

ly before being packed. A Thermos container or an insulated bag is ideal for packing carefully wrap-ped meat. Meat can be wrapped several layers of newspaper to keep it cool.

Sandwiches should be wrapped ndividually and packed carefully Pack cookies and cake closely in a box so that they don't move ound and break up while being arried.


