ENROLLMENT INCREASE NOTED AT JUNIOR COLLEGE

President J. W. Dillard of Frank Phillips College, Borger, Texas, announced Monday, September 14, that the Frank Phillips College enrollment for the 1970-71 fall semester shows an increase of about one percent over the fall enrollment of 1969-70.

There were 335 students enrolled at the deadline on Friday afternoon, September 11, as compared with 626 last year. Students taking graduate courses increased

from 26 in 1969 to 40 this semester. The FPC Administration and Faculty are very pleased with this increase in the light of the declining population in the Texas Panhandle and in numerous schools and colleges of the state.

SOYBEAN PRODUCERS TO VOTE SEPTEMBER 26

AUSTIN—Soybean producers in 23 Texas counties will vote September 26 on a proposed assessment of themselves of a half cent per bushel for research, disease and insect control and sales promotion.

Each county will have a central voting place, and only actual producers are eligible to vote. Texas Soybean Association, headquartered at Plainview, was authorized by Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White to hold the election.

W. B. Tilson, president of the association, said that absentee ballots may be obtained at the county agent's office in each county and must be returned not later than September 26.

A two-thirds majority of those voting is necessary before the half-cent assessment at the point of processing or first sale can be collected. Nine producers also are to

be elected to a board which will administer the program.

Ballots will be counted by a group composed of a county judge from the soybean area, a representative of the A&M extension service, a representative of the Texas Soybean Association and a representative of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Results of the election will be announced by Commissioner White.

Counties in the soybean area include Bailey, Bowie, Briscoe, Castro, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Parmer, Swisher, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Lubbock, Red River, Lamar, Delta, Fannin, Orange, Jefferson, Chambers, Liberty, Hardin Harris and Galveston.

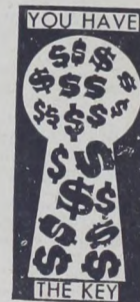

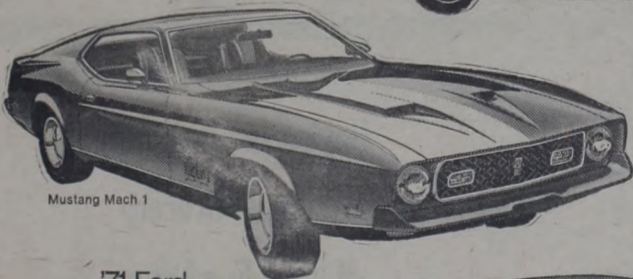

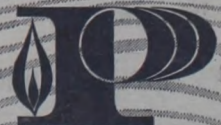

We enjoyed instant food, but missed the fresh fruits and vegetables of Malawi. We ate enough Mexican food to carry us for another four years, but our children whined for nsima. Everyone was so kind and hospitable. The mission message we proclaimed was always enthusiastic.
