recommended producers or veterinarians check with each state of destination prior to shipping live-

stock.
"To help prevent VS, control biting flies," said Dr. England. "Keep horses and other equine animals under a roof at night and keep stalls clean to reduce exposure to flies. If you borrow equipment or tools from another rancher, disinfect them before using them. At shows, on trail rides or other events, make sure your animals are fed and watered from their own buckets or troughs. If your horses, cattle, sheep, deer or other livestock develop blisters or open sores indica-

tive of VS, call your practitioner and state veterinarian's office."
The TAHC hotline is operational 24 hours a day at 1-800-5508242, with a TAHC or U.S. Department of Agriculture veterinarian always on call to take reports and work with veterinary practitioners. In New Mexico, producers should make reports to the New Mexico Livestock Board at 505-841-6161.

#### 2004 Crop Certification Deadline **July 15 For Briscoe County Farmers**

Briscoe County FSA continues to make appointments for producers to certify cotton, corn, sorghum, peanuts, hay crops, and any other spring or summer seeded crops that may have been planted. The fi-nal day to certify these crops is Thursday, July 15, 2004. According to officials, tolerance is back in effect and farms will be subject to random spot checks. Tolerance is the greater of 1 acre or 5

percent of acreage reported by crop. If you are unsure of your acreage, you may request measurement service, for a nominal fee, by close of business, July 15, 2004.

To avoid late-filed certification fees, remember that crops planted Before July 15, 2004, must be reported by July 15, 2004. Crops planted after this date need to be reported within 15 days of the day you finish planting. Intended use of the crop must also be reported by the crop(s) final planting. Intended use of the crop must also be reported by the crop(s) final reporting date or July 15, 2004. Intended use cannot be changed after July 15.

#### **Managed Haying & Grazing On CRP Acres**

Producers interested in haying or grazing their CRP should go by the Hall County FSA Office and register to do so. Managed grazing is allowed on CRP land every three years after the cover is established. Grazing that occurred PRIOR to 2003 is disregarded.

The managed grazing period is July 2 through October 29. The managed haying period is July 2 through September 29. Only one cutting of hay is allowed. All hay must be removed from the field

by October 9. Hay may NOT be stored on ANY CRP acreage. The fee for haying or grazing of CRP will be 25% of the annual rental payment on the acres that are haved or grazed. Producers will have to choose whether to hay or graze their CRP acres. Both having and grazing will not be allowed on the same acres. Be sure to go by the Hall County Farm Service Agency and fill out the required forms before graz-

ing or haying your CRP acres. Failure to do so can result in penalties.

#### **Final Reporting Date For Spring Seeded Crops**

July 15, 2004 is the final reporting date for spring seeded crops (cotton, grain sorghum, peanuts, haygrazer, etc.). The farm owner, operator or person authorized by power of attorney is required to file an accurate crop and acreage report for all cropland on the farm for DCP, market assistance loan, NAP, CRP and LDP benefits. Correctly and timely reporting crop acreage is not only required, but it is to your benefit as seen in the last farm program that allowed for updated crop bases. If you are not sure of your acreages, you may request a measurement service for your acres. Please call the Hall County Farm Service Agency

HPUWCD No. 1 Adopts New Rules; Posts Results of 2004 Depthto-Water Survey

Landowners wishing to drill new or replacement water wells within the boundaries of the High Plains Underground Water District No. 1 have a new set of rules to go by following the June 9 approval of changes proposed by the district's five-man Board of Directors. The HPUWCD Board's adoption of the new rules became effective

The HPUWCD Board's adoption of the new rules became effective immediately upon their approval during the June 9 Board meeting.

Those familiar with with originally proposed changes will notice the rules finally adopted by the HPUWCD Board are slightly different. The changes resulted from the Board's consideration of comments received during two public hearings and through other forms of communication directed to the district office.

The majority of the comments received dealt with the proposed incommunication of the comments received dealt with the proposed incomments.

The majority of the comments received dealt with the proposed increase in well spacing requirements, especially those that set minimum distances from property lines for new wells. After considerable deliberation, the HPUWCD Board agreed to set a less restrictive distance requirement.

Increasing the cost of water well validation to \$1,000 per well.

\* requiring that all new or replacement water wells be spaced from 25 to 135 yards away from existing external property lines. The original proposed rules would have required wells to be spaced from 50 to 270 yards away from external property lines.

\* clarifying the responsibility of a permit applicant and district field personnel in obtaining measurements between proposed well sites and existing wells

#### **CSP Sign-up Dates Announced**

The Natural Resources Conservation Service announced June 9 that the inaugural sign-up period for the Conservation Security Program would begin July 6 and run through July 30.

