Jayton Jaybirds Defeat Valley Patriots, 39-20

The Jayton Jaybirds proved they were worthy of their 4th rank rating as they handed the Valley Patriots a 39-20 defeat on September 7.

Jayton struck first on a 19 yard run by Paul Morlas. Morlas kicked the extra point to make the score 8-0. Valley closed the gap quickly when Kirk Garner took a hand-off and went 70 yards to pull the Patriots within two. The kick attempt by Chad Calvert was no good. The Jaybirds put two more TDs on the board before the half with Morlas throwing a 43 yard TD and a 45 yard TD. The Patriots went in at half time behind 20-6.

The second half saw the Patriots come out and march down the field and score, only to see it

called back on a penalty. The Jaybirds grabbed the momentum and scored twice, both on short runs by Morlas. Clay Edwards went around end to add to Valley's score and Garner ended the scoring on a 51 yard run. The kick was good by Calvert to bring the final score to 39-20.

"The boys had to face a top ranked team and really responded well. We need to keep working on some areas of the game but the boys seem willing to do what it takes to improve."

Leading the rushing yards was Kirk Garner who had 166 yards on 7 carries. Clay Edwards had 86 yards on 21 carries.

The Patriots face 8th ranked Lazbuddie Friday at Patriots Stadium at 7:30.

County Judge Jimmy Burson presented the Budget Proposal for the fiscal year, October 1, 1990-September 30, 1991.

Changes of the proposed budget were discussed. Interested citizens quizzed the group on the reasons for the changes in the budget. Also requests were presented for allotment of more money in certain areas.

After much discussion, the commissioners adopted the proposed budget as presented.

Commissioners present were Aaron Younger, Jack Chandler, Bryant Eddleman and L.B. Garvin. Bess McWilliams, county clerk, was also present.

Hall County Sets Parade September 15

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON TAX INCREASE

The Commissioners Court of Briscoe County will hold a public hearing on a proposal to increase total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll in 1989 by nineteen and four tenths (19.4%) percent. Your individual taxes may increase at a greater or lesser rate, or even decrease, depending on the change in the taxable value of your property in relation to the change in taxable value of all other property.

The public hearing will be held on September 20, 1990 at 9:10 a.m. in the County Courtroom.

AGAINST the proposal: None
PRESENT AND NOT VOTING: None

The statement above shows the percentage increase the proposed rate represents over the effective tax rate that the unit published on August 9, 1990. The following table compares taxes on an average home in this taxing unit last year to taxes proposed on the average home this year. Again, your individual taxes may be higher or lower, depending on the taxable value of your property.

Under this proposal taxes on the average home would increase by \$27.30 or 21.92 percent compared with last year's taxes.

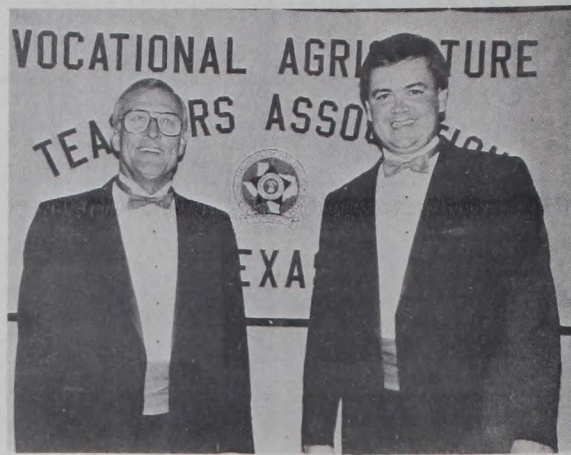
Comparing tax rates without adjusting for changes in property value, the tax rate would increase by \$0.091 per \$100 of taxable value or 21.92 percent compared to last year's tax rate. These tax rate figures are not adjusted for changes in the taxable value of property.