The process, which will be open to producers and landowners in 18 selected watersheds across the nation, will be conducted according to

the interim final rule published by the NRCS in the Federal Register

The first sign-up period will affect producers in two watersheds that are at least partially located in Texas. #### World Farmers' Congress **Adopts Agriculture Concentration Remedies**

Farmers from 70 countries attending the International Federation of Agricultural Producers (IFAP) World Farmers' Congress in Washington, D.C. earlier this month adopted recommendations to stop the accelerated march toward a vertically and horizontally integrated agricultural production system. National farmers Union was host to the World Farmers' Congress last held in the United States

Texas Farmers Union President, Wes Sims, also an executive board Texas Farmers Union President, Wes Sims, also an executive board member of NFU said, "the inadequacy of current competition rules is one of the most pressing issues facing farmers across the globe." "Independent agricultural producers cannot succeed without protection from unfair, anti-competitive practices" Sims said. This is evidenced by the sharp decline in the number of family farmers in the past decade and the increasing trend toward horizontal and vertical concentration in the agricultural and food sectors.

The Texas farm leader said, "he and other representatives of IFAP countries believe concentration in food productions, processing and

countries believe concentration in food productions, processing and retail could be turned around with enforcement of antitrust and competition laws, a strengthened regulatory system, increased protection of consumers and revitalization of independently owned business and competitive markets." Specifically, the IFAP countries adopted resolutions to collect and publicize concentration information and require government anti-trust agencies to require economic impact statements of proposed mergers and joint ventures. IFAP also supports establishing a lever of concentration that triggers a

supports establishing a lever of concentration that triggers a presumption of a violation of antitrust law to make it easier for enforcement agencies to prevent high levels of concentration.

The farmers passed resolutions to limit packer ownership of livestock and control of production by non-farmer-owned corporations and supported family farm contract producers and policies that enhance fairness and provide producers protection in their agricultural production contracts. It also supports family farm contract producers.

French farmer and IFAP Executive Committee member Luc Guyau said, "another solution was to strengthen and adapt farmer's economic organization." The IFAP farmers adopted several recommendations relating to economic producer organizations (EPO). These include providing special status, tax regulation, training, access to funding, research and development, appropriate legislative modifications with farmer input, and access to fundamental services in rural areas for EPO's. IFAP also proposed further development of farmer owned cooperatives and marketing boards.

#### Veneman Announces Availability Of \$6.5 Million In Grants To Improve **Economic Conditions In Rural Areas**

Agriculture Secretary Ann M. Veneman announced the availability of \$6.5 million in rural cooperative development grants to improve rural economic conditions through establishing and operating centers for cooperative development.

"These grants will help improve the economic condition of rural communities," said Veneman.

Bryan Daniel, State Director for USDA Rural Development in Texas, said, "Rural Cooperative Development Grants offer opportunities to stimulate cooperative development and improvement which can assist in the creation of jobs in rural Texas. The RCDG program can help promote rural economic development and help with jobs for Texans."


Veneman said that \$1.5 million of the total available funds will be reserved for small, minority producers that apply for assistance through their cooperative businesses. These grants are designed to make feasible the creation, or retention, of jobs in rural areas. Priority consideration for an award will be granted to those applicants who have a successful administrative track record, have demonstrated expertise in providing technical assistance to rural areas and have an ability to retain business and generate opportunities to improve the local economic conditions. In addition, an applicant's commitment and the commitment of local support contribute to its priority status of receiving a grant. To date, the Bush Administration has funded \$14.9 million in Rural Cooperative Development Grants.

These competitive awards are available to non-profit corporations and institutions of higher education, as authorized by the 2002 Farm Bill. Matching funds are required for eligibility. Applications for a Rural Cooperative Development Grant must be received no later than July 26, 2004. Detailed information about application and program requirements will be included in the June 9, 2004, publication of the Federal Register.

RULES OF PROCEDURE, CONDUCT AND DECORUM AT MEETINGS OF THE HALL COUNTY COMMISSIONERS COURT

RULES OF PROCEDURE, CONDUCT AND DECORUM AT MEETINGS OF THE HALL COUNTY COMMISSIONERS COURT

1. All Regular, Special, Emergency and Executive Meetings of the Hall County Commissioners Court will be called and conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Texas Open Meetings Act, Chapter 551, Government Code.

2. Regular, Special and Emergency Meetings of the Hall County Commissioners Court are open to the public and to representatives of the press and media. Executive Sessions of the Commissioners Court are not open to the public, the press or the media and only those individuals expressly requested or ordered to be present are allowed to attend Executive Sessions.

3. The Hall County commissioners Court meets in Regular Meeting of the Commissioners Court, a request must be filed with and approved by at least one member of the Commissioners Court and/or the County Judge by 12:00 p.m. (Noon) on the Wednesday immediately preceding the next Regular Meeting of the Commissioners Court.

4. The business of Hall County is conducted by and through the members of the Hall County Commissioners Court, and by those members of the county staff: elected officials, department heads, consultants, experts and/or members of the public requested to be present and participation therein is limited to that of observers unless a member (or members) of the public is requested to address the Commissioners Court on a particular issue (or issues) or unless the member (or members) of the public completes a Public Participation Form and submits same to the county clerk (or her designated representative of the Commissioners Court. Time for each speaker shall be maintained by the County Clerk or other such authorized designated representative of the Commissioners Court.

B. Maximum discussion on any agenda, item, regardless of the number of members of the public wishing to address the Commissioners Court on such agenda item (or items), then only the first six (6) members of the public recognized to speak shall be entitled to speak jand t

either shorten or lengthen the time allocated for a particular member of the public and/or the amount of time allocated for all agenda items and/or a specific agenda item.

D. It is the intention of the Court to provide open access to the citizens of Hall County to address the Commissioners Court and to express themselves on issues of county government. Members of the public are reminded that the Hall County Commissioners Court is a Constitutional Court, with both judicial and legislative powers, Created under Article V, Section 1, and Section 18 of the Texas Constitution. As a Constitutional Court, the Hall County Commissioners Court, also possesses the power to issue a Contempt of Court Citation under Section 81.024 of the Texas Local Government Code. Accordingly, all members ofthe public in attendance at any Regular, Special. and/or Emergency meeting of the Court shall conduct themselves with proper respect and decorum in speaking to, and/or addressing the Court, in participating in public discussions before the Court, and in all actions in the presence of the Court. Proper attire for men, women and children is mandatory. Those members of the public who are inappropriately attired and/or who do not conduct themselves in an orderly and appropriate manner will be ordered to leave the meeting. Refusal to abide by the Court's order and/or continued disruption of the meeting may result in a Contempt of Court Citation.

E. It is not the intention of the Hall County Commissioners Court to provide a public forum for the demeaning of any individual or group. Neither is it the intention of the Court to allow a member (or members) of the public, to insult the honesty and/or integrity of the Court, individually or collectively. Accordingly, profane, insulting or threatening language directed toward the gender slurs or epithets will NOT be tolerated. Violation of these rules may result in the following sanctions:

1. Cancellation of a speaker's remaining time;
2. Removal from the Commissioner's Courtroom;
3. A Contempt C

Removal from the Commissioner's Courtroom;
 A Contempt Citation; and/or
 Such other civil and/or criminal sanctions as may be authorized under the Constitution, Statutes and Codes of the State of Texas
 The County Judge is the presiding officer of the Hall County Counissioners Court and is a fully participating member thereof and as such may vote on, second, or propose any motion before the Commissioners Court. In the event of the absence of the County Judge, the senior member of the Commissioners Court (in terms of total number of years as an elected representative) present at the Regular, Special, Emergency meeting or Executive Session, shall serve as the Judge Pro-Tern of the Court. However, nothing herein shall prevent the senior member of this Commissioners Court from delegating this duty to another member of the Commissioners Court.
 The County Judge (or the designated Judge Pro-Tern of the Commissioners Court) as presiding officer of the Commissioners Court, is responsible for conducting all meetings and members of the public who have properly completed a Public Participation Foun and submitted same to the County Clerk (or her designee) must wait to be recognized before they will be allowed to address the Court. Special rules for the press and media;

 No media personnel or equipment, including lights, cameras or microphones will be located on the commissioner's court bench or

rules for the press and media;

i. No media personnel or equipment, including lights, cameras or microphones will be located on the commissioner's court bench or table, or closer than four (4) feet from such Court's Bench and/or commissioners table.

ii. Reporters and media technicians are required to structure their movements, equipment, set-up, take-down, and adjustments, etc, in such a manner as to not disrupt the Commissioner Court deliberations, or the ability of the public to see, hear and participate in the proceedings. The County Judge, (or other presiding officer) shall in the sole discretion of such presiding officer, determine when such a disruption is talding place and shall have the authority to enforce the remedy for such disruption, including removal from the Commissioners Courtroom of the party, parties and/or Equipment creating such disruption, unless a majority of the County Commissioners vote otherwise.

iii. Interviews shall not be conducted inside the Commissioners Courtroom during the time the Court is in session.

iv. Media interviews which are conducted outside the Commissioners Courtroom shall be conducted in such manner that the interview does not disturb, impede or disrupt the proceedings of any Regular, Special, Emergency and/or Executive Session of the court.



The Sheriff of Hall County, Texas, or his designated deputy, may serve as the bailiff at regular, special, and emergency meetings of the Court, and shall serve as such at all said meetings which the Court orders such bailiff to serve. In the event of the absence of the sheriff, or should there exist a conflict of interest between the sheriff, and any member of the sheriff s department, and the Commissioner's Court, or in the event of an executive session of the court in which the sheriff is not an authorized participant, then in such even the Court shall appoint such other commissioner has each officer as may be necessary.


